Okays \$6 million budget

Board approves new evaluation

The Dimmitt School Board took one of its biggest steps ever Monday to help teachers better educate students with the adoption of a new evaluation document.

"This will certainly help our esprit d'corps," said Board Vice-President Deanne Clark. "This could save our schools."

The evaluation packet includes 24 pages of philosophy, job descriptions and explanations of the appraisal process and criteria and has an additional six pages of guidelines and procedures to assist evaluators in helping analyze observation of teachers.

Principals and other administrators will conduct four evaluations of each teacher in the Dimmitt schools each year, with two evaluations each semester. The appraisal process will also include self-appraisal by each teacher and

at least one conference between each teacher and appraiser(s).

A summative appraisal will be used to rank teachers according to performance, and the summative appraisal will in turn be used to help determine rankings for career ladder assignments.

The evaluators will rate teachers on a scale of one (unsatisfactory) through five (clearly outstanding), with a three indicating the teacher's performance meets district standards.

"I'm worried we're going to encourage teachers to be average," said Board President Fred Bruegel, but Richardson Elementary teacher Dorothy Sheffy said "if a teacher strives for a three that teacher will also strive for a four (exceeds expectations) or a five."

Curriculum Director Corky

Richardson Elmer Berryhill (Richardson), Neal Bryan (middle school) and Alex Glass (high school) have received special, intensive training during the spring and summer, including in-depth study of the evaluation process and studying teaching methods.

"In the past, I have not always been real comfortable doing evaluations," Glass said. "I didn't always know what I was looking for, but with the implementation of our new mastery teaching and the training we've received I feel more comfortable with evaluations than I've felt during 20 years as an administrator."

The group of administrators and teachers that met with the board Monday night said the new evaluation process would not lessen the controversy over placements on the career ladder.

County changes pay again

County employees can be happy — they're getting pay checks on the 15th and 27th of the month like they always did until July 1.

Monday morning, the Castro County Commissioners Court voted to revert back to the old system of paying employees monthly, with a check on the 15th and 27th of each month.

County Auditor Reeford Burrous told the commissioners Monday that it really didn't make any difference how the pay was set up — on an hourly

basis or on a weekly, bi-weekly or annual salary — since the county does not employ a civil service hiring practice.

Burrous and the County Treasurer Oleta Raper both said reverting back to the old pay periods would probably stop complaints they have received since the county changed its pay periods to bi-weekly on July 1. The pay periods were changed again on July 22 by the commissioners, but county officials continued to receive complaints, and decided to go back to the old method.

"We've checked this out with the Dept. of Labor and they said it was alright to do this," Burrous said. Burrous said he confirmed that with DOL last week.

"We've been trying to tell them all along it was alright to do this," said a county

employee who asked to remain unidentified. "We had three people (County-District Attorney Jimmy Davis, County Sheriff Lonny Rhynes and Deputy Jerry Jansa) who attended a seminar on all of this a couple of months ago and they said it was alright to keep paying us (monthly)."

Commissioners also received a report on overtime paid to county employees from April 15 through July from Raper (see graphic) and also learned that county employees who drive county vehicles are subject to additional withholding taxes.

Burrous said the employees are subject to having an additional \$1.40 per check held out for Social Security taxes, and County Commissioners suggested all county employees who have been driving county vehicles to stop driving the vehicles to and from work.

Vandals attack country club

Vandals caused an estimated \$15,000 damage in a spree Monday night at the Castro County Country Club.

The club's 20 carts and 10 others that were leased from a Lubbock firm were strewn across the golf course and around town — at KDHN Radio, Dimmitt Municipal Airport, near Ruskin Racquet Club, Taylor and Sons Food Store and at Western Foods cucumber facility where vandals destroyed some equipment, but a spokesman there could not provide a damage estimate.

All of the leased carts, which were parked outside a locked cart barn, suffered at least minor damage, while some of the carts were termed total losses by CCCC officials. The carts are valued at about \$1,500 each.

The vandals forced open a padlock on the cart barn and drove those carts out, damaging at least three of them, with one being described as a total loss.

The CCCC carts are valued at up to \$2,000 each.

"They played demolition derby with the carts," said one CCCC member. "Some of the carts were completely torn up — frames warped and bent, the front end torn up. They bent the bag holders on the back."

The only part of the course



that was torn up was the No. 2 green. CCCC officials speculated the vandals drove a car around the green, digging divots, running over the

flagstick in the cup and tearing out a sprinkler.

"It's not damaged too bad," said club pro Cliff Cook. "The green will heal itself in time."

Police have questioned several people about the incidents, but no suspects had been reported under arrest at presstime.

Sheriff pleas for more jail cells

Castro County may have to provide more cells in the county jail if the jail's population continues to swell.

"Through July, 1985, our jail has held an average of 11.9 prisoners per day this year," said County Sheriff Lonny Rhynes. "12 prisoners per day is our cutoff for one of our most important variances granted by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards, and if we exceed 12 prisoners per day we could lose that variance and not be in compliance."

The important variance concerns the number of single-prisoner cells in the county jail, the only prisoner-holding facility in the county.

"We only have three single cells. We are supposed to have five, but TCJS has given us a variance as long as we can keep our average daily jail population below 12."

The county jail currently has 18 bunks, and has three bunks on the top floor because no more than nine prisoners may be held on the top floor at any time.

"Anytime you have over nine prisoners on a floor you must have a jailer there. We could use those cells, we need them, plus we need to build three more, but they have to be staffed. So far, the county hasn't given us the go-ahead to staff the top floor, so we can't ever have more than nine people up there."

Rhynes said on any floor with less than ten prisoners the prisoners have to be checked only once each hour.

"We would need to have four additional staffers to open up the jail anymore than it is now. This has created a problem on prisoners serving their jail sentences—sometimes we have to postpone jailing prisoners convicted of lesser misdemeanors yet sentenced to jail, so we can keep our felons in jail. We're not letting people who are convicted of serious of-

fenses right back out on the street, but on some lesser offenses their jail time might be postponed a little bit so we can keep our jail from being too full at any time."

At Monday's County Commissioner's Court meeting, Pct. 4 Commissioner Vincent Guggemos suggested moving the dispatcher's office to the second floor, but Rhynes said that would not be a feasible solution.

"The dispatcher also serves as the jailer, and takes care of all of the night office work," Rhynes said. "We have public access at night through the west door of the courthouse, plus all of the processing and booking is done on the first floor. We would still have to have someone down there 24 hours."

"If we had a jailer on the top floor and could utilize all of our cells, we have adequate space for a small office, or at least a desk. But we can't do anything more on the top floor unless we can get it staffed."

Rhynes added there is more than enough space for three single cells to be built on the top floor, relieving the county of the need for the single-cell variance.

Broom sale set Tuesday

The annual Dimmitt Lions Club broom sale will be held Tuesday from 7 a.m. until 6 p.m. on the north side of the courthouse square.

Fully guaranteed brooms, mops, brushes and many other items, as well as quality cleaning aids for home, business and industry will be on hand.

Joe Josselet, broom sale chairman, said all of the items are manufactured by blind and visually-impaired workers in various Lighthouses for the Blind. Besides helping these workers, the proceeds from the broom sale will be used in various local, area and state-wide Lions Club projects by the Dimmitt Lions Club, including support of the Boy Scouts, Kids, Inc., scholarships, sight conservation, Girlstown, and the Lions Crip-

pled Children's Camp. Sales of blind-made products in previous years have been very successful and Lion Josselet expressed his confidence in reaching a new high this year.

"Every home and business can use some of these cleaning aids, and every item purchased will help our community and especially helps with sight conservation."

tersection of Bedford and Broadway Thursday in which two people were injured and taken to Plains Memorial Hospital.

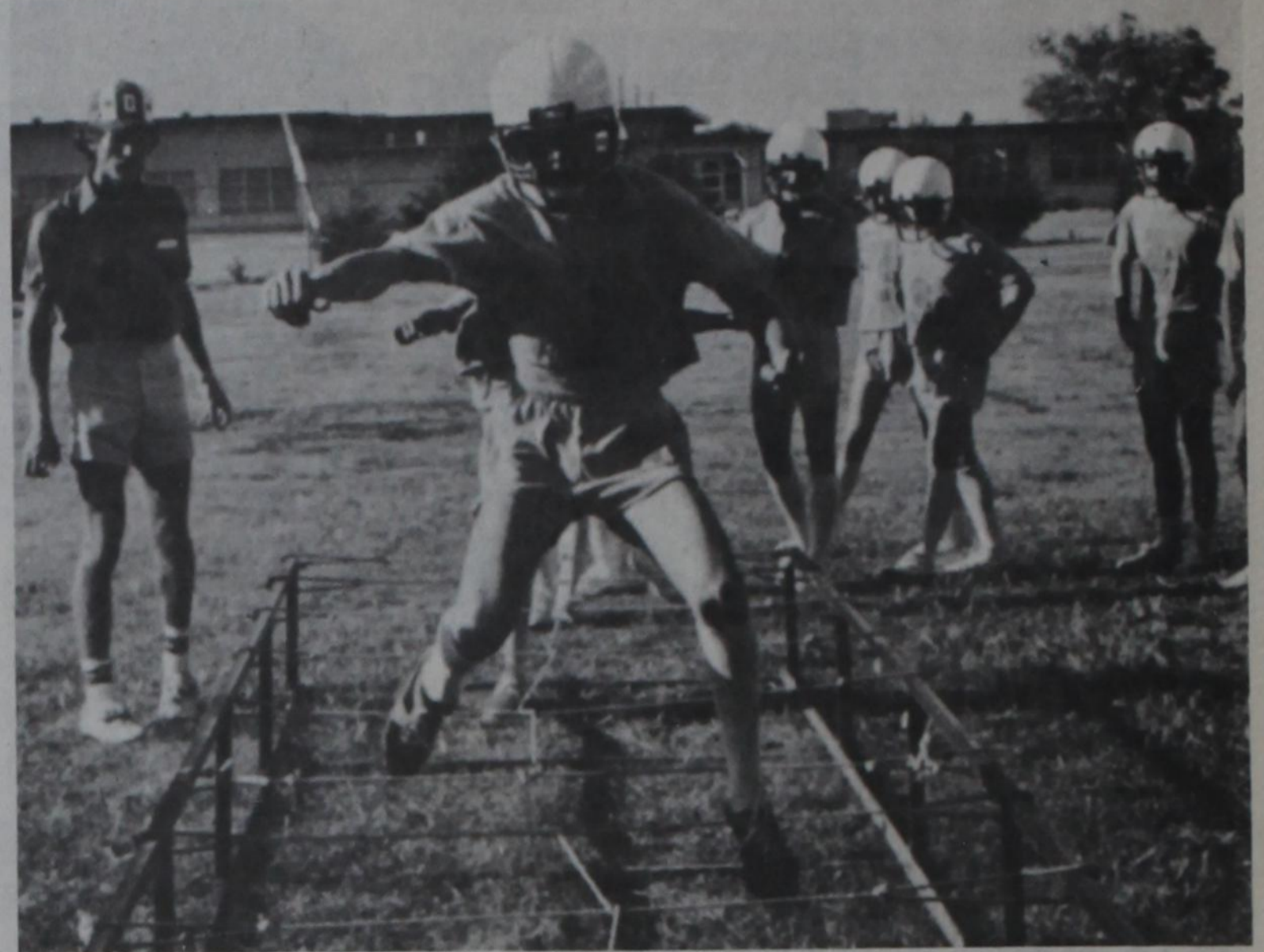

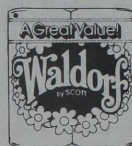

der, which awards teachers determined to be outstanding with additional bonuses, but Lockmiller said the evaluation would help determine career ladder rankings while also showing teachers what they do, and don't do well, what the evaluator thinks are reasons for outstanding or below average performance, and remediation to correct unsatisfactory or other performance below expectations.

"If a teacher is given a four or a five, the evaluator has to give a reason," Lockmiller said, "and the same thing for a one or a two. For a one or a two, the evaluator has to complete an improvement plan for that teacher, go over it and the evaluation with the teacher, and show and tell the teacher what steps are suggested for remediation."

Teachers will be shown the new evaluation packet at the first day of in-service training Aug. 26.

"We hope that through this we can relate to the teachers through the principals that the board is not trying to put teachers down, but instead is trying to help our teachers to excel," Lockmiller said.

In other business, the board set the tax rate for the 1985-86 school year at 84.14 cents per \$100 valuation, the same rate as last year, and approved a \$6,011,719 budget for the coming year.

The budget is up just over \$200,000 from last year, and Supt. Robert Ryan said more of the increase is due to higher salaries.

"Most of this is from salary raises," Ryan said of the increase, "and it will probably go

up more next year because of another state-mandated increase. The state is not going to increase funding for that, so we'll probably be looking at another tax increase next year."

Ryan also told the board the new science lab and classroom at the Dimmitt High School should be ready for the first day of school on Sept. 3, and the board elected to eliminate Bus Route No. 2, with Routes 1 and 4 to pick up students formerly on Route 2. There will be some minor changes on Routes 9 and 12.

The board also hired, subject to assignment, teachers Donna Bogan, Janet Hand, Mary Hunter, Gwen Johnson, Cristina Mireles, Petra Monreal, Elayne Patridge, Debbie Daniell, Suellen Spring, Ruby Teaschner, Donna Underwood, Pam White, Rachelle Wilcox and Rod O'Neal, and hired David Willis as the new assistant principal at Dimmitt Middle School.

The board accepted resignations from Frances Duke, who is retiring, and from Katie Schaeffer, Darla Myatt, Connie Kenmore, Kathyna Wiseman and Darlene Turner.

The board reassigned Paralyne Moore to replace Duke as a diagnostician, and Sue Howell to replace Kenmore as DMS counselor.

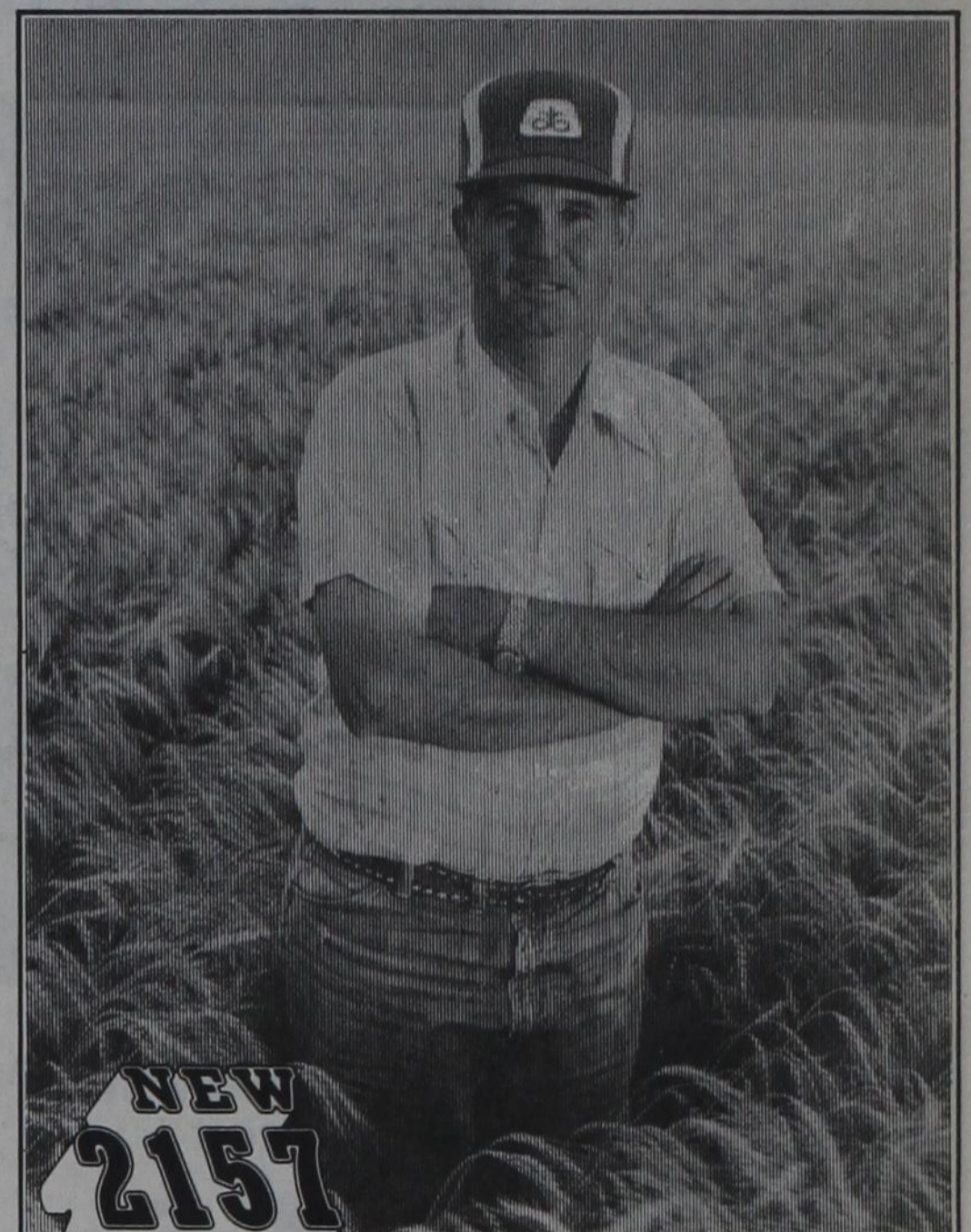

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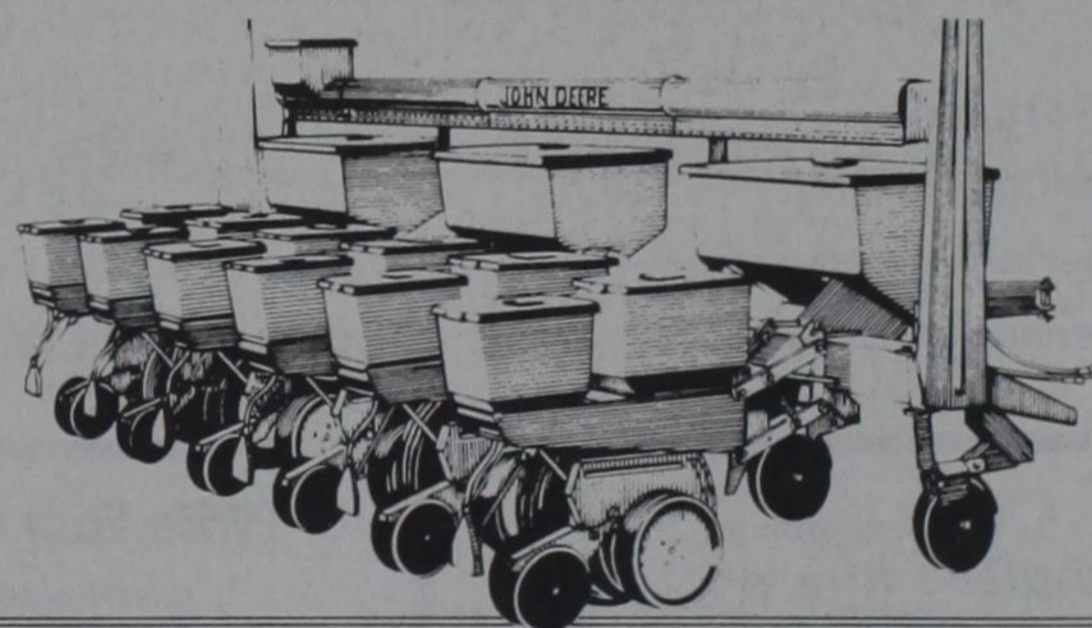

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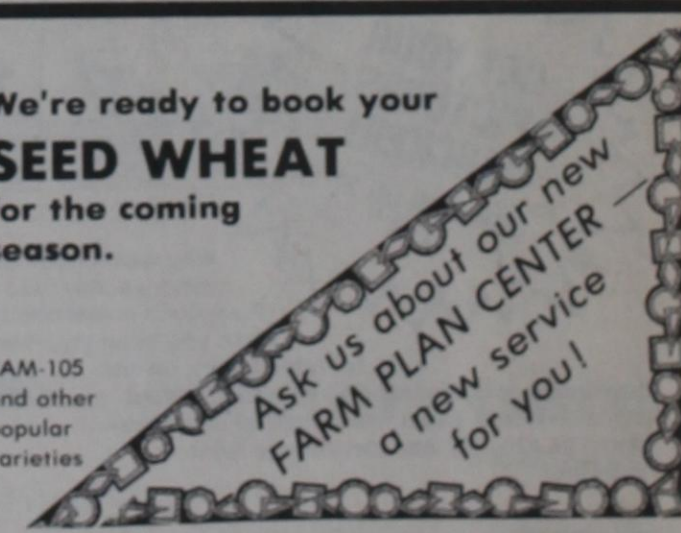
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
