





lcup butter 1 2-3 cup sugar

2 cups flour 5 eggs

Cream the butter and sugar Add the egg one at a time, beating vigorously after each egg is and beat well. Bake in a moderate oven about 40 minutes

#### PEANUT BUTTER DIVINITY

2 egg whites 2 cups sugar

1\_2 cup syrup 1-2 cup water

Peanut butter

Put the sugar, water and syrup into a sauce pan and stir until dissolved Boil until the syrup makes a soft ball when dropped in cold water. Pour one half over ping Put other beating constantly. half back in stove and boil until hard ball is formed when dropped into cold water. Pour this over first part, and beat until creamy.
