Efforts To Be Made To Relieve Unemployment Situation Here Work Will Perhaps Begin Monday

Word was received Saturday, that Lockney's street improvement project had been approved by CWA through Texas Rehabili ration and Relief Commission for \$4,307. Recently a sewing room project was approved for \$2,100.

According to Mayor J. H. Hohlaus supervisor, work prob ably begin Monday. The street from main street to the grade school and the street leading to the High School just south of the Methodist church and in front of the high school and the street to the city auditorium will be improved. Caliche will be used as a base after being run through a rock crusher Application will be made for a PWA loan to top these streets with asphalt or like topping.

Road projects in Commissioner Harris' precinct also received ap proval in the amount of \$4,400 Cemmissioner Walter Wood also received approval of projects in his precinct in the amount of approximately \$6,000.

Commissoner Harris contemplates begining work sometime next week, perhaps Monday.

With the sewing room an street improvement project approved. it means approximately \$11,000 will be expended in the Lockney community to relieve unemployment. This will perhaps take care of the situation fairly well for a time at least-

CHECK FOR NEW YEARS

Five Hundred Wheat Checks Received This Week Amount ing To Approximately \$125,000

Wheat farmers of Floyd County reseived a nice New Years gift this week when 500 government checks were received amounting to about \$125,000 and distributed to those signing contracts to reduce wheat acreage this year. There are only about 125 checks outstanding. Olin Ridings, chair-man of the Floyd County wheat Control Association, state that a few contracts were returned for corrections to the county boarrd.

Expense money for the handling these contracts for the county has not been received, however Mr. Ridings states that the account has been allowed by Washington authorities. No county has as yet received expense money, but it should arrive in a few days.

This is a wrong impression, and employment is handled as outlined above. The local employment or registration officer has nothing to do with the rules and regulations governing this work, as it is promulgated by the Texas Rehabilitation and Relief Commis-

For the information of the general public, the registration fee is the same on passenger cars that it has been for the past five years and is on a weight basis altogether. Up to a gross weighe og2,000 pounds it figures 28 cents per hundred. Up to a gross weight of 3,500 pounds it figures 36 cents per hundred. Up to a gross weight if 4,500 pounds it figures 48 cents per hundred.

The only difference in any registration is on farm trucks, where a farmer uses his truck for the sole purpose of transporting his produce or anything that he may raise on the farm to and transporting any goods that he may buy in town for use on his farm, he is entitled to register under the new farmers truck law. registering his truck with a gross weight from 1,000 pounds to 8. 000 pounds, fee for same being 1-2 of the Commercial registration fee.

Regarding Bills of Sale and Application for Transfer; Many are confused on the above and I will say for the information of the general public that upon trading on buying an automobile they should exact from the person of whom they are trading with a Bill of Sale and Application for Transfer, this should be made out in triplicate, this will give the purchaser a copy, as well as one for the Tax Collector and one for the Highway Department at

Austin A bill of sale and application is only good for a period of 10 days after this time there is a penalty provided of \$2.50, if the bill of sale is over 20 days old there is a penalty of\$5, 00. The fee for making a transfer is only 25 cents and in having same properly transferred it will keep the record
