Ralls Vocational Agriculture Boys Make Profit

Agriculture class of Ralls High school for the 1932-33 scholastic year, made \$255.66 profit. J. H. Taylor, teacher, reports. The boys had five dairy cows, two brood sows and 35 barrows, six baby beeves and 35 laying hens. From the five dairy cows the net was \$157.28, or \$31.45 per cow; from the 35 barrows, \$96.32; from the baby beeves \$8.69; from the chickens, \$7.96; with 55 cent loss on the two sows.

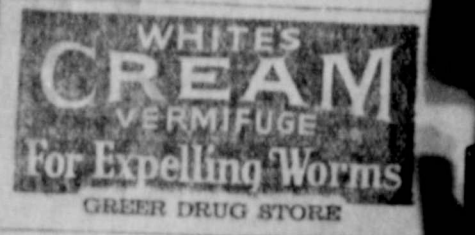

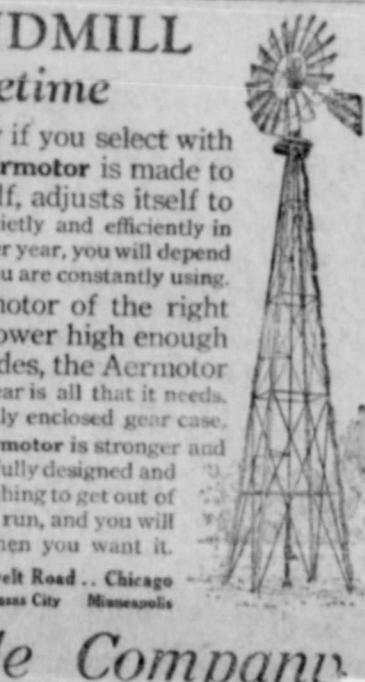

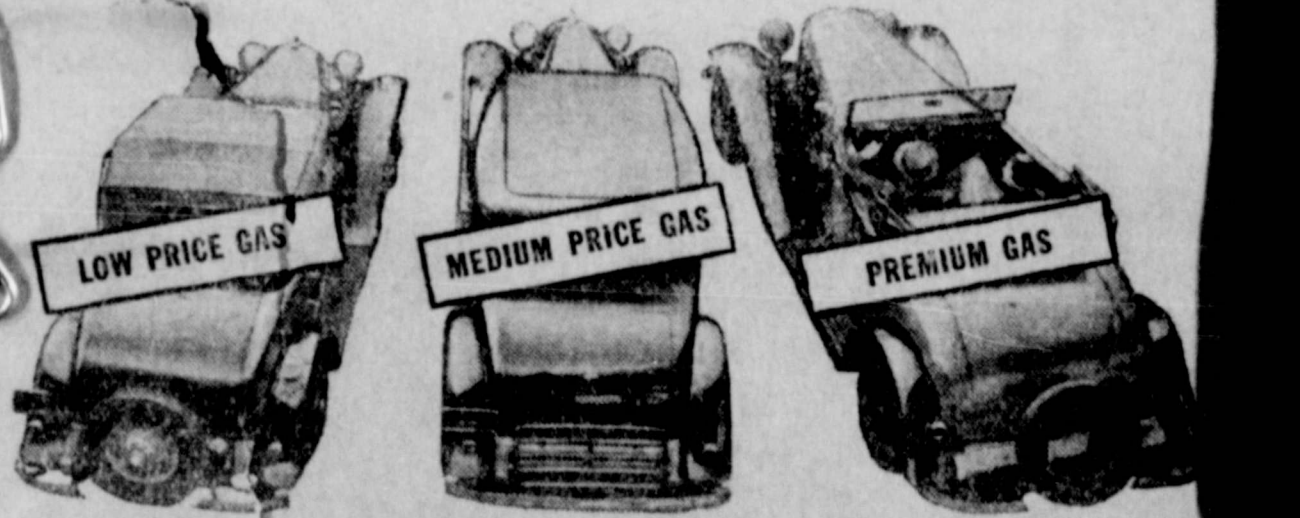
