JOINT CELEBRATION FOR TOWNS ALONG DENVER SOUTH PLAINS LINE IS NOT PRAC-TICAL, SAYS COMMITTEE FROM TOWNS

PLAINS TOWNS DECIDE SPECIAL TOUR OVER EN TIRE EXTENSIONS OF DENVER ROAD WILL MEET WITH APPROVAL OF ALL TOWNS

At a meeting of the executive committee from the Fourteen towns on the new extensions of the Fort Worth & Denver South Plains Kailway, held in Lockney this afternoon, it was found that the holding of a joint-celebration at the junction was not in accord with the wishes of the towns above the caprock, and was not urged by the towns below the cap rock, and by a unanimous vote, a motion by J. D. Henley, of Turkey, and second by H. B. Adams of Lockney, recinded the action taken at Turkey some weeks ago, and the delegates went on record as opposing a joint celebration to be held at any point on the line.

Upon motion by A. B. Davis of Lubbock, and second by F. G. Abbey of Turkey, it was decided to ask the Denver Railway Company to operate at the opening of the road on the New lines, a system of Special trains, that would make a two days tour of the New lines, spending a short time in each town, thereby, allowing all those who desired to take advantage of this two days tour, to visit every town on the extensions. The towns, if the railroad accepts the proposition, be asked to make preparations to entertain the excursionists when they reach their individual towns on the two day tour. A. B. 1928 COTTON CROP VALUE IS PLACED AT \$1,440,514,000

New Orleans, La., Aug. 7 .- Value of the cotton crop produced in the United States during the season just ended was placed at \$1,440,514,000 by H. G. Hester, secretary of the New Orleans cotton exchange.

This compares with \$1,230,512,000 last year and \$1,550,811,000 the previous year.

The total commercial crop for last season, which ended July 31st, was 14,443,934 bales, a decrease under the crop of 1926-27 of 4,761,995 and 1,-170,775 bales under 1925-26.

This year's crop, which was 4,762,-000 bales less than last year's brought growers \$210,000,000.

The statement said the season should be regarded as fairly prosper-, ous. The grade of the crop, Secretary Hester announced, was one of the best, if not the best, on record.

"It was middling to strict middling with a decided leaning to barely strict middling and with comparatively little below seven-eighths inch staple. There was almost an utter absence of low grades.

Deliveries from Texas in round numbers, were 4,693,000 bales, a decrease under last year of 1,205,000. Deliveries from all gulf states, including Mississippi, Arkansas, Louisi ana, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Missouri, California, Arizona and New Mexico, were 5,301,000 a decrease of 2,334,000 and from the Atlantic states, including Alabama, Georgia, Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia and Kentucky were 4,450,000, a decrease of 1,223,000.

The entire year, the report said, has been a poor one for the cotton manufacturing industry.
