### HAVE ATTEMPTED TO COMPLY WITH WHEAT CONTRACT

In a conference with Mr. John R. Edmonds, Special Agent of the Wheat Section for Texas, on Monday June 11th, County Agent, Glen A Lindsey obtained the following information of interest to the wheat growers of Floyd County.

I. If a producer has harvested his wheat before it was measured by the supervisors there is no reason for him to be alarmed if he has attempted to comply with his contract If it is found that he has harvested a small excess acreage of wheat by mistake he may comply with his contract by furnishing the County Allotment Com mittee an affidavit that he will feed the wheat from this excess acreage at home This rule applies to a small overrun which would come within the limits of accuracy of measuring the land. If the producer has harvested a large excess acreage of wheat he will either have to destrop the cancelled --- x ... x

... Harvesting of wheat is getting well underway in the Lockney country this week. Combines are running in almost every wheat field, and by Saturday night thing will be humming All roads lead\_ ing to elevators are lined with wheat trucks hanling the golden grain. Elevator men at Lockney. Barwise, Sterley, South Plains; Whitely, Muncy and Aiken report plenty of wheat moving to their elevators.

The weather has been good for harvest, although threatening clouds prevails each night but blows over without doing any damage, however, it keeps wheat farmers on the "anxious Seat" for fear that a hail storm might visit this section of the country.
