

Guaranty Of Federal Reserve Member Banks

We believe it to be a fact, although have no direct information on hich to base our belief, that, for the maing year, at least, the Federal System will be operated, in atever eventualities may develop. with the principle of guaranteeing the depiesits of member banks.

While opposing Congressional leg. islation for this purpose in the main, the Treasury has allowed a tacit under standing to grow among Washington observes that no Federal Reserve member bank shall be allowed to fail. The interests of its shareholders may be subrogated to the financing required from the R. F. C. to keep the member bank's deposits unfrozen, but there States. are to be no member bank closings and liquidations.

Perhaps, this is inherent in the polcy that only sound banks were ficensed to reopen by the Federal authorities after the banking holiday. But is remains a situation with which nonmember State banks must reckon, and it may establish a new precedent in the competition of the Federal Gover.

The processing tax assessed on flour will provide a fund from which the allotment sums will be paid to farmers thus making the entire program self-supporting.
