Derrell Dollar Killed In Auto Accident

Car Overturns Killing One and Wounding Two Others Near Carlsbad Sunday Morning

Mr. Derrell Dollar, age 27 years, 11 months, and twenty days, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Dollar, who lives nine Irick community, was killed in an automobile accident one and one-half farm. miles north of Carlsbad, N. M., about 10 o'clock Sunday morning, and Marsh Collins, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Collins, of this city, and J. B. Downs of Hereford, Texas, were badly injur-





There is no excuse for "Caressness." Carefulness in protecting he lives of our school children raisd the standard of the nation.


