Although the bankers were at first skeptical, their deposits have increased 50 per cent in six years. The number of depositers has increased 25 per cent and savings deposits now equal individual deposits. Six years ago there were very few savings accounts. Credit business has been reduced 50 per cent. One banker stated that "in a one crop cotton section bankers lie awake at night worrying over their business but they can deep at night because they have twelve pay days a year."

The farmers are doing well too be cause they have twelve pay days a year and for the further reason that their crop yields have already increased 25 per cent due to the use of barnyard manure. All of them save manure and 20 per cent of them use manure spreaders. Although this is an old cotton country very little ommercial fertilizer is used. Farmers are also improving their pastures. There is now an average of 25 acres of tame grass per farm. Again someone made the statement that "the foundation of the dairy business is good pastures." 




