The Texas Utilities Company who furnishes Lockney with electric energy announce this week a reduction in rates for this city, ef fective with March 1st billing.

Under the new rates the first 50 killowat hours used per month will only cost 10c per k. w. h. as the old rate was IIc. This is a saving of lc per k. w. h. The next 200 k. w. h. takes a rate of 7 1-2c per k, w. h. The old rate was 9c






