City works Towler-THD water deal

City aldermen agreed Monday to run just over 1,400 feet of water line to the south line of the new Bob Towler Equipment Co. site on the southern edge of the city, with Towler to

pay only for the cost of the line across his property. Aldermen also provided for city employees to do most of the labor, bringing down the cost for the project from

estimates as high as \$18,000 to less than \$9,000. Towler will pay about \$3,100 for the line across his property, with the city to pay almost \$6,000 for extending the line

along South US 385 for about 900 feet to the site owned by the State Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation until the SDHPT connects to the city water system.

SDHPT will then reimburse the city for its share of the line. "We have been suffering from a lack of policy all through this," said Alderman David Hays. "We need to adopt some sort of policy for the future."

The city accepted the 1984 paving program, which was

completed this month, and also adopted an ordinance to begin a new paving program that could include up to 79 blocks and portions of blocks in the city.

The city paid \$37,050 for its 10% share of the last program, which had a 53% signup rate. Aldermen feel, however, the next program will have a much lower rate of participation, which could increase the unit cost on the project.

Signup will begin in the next

few weeks.

The aldermen also accepted a bid of \$95,482.63 from West Texas Equipment Co. of Lubbock for a new Caterpillar 953 tractor-loader for the city's landfill, and a bid of \$29,905 from Collins Ambulance Co. of Mansfield for a new ambulance.

The city, county and Castro Co. Hospital District will each pay one-third of the cost of the ambulance, with the city to retain ownership.

Cable company to expand services

There will be a lot more television to watch in Dimmitt in the next couple of months, but it's going to cost a little more.

Lewis Communications Cable TV, Ltd., which purchased the local system in April, will be adding five channels while dropping KCBD, Channel 11 in Lubbock, about Sept. 1, according to Ken Kendall, regional manager for Lewis.

Among the basic service additions will be Nickelodeon, which features children's programming during the day and family-wide programming during the evening; Video Hits I, a sister network of MTV which features middle-of-road music and videos; KJAA, an independent station in Lubbock which features a variety of syndicated programming; and The Nashville Network, which features country music entertainment and a variety of movies and sports.

The Disney Channel will be added as a "premium" service, like the current HBO channel. Disney features family programming.

The current basic charge of \$11 per month will be raised to \$13.50 when the additional services are available, Kendall told the City Board of Aldermen Monday night, and the company anticipates another \$1 increase in the basic rate

about Apr. 1, 1986.

"The programming costs are increasing," Kendall said, "and we're going to have to go up. We will also raise our fees for one-time services we provide, but there won't be a raise in other fees, like for additional outlets."

Kendall said the Disney Channel will cost \$10 per month, with persons subscribing to both HBO and the Disney Channel being charged \$19 plus the basic cable rate.

The system will be expanding beyond the present three-channel converters the system has been using since its last expansion two years ago, and new converters will have to be used to get all of the services, unless consumers have a cable-ready television.

"We'll require a one-time deposit of \$25 for the new converters," Kendall said, "but we'll give everyone some kind of break for their old three-channel converters."

Kendall also said wireless remote-control converters will be available, but said local dealers can make those available.

"We'll also be checking out our system line-by-line to make sure everything is up to specifications," Kendall said.

Man sought in death

Dimmitt police are searching for an Olton man believed to have fatally injured Joe Montiel, Jr., 37, of Earth, in a fight in Dimmitt July 7.

Montiel died July 9 at Northwest Texas Hospital of injuries he received in the altercation, which started at about 2:30 a.m.

Dimmitt police refused to give the *News* any further information on the case, saying the case was still under investigation; however, sources told the *News* the fight started as a domestic disturbance.

Sources said Montiel was originally taken to Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt where he was treated for abra-

sions and other visible injuries suffered in the fight and released. When Montiel complained of further injuries on July 9, he was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, where he died.

Warrants were issued Tuesday for the Olton man, whose name was not divulged by authorities. County-District Attorney Jimmy Davis told the *News* Tuesday he will present the case to the Castro County Grand Jury, which will

consider several charges, including murder.

Funeral services were held last Thursday at St. Mary Magdalene Catholic Church in Earth, where Montiel had lived less than a week after moving from Dimmitt. Rev. Patrick Maher, pastor, officiated, with burial following in Earth Memorial Cemetery.

Montiel was born in Marlin and married Candida Garza in

Farmers get Azidrin clearance

The Environmental Protection Agency has granted a Section 18 emergency clearance for farmers to use Azidrin to control Banks Spider Mite in corn.

The emergency clearance for the pyrethroid was granted only after pressure was applied on EPA by Sens. Lloyd Bentsen and Phil Gramm, Rep. Larry Combest and several others in Washington, D.C., according to Texas Corn Growers Association head Carl King.

"In my opinion, the Union Carbide incident in India has made EPA tighten up the reins on what we can do," King said. "But this is a proven product."

King said he felt the EPA was clamping down too much on volatile chemicals like pyrethroids after the incident in India, handicapping farmers

who are fighting against time.

"This corn is tassling out," King said, "and we've got to control these spider mites now. We've been working on trying to get Azidrin labeled for spider mites for the past four or five months, since it's the only product that will control Banks Spider Mites effectively."

"It doesn't control the spotted mite, which is beginning to become more plentiful, but FMC Corp. has a new product called Capture that looks promising to control the spotted mite, but it's going to take time to get clearance on it because it is a pyrethroid, too."

EPA has also established a monitoring program, with the costs of the monitoring to be borne by Shell, who manufac-

tures Azidrin.

County Extension Service Entomologist Allen Knutson said the mite population "has been fairly light this year, but it's beginning to build up. We've had some hot, dry weather, and it's good weather for mites. I guess we got this clearance just in time."

Knutson said insect problems are building up in corn.

"Southwestern Corn Borers are emerging this week, and the next two weeks will be critical in field scouting. The corn crop is developing earlier, and the borers are coming out a little earlier than usual. The earliness might help us on the

spider mites, because the sooner the corn can mature it will stay ahead of the spider mites, but mites can build up so fast it might or might not be important.

"One problem with Azidrin is it won't be effective on two-spotted mites, and we're trying to find out exactly what we have. Usually, though, two-spots won't come out until late in the year. We'll be checking to see exactly what we have and try to avoid wasting any unneeded sprayings."

Knutson added that insect problems have not been prevalent in most of the other county crops.

"We haven't had any problems in cotton, and some light disease in sugar beets," the entomologist said.

Clayton joins GOP

It was done without fanfare, but Bill Clayton, longtime State Representative for this area and Texas' longest-tenured Speaker of the House, became a Republican last week.

Echoing the words of former US Rep. Kent Hance of Lubbock, who switched parties last month, Clayton

said he "just felt that the Democratic Party is getting too liberal."

Clayton did rule out any campaign for governor in 1986, saying he would have to raise between \$10 million and \$12 million and face an incumbent who is also a strong campaigner.

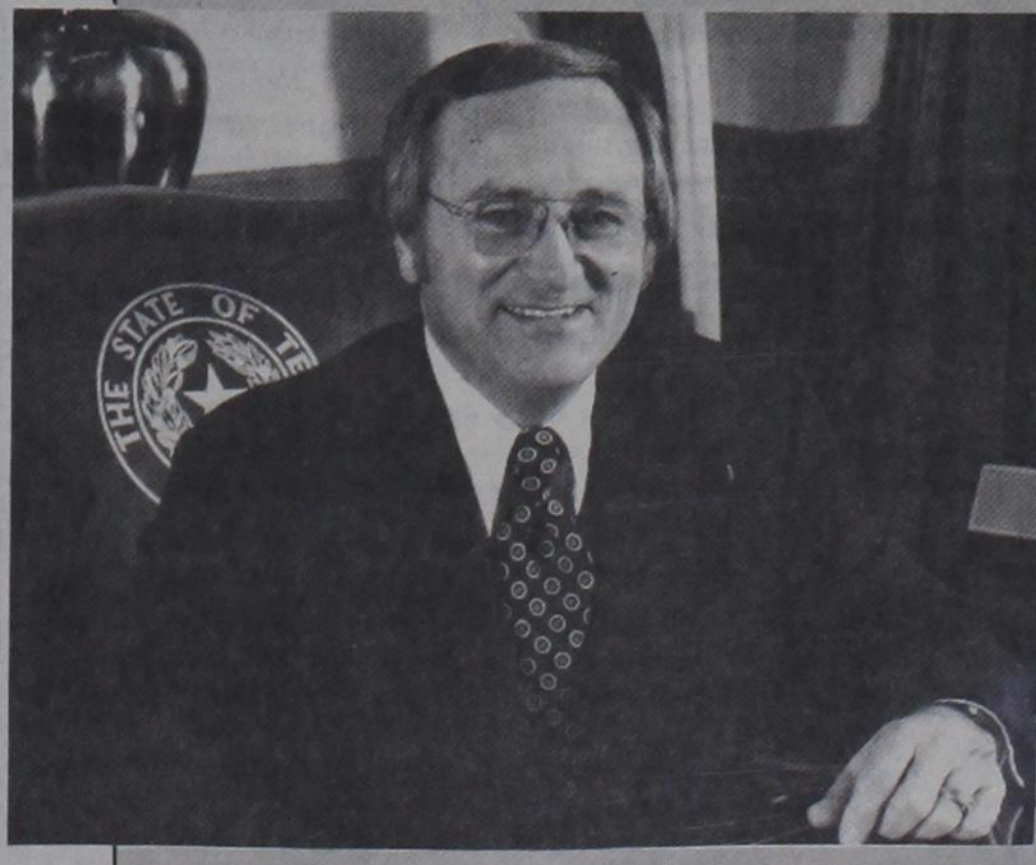
"Mark White is one heck of a campaigner," Clayton

said. "It's always hard to beat an incumbent, much less one that's very effective in campaigning. I think it's going to take someone like a Kent Hance to do it."

Hance and Clayton have been high on the list of potential opponents for White in next year's gubernatorial election. Hance has promised to make a final decision by late summer.

Clayton also denied he was looking at the Agriculture Commissioner's race, saying the timing was not right for him to be involved in any race and that he would just like to join the ranks and try to "help the troops."

Clayton is considered to be a formidable fund raiser, which should help the party, but said the off-year election, in which the party not in the White House has traditionally made an upswing, "is not going to make the race an easy thing. I'm not going to take sides in the primary, but I'll certainly be heavily involved in the general election."

MEASUREMENT SERVICE

Requests are being accepted for measurement service on Spring seeded crops and ACR. The aerial measurement fee for this service is \$20 for the first 25 acres plus two cents each additional acre. We encourage you to take advantage of this service, if you have any doubts about your acres.

ACR MAINTENANCE

Your ACR (set-aside) must be cared for and maintained throughout the calendar year. If a tillage operation is being used on your ACR instead of a

cover crop, wind and water erosion and weeds must be controlled. Land that will be planted to wheat this fall may be tilled in the normal manner beginning July 1.

Approved summer cover crops on ACR are eligible for emergency haying or grazing. These acres MUST be certified and a request filed before haying or grazing. You will need to pay a \$10 fee if you wish to request haying or grazing.

If you filed a request to leave wheat standing for cover you might wish to either clip, mow or plow this acreage, since the weeds are beginning to come. This wheat may not be harvested in any manner; therefore, we will begin checking to see this does not happen.

The Dimmitt City Board of Aldermen is finalizing plans for a major street paving project.

Stress higher on farmers

The bitter economic realities of low prices, high debt loads and increased bankruptcies translate into stress for farmers, ranchers and their families.

their difficulties may fear they cannot regain control over their situation and become depressed, confused or fear a nervous breakdown," Taylor observes.

But those families with open communication, shared decision-making and long-range planning seem to handle it better than those with little communication, authoritarian

decision-making and day-to-day planning. Developing communication, decision-making and planning skills may help families better cope with stressful situations.

"Even a strong family can be temporarily disorganized under stress," says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service family life specialist Dorothy Taylor. "When pressures become greater than the strength of the family, or stress uses up all the family's resources, devastating effects like alcohol and drug abuse accidents or suicides result."

The specialist says that early signs or symptoms of too much stress are dreading to go to work, feeling tired all the time without cause, a change in sleeping habits and problems with digestion.

Becoming extremely critical, developing negative attitudes about everything and everybody, withdrawing from people, becoming self-centered, being unusually worried about your health and losing faith in other people and yourself are also signs of stress, she says.

"Farmers and ranchers who are going through stressful times and realize they are struggling unsuccessfully with

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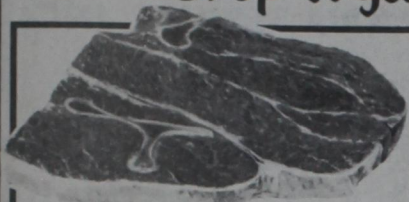
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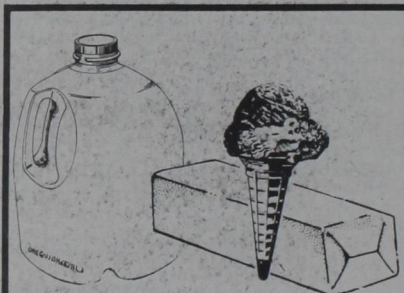
