





Repellent Washes That .

paint, various oils, and other sub stances, are often recommended as been applied.

Such substances as paint, coal tar. gas tar, axle grease, concentrated offs, and combinations of such materials do serious injury to the tree tstand even cause) the trees to die. To be on the safe side, the grower should not use such substances, as there are others which may be used with as good results without danger of harm, If repellent or desired, use whitewash, soap suds, or dormant strength lime-sulphur and add lead arsenate at the rate of about two pounds to 50 gallons. These washes may be applied with a spray-er, which will faillitate the work. Greater concentrations may be made and the repellents applied by means of an ordinary paint brush. There is little or no danger of these washes doing injury to tree trunks no matter when or how applied .- Exchange, Best Pig Management If at all possible, the farrowing places for pigs should be out in clean pastures. These pigs should be left in these clean pastures as long as there is any green feed available. There are three reasons why this kind of pig management is advisable: R prevents the pigs becoming infested with worms; it reduces the possible losses from anemia; and it helps to give the pigs a good start before winter weather necessitates their being more closely confined in central hog houses and under dry lot feeding condistons. As a rule, winter rations are more or less deficient in nutritive values. It is not quite fair to young pigs to put them on rations of this kind in addition to their already having a poor start .--- Hoard's Dairyman.

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



Move for "Better Stock" The basic idea of the "Better Sires Better Stock" campaign is that the pure-bred sires will "grade up" and improve the flocks and herds. Give them time, and they will. But reports from the more than 17,500 stock owners who have enrolled show that many of them want to hasten the improvethent. They know they can do se by equiring pure-bred females.

The latest figures showing improvement of live stock, as reported to the Department of Agriculture, reveal that on these 17,500 farms where there are no scrub or grade sires there are, on an average, for every pure-bred sireincluding cattle, horses, swine, sheep, and goats-six pure-bred females, two ross-bred females, nine grade females, and less than half a scrub female.

e 18 no x by us-Occasionally, follow the It also was fowl p thy flocks are not found that un good subjects for immunization with pigeon pox vaccine. Complete protection was not established in all flocks vaccinated with the pigeon pox product in 1932, but in general the results were satisfactory.

Vaccination should be restricted to flocks in which the disease occurred during the previous year. All fawls vaccinated with fowl pox vaccine should be placed in voluntary quarantine for two months. Chickens suffering from any other disease should not be vaccinated.

Polish Fowls Are Good ' for Show and Utility

Leading in number of varieties of Continental-European poultry are the Polish fowls-White Crested Black, Silver, White, Buff-Laced, Non-Bearded Golden, Silver and White and Bearded Golden. Except for the lack of a "beard" or "whiskers" represented by feathers on the throat, the non-bearded are the same as the bearded in all other standard requirements.

All the Polish varieties have an unusual appeal to the chicken fancier and a backyard farmer may be attracted first to such fowls by their unusual plumage, although they really have utility value.

There is considerable doubt about the origin of the Polish fowl, although it probably originated in Poland. Dutch poultry fanciers in the Eightsenth ceptury were instrumental in perfecting the crest. In type, the Pollah is much like the Leghorn. It was formerly very common in the United States, but with the increase in the popularity of the Leghorn, Interest in the Polish waned, although it still holds a place as an ornamental fowl .----Los Angeles Times.

Feed Wheat by Hand Feeding of corn and oats and laying mash in hoppers and hand-feeding wheat at the rate of four to six pounds per hundred hens dally, is a new method of feeding that promises to be practical for corn-belt farms, states Paul G. Riley, Indiana poultryman. The wheat is higher in price than other grains, and when hopper-fed is likely to be used in too heavy proportions to other grains. An added advantage in handfeeding is that the hens will keep the litter stirred up, whereas it is likely to he packed down in houses where hopper-feeding is practiced exclusivev. -- Prairie Farmer.

There are four reasons in this article another one will follow next week

"I Because the applicant wants what amounts to a capital loan. Only occasionally do we have a loan application from someone who wants capital to start a brand new business venture. But we constantly have requests for loans to help revive old business-loans which if made, would amount to capital loans because the principal security back of them would be hope.

"Examination of such an applicant's financial situation usually shows that he has insufficient assets to warrant a true commercial loan; any funds advanced would, in effect. make the bank a partner in the business. For a bank to make such loans would be to gamble with its depositors' money on the success or failure of the enterprise

"Experience has abundantly proved that a commercial bank cannot safely make such loans; nor is that its function. They belong in the field of investment banking. The customer who asks a commercial bank to provide a nest_egg of capital with which to launch himself in a new enterprise or to try to restore an old one should not blame his bank if he is refuesd. He should seek capital from those who are in the business of supplying new capital-or should accumulate it himself by saving.



Stamford, Texas, May 30 One hundred towns and cities of West Texas are expected to send


