407 BALES OF COTTON GINNED IN LOCKNEY AND AIKEN TERRITORY
According to a recent report from the Lockney Gin Company, Patterson Gin Company, and the Aiken Gin Company, 407 bales of cotton have been ginned in this trade territory during the season thus far, which includes the last month. Last week was believed to be a better week for cotton ginning than this week. The weather has been a little damp the past four days and prevents the gathering of the crop to some extent.
Lockney Gin reports 145 bales during the season, Patterson Gin 110 bales, and the Aiken Gin 152 bales.

500 HEAD OF CATTLE TO BE BOUGHT IN COUNTY
94 Head To Be Bought Here Friday and Saturday
There will be 500 more head of cattle bought in Floyd County and precinct 2, Friday and Saturday of this week making a total of 7,155 head bought in the county. There will be 94 head bought here in Lockney beginning at 8 a. m. Friday, October 19.
Roseland is allowed 68 head and they will be bought Friday morning. Liberty, 31 head Friday, Center 22 head Friday, and Fairview 50, Friday.
30 head was bought at Sterley today, 54 at Lone Star, 25 at Providence, 25 at Prairie Chapel, 40 at Irick, 36 at Pleasant Valley and 27 at Muncy.

FREIGHT RATES ON FEED, LIVESTOCK REDUCED IN TEXAS
The Interstate Commerce commission has authorized railroads serving 21 western and southwestern states to reduce rates on feed and livestock in drouth areas.
The authorization covers the counties in the various states which were subject to the deducted rates in effect prior to September 1. The rates expired at that time and the railroads refused to renew them.
At conferences, however, between department of agriculture officials, Commissioner Clyde E. Aitchison and railroad officials an agreement was reached that rates on feed should be reduced until April 30, 1935, and upon livestock until December 31, 1934.

Rates on hay, alfalfa, millet, soy bean hay and cow pea hay are to be 66.23 per cent of the hay rate and for other types of feed 50 per cent of the hay rate.
Rates on livestock to feeding points will be 85 per cent of the fat livestock rate on the kind of livestock shipped. When the stock is returned to the drouth area the rate will be 15 per cent of the fat stock rate. These rulings effect Texas and 21 other states.

LOCAL FERA HAS NEW CASE RECORD WORKER
Sanitation Project Nearing Completion; Will Begin Beautification of City Auditorium
Miss Clara Gunn was appointed Tuesday by Clifford Rhoads, County Administrator, as the new case record worker replacing Mrs. Bill Downs, who has served in that place the last eight months. Miss Gunn will begin work Friday morning. Albert Sherrill is the relief officer and has been working about two months with Mrs. Downs, having taken the place of Joe Nall.
Sherrill said the sanitation project, under the supervision of J. B. Allen, would soon be over and the project of beautifying the city auditorium and grounds will begin within the next two weeks with the American Legion, Landrum Post No. 141, supervising the program. During the sanitation project something like 50 men were employed and it is estimated that at least 350 working days will be required to finish the beautification program. This will give work to those men who are unemployed and should receive the commendation of every citizen in the community.
Through the PWA funds an amount approximating \$1,325 will be secured to completely break, level, and properly drain the entire block on which the auditorium is located. The ground not used as a football field and baseball diamond will be sown in blue grass. Something like 200 trees will be planted around the property and one or two wire fences erected to protect the improvements. Fifty or more shrubs will be planted to properly land

HUNTING SEASON CUT TO 3 DAYS A WEEK
The Texas Game, Fish and Oyster commission has fixed a shooting season of three days a week from October 25 to December 30 for Ducks and other migratory water fowl. Shooting days will be Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.
The season conformed with federal regulations. Authority for the commission to prescribe the seasons was granted by an act passed at the recent special session of the legislature.
Bag limits set were: Ducks, 12 of all kinds, but not more than five of either eider, canvasback, red head, greater scaup, lesser scaup, ringneck, blue wing teal, green wing teal, cinnamon tale, shoveller and gadwall; geese and brant, four; coot 25; Wilson and Jack snipe 20. Possession was limited to two days quota of any variety.
Hunting hours will be from sunrise to sunset.
It is absolutely necessary for anyone hooting a gun while hunting water fowls to own and have in their possession a duck stamp which can be procured at any post office. The sum of \$1.00 will be charged for the stamp. This money goes to the government to be used in swamp lands in providing breeding places for water fowls. You must have duck stamp whether you hunt in your own pond. The penalty for not having a duck stamp is \$10.00 per year in the state, or both. In case heretofore with accord you must have a hunt

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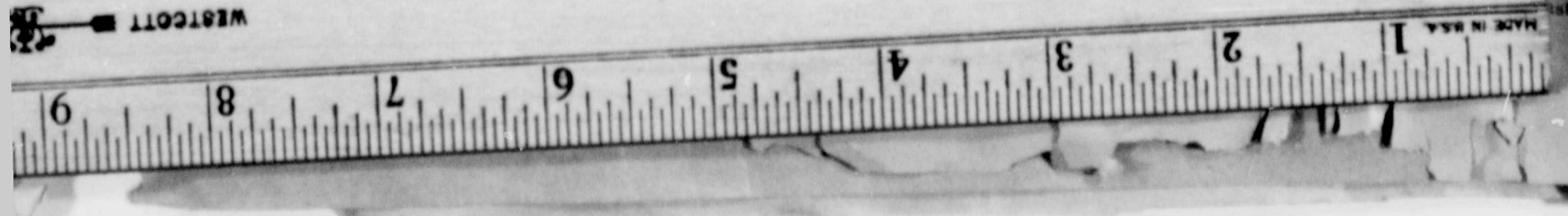

Clark, former County judge, at the Floyd County Pioneers' Association held at Floydada May 28, 1934, celebrating the 44th anniversary of the organization of the county. This talk will appear in the paper every week until the conclusion of the speech. Owing to the lack of space the entire talk will not appear. It is as follows:
Time in its ceaseless flight has brought us again to the full leaf and flower of another summer; to this memorable 28th day of May, 1934. Since last we met, the grass has grown green again above the slumbering dust of heroic pioneers; the roses have twined

congratulate you on being here with us to-day, on this the 44th anniversary of the organization of our county; this glorious day, this historic day, this happy day happy to you, happy to me, happy to us all. This vast gathering of people here to-day is an eloquent expression of the high esteem in which you are held. GOOD THINGS TO EAT

Don't You Cry
You can sometimes avoid weeping when you peel onions. Hold the hands under running water or immerse them under the surface of a pan of water while cutting off the dry outer layers of skin; this dissolves the irritating juices of the outer skin and makes the operation less tearful.

As for the "aftermath," remember that cooked onions are not guilty! Try them in these delicious dishes, and find out why such strong arguments are advanced in their favor.

Cream of Onion Soup
2 tbsps. rice
2 medium sized onions.
2 tbsps. mazelo
1 cup water
1 teasp. meat extract or a bouillon cube
3 cups milk
Salt and pepper.

Chop the onions and cook in the mazelo until slightly pellow. Add the water, rice and meat extract or bouillon cube. Cook until the rice and onions are tender. Add the milk, reheate, and season with pepper. This makes four servings; it will be found that rice much improves this soup.

Glazed Onions
