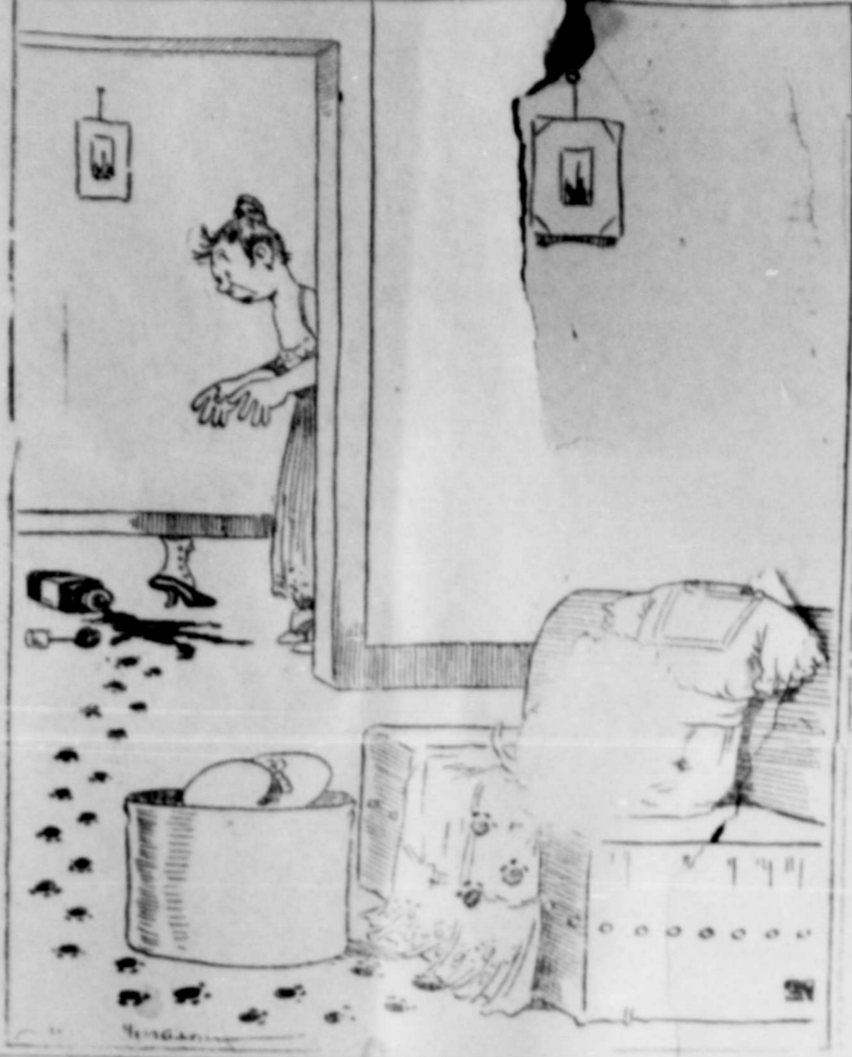

GOOD THINGS TO EAT

Pork Chops in Casserole
 6 pork chops
 2 tbs. flour
 1-4 tsp. salt
 1-4 tsp. pepper
 2 cups tomatoes
 Select chops 1-2 inch thick. Heat frying pan and brown the chops. Transfer to casserole. Sprinkle with flour and pepper. Add tomatoes and rice mixture as follows: 1/2 cup salt, 2 cups cooked rice, 1/2 cup butter, 3 tbs. chopped onion, 2 tbs. chopped green pepper, 1-2 tsp. salt, 1-2 tsp. pepper. Mix ingredients and add to casserole. Cover and bake 1-2 hours in moderate oven. Serve in dish in which it is baked.

Liver Sausage
 1 liver weighing 3 lbs.
 1-2 lbs. fat pork
 6 or 8 tsp. pepper
 2 small onions
 1-2 tsp. thyme
 Pinch of paporam
 Remove membrane from liver and cut away large blood vessels. Soak in water 2 hours to draw out

Carrot Salad
 1 cup grated carrots
 1 cup grated pineapple
 1-4 cup nuts
 1 tsp. vinegar
 1 pkg. orange jello
 Dissolve jello as directed on the package. When cool, add carrots, pineapple, nuts and vinegar. Place in a refrigerator and chill until firm.

Pea Salad
 1 No. 1 can peas, drained
 2 apples, diced
 3 pimientoes, cut fine
 1-4 lb. cheese, chopped
 Mix together with salad dressing and serve on lettuce.

We're expecting a real treat Friday from the ninth and tenth grades, since they have charge of the assembly program.

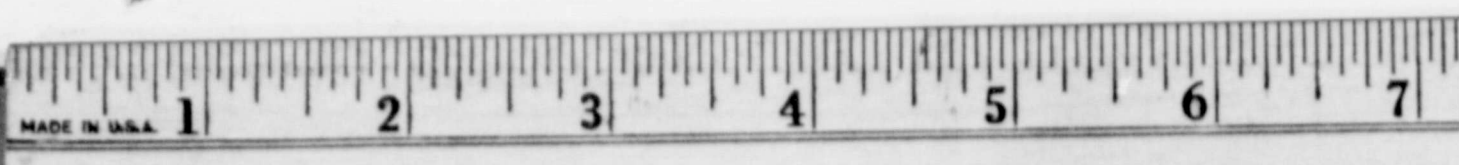

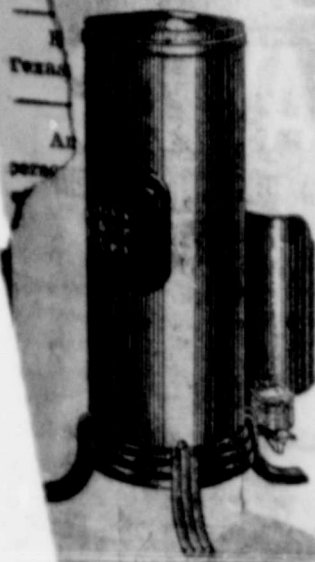
FIRST DOLLAR PAID ON SCHOLASTIC AID
 Remittance of the first dollar in the state's \$16.50 appropriation of aid for each Texas scholastic in the 1934-35 school year was started Saturday.
 Revised census rools showed 1,560,511 enumerated scholastics, a decrease of 15,141 from last year's total. Elimination of persons ineligible for the aid and of duplicated names effected the decrease.

Poultry Topics

Brooding Period Is Always Most Critical Time.

Getting the poult through the brooding period into free range is the most difficult job in turkey raising, and this requires management and clean sanitation.

The first requirement for a successful hatch with turkeys is the use of strictly fresh eggs," says C. J. Maupin, extension poultryman at North Carolina State college.

When turkey hens are confined to a small range or yard, the eggs must be gathered twice each day and then stored in a well-ventilated room or cellar where the temperature is not over 60 degrees. It is better to set the eggs when only seven to eight days old, whether a hen or incubator is used. When poult are first hatched they are less active than chicks and must be kept warm. The temperature in the brooder house needs to be kept around 90 degrees for several days."

Maupin says the homemade brick brooder may be used for poult, but it is well to make some wire partitions in the house to separate the ages.

Feeding the poult is about the same as for baby chicks. Hard-boiled eggs with some of the shell left in has worked out well for the first feed. Give one egg to each twenty poult. Water should be given at 36 hours, and the first chick starter or chick scratch given by the second day. Sour skim milk may be added when the poult are from 36 to 48 hours old and then kept before them thereafter at all times.

Maupin also suggests gradual changes in feed as the birds grow older, and then when they are ready for the range, the ration may be simplified and reduced to whatever grains are available on the farm.

Poultry Meat Deserves Attention and Thought

The production of poultry meat deserves more attention and thought if the maximum profits are to be derived above the labor and feed costs. The different breeds of chickens vary in the ultimate size of the body at maturity. Valuable data have been found in an analysis of the production of the live and dressed meat, with detailed stock representation of four different types compared.

FORCED PULLET IS NOT BEST PRODUCER

Should Have Time to Develop Necessary Stamina.

"Pullets should be given every opportunity to develop normally without being forced, in order that they may have the body vigor to withstand a long and continuous period of heavy egg production," says O. C. Ufford, extension poultryman for the Colorado agricultural college.

"It is not good practice," he adds, "to force growth by the use of a heavy protein diet over the entire growing period.

"Birds that have received such a diet will start laying a month or three weeks earlier than the normal maturing period for the breed, but they will not have the body growth that enables them to stand up under heavy production over a long period of time."

For pullets on a summer range, a growing mash of ground grains containing 10 per cent meat scraps and 5 per cent bone meal is suggested. This may be kept before them all the time in outdoor hoppers. The hoppers should be so constructed that very little mash can be wasted, and the hoppers should never be allowed to go empty, it is stated.

This growing mash may be kept before the pullets until they are three or four months old, depending on their development. Then, in order to prevent too rapid development, the percentage of meat scraps may be greatly reduced by adding ground oats or barley, corn meal or bran to the growing mash mixture. Reduction of the animal food allows the pullets to grow and develop without stimulating the growth of the egg-producing organs.

"This method of handling pullets enables them to put on body weight and fat, and when they come into winter production they will be able to produce steadily because of their vigor and vitality," Ufford explains.

Too Much Sunshine Is Not Good for Chickens

While sunshine is necessary in the development of chicks, one should not overlook the fact that during the hot summer months protection from the hot sun is absolutely necessary. One reason why late hatched chicks fail to thrive is because of failure to keep them supplied with shade. Chicks that are compelled to remain in a close

...not cool in the heat of summer because of no other protection are not getting the best possible treatment. The air under shade trees is fresher and cooler; there is less danger from mites and they are closer to green food and insect life.

If summer shade is not provided by trees and bushes the next best thing to do is to plant patches of sunflowers or corn. It is of course necessary to keep the chicks away from it until it gets a fair start. After the plants have grown to a sufficient height, chickens can run in them with practically no injury to the crop. In fact, there is no objection to growing a crop of chickens and corn on the same piece of ground. This can be easily done by erecting temporary fences and confining the chicks to a portion of the yard or it may mean the removal of the chickens to new yards more suitable for summer growth. On the farm this latter method can usually be employed.—Missouri Farmer.

Feather Pulling

The feather-pulling habit is usually caused by overcrowding. Another cause is the taste of blood, which may result from accident or disease. When hens, and especially roosters taste blood they become part cannibal. Feather pulling is the natural result for the birds soon find that there is a drop of blood at the bottom of the quill they pull, and they have been known to practically eat a weak member of the flock alive. The best remedy is to kill the cannibals and segregate the victims as soon as it is seen that they cannot protect themselves. Out of door exercise and change of feed will do much to stop the trouble.—Montreal Herald.

Curing Sealy Leg

The shanks and upper surfaces of the toes of fowls are protected by horny overlapping scales. A little mite, called by scientists "Sirocoptes mutans," has a habit of burrowing under these scales, causing irritation and making the feet sore. Its presence is detected by the loosening of the scales and accumulation of crusty matter under them. The condition is corrected by dipping the feet in a mixture of linseed and kerosene oils, equal parts, or by anointing with vasoline.

Rhode Island Red Bantam

The general rules and practices applied to the raising of "large" poultry held good in handling the Bantams, also. Cull Out Weaklings

When putting chicks out on the range it is a good plan to discard everyone that as you handle it seems to you to be notably below the average of the lot in substance and vitality. The tendency is to keep any which are regarded as having a chance to grow to marketable size. This is done with the idea that if one eventually gets something for such a chick, he is better off than if he killed it at this stage. "While there's life, there's hope," may be a good motto in some things but not in managing hens and chickens. If one will keep the weaklings, let him put them in a flock by themselves, away from the others, and keep a separate account of their food and of what they bring when sold.

Eggs With Watery Whites

When eggs are discovered to have watery whites and weak yolks after a heavy laying period, the exhausted condition of the egg-producing organs is the basic reason for a poultry expert. In the spring there is a tendency for eggs to be watery. Due to the increased drainage and excessive feed consumption. A properly balanced ration in addition to the green feed should be fed in all cases, especially during the spring months. The feeding schedule should be strictly followed.

Extremes in Poultry

The common weight of fowls is from 8 to 9 pounds for hens and 11 to 12 for roosters. The smallest bantam females weigh less than one pound. Ducks and geese have been known to weigh 10 and 17 pounds each. Neither the very small nor the very large specimens have anything to recommend them but their rarity. The smallest bantams are the poorly developed specimens of breeds in which adult females of good type weigh from 11 to 12 pounds.

SUICIDE END OF JOE HAWKINS; BEAT DEATH IN FOUR TRIALS

Jury Finally Acquitted Him Of Slaying Father-In-Law In 1929 Over Dog-Fight

Through four trials for murder Joe Hawkins of Ralls, vigorously defended his life and liberty. In the end he won an acquittal.

But death, which the state had asked in its first trial of Hawkins and which the jury refused to give, came to the erst-while defendant Saturday. He shot himself in the head with a .38 caliber pistol at his home six miles north of Ralls.

Angered because one of his children had broken a window pane, so Justice of the Peace S. J. Bennett of Ralls was told during an inquiry, Hawkins killed himself. Peace Justice Bennett's verdict was death by self inflicted gunshot.

The suicide was five years and five days after Hawkins had shot and killed his elderly father-in-law after a dispute over a dog fight.

At the first trial, Hawkins drew a 20 year sentence. He appealed to the state court. At the second trial at Plainview, a jury favored his plea of self-defense and freed him. That was in January, 1933.

Funeral rites for Hawkins, who was 42 years old, were conducted at Ralls at 5 p. m. Sunday. He was survived by his widow, three brothers, and seven children.

 6 pork chops
 2 tbsp. flour
 1-2 tsp. salt
 1-4 tsp. pepper
 2 cups tomatoes
 Select chops 1-2 inch thick.
 Heat frying pan and quickly brown the chops. Transfer to casserole. Sprinkle with flour, salt, and pepper. Add tomatoes and rice mixture as follows:

 Mix ingredients and add to casserole above. Cover and bake 1 1/2 hours in moderate oven. Serve in dish in which it is baked.

Do not fill casings too full, as they might break while cooking. Cook for an hour in water deep enough to float the sausage.

Polish Fowls Are Good for Show and Utility

Leading in number of varieties of Continental-European poultry are the Polish fowls—White Crested Black, Silver, White, Buff Laced, Non Bearded Golden, Silver and White and Bearded Golden. Except for the lack of a "beard" or "whiskers" represented by feathers on the throat, the non-bearded are the same as the bearded in all other standard requirements.

All the Polish varieties have an unusual appeal to the chicken fancier and a backyard farmer may be attracted first to such fowls by their unusual plumage, although they really have utility value.

There is considerable doubt about the origin of the Polish fowl, although it probably originated in Poland. Dutch poultry fanciers in the eighteenth century were instrumental in perfecting the breed. In type, the Polish is much like the Leghorn. It was formerly very common in the United States, but with the increase in the popularity of the Leghorn, interest in the Polish waned, although it still holds a place as an ornamental fowl.—Los Angeles Times.

Feed Wheat by Hand

Feeding of corn and oats and laying mash in hoppers and hand-feeding wheat at the rate of four to six pounds per hundred hens daily, is a new method of feeding that promises to be practical for corn-belt farms, states Paul G. Riley, Indiana poultryman. The wheat is higher in price than other grains, and when hoppers-fed is likely to be used in too heavy proportions to other grains. An added advantage in hand-feeding is that the hens will keep the

Lice on Poultry

Lice do not feed on blood like red mites but eat dried skin or bits of feather, writes a correspondent in the Indiana Farmer's Guide. They may eat blood from small skin wounds but do not suck the blood like red mites. The lice are constantly crawling over the skin both day and night and cause much discomfort to the hens. Hens are nervous sensitive birds and probably suffer more from lice than is commonly realized.

Eggs Must Be Eggs

It seems, just have to be eggs in Connecticut, under a bill passed in the house of the general assembly. Under the terms of the measure eggs must be designated as "fresh eggs," "cold storage eggs," "preserved eggs" or "incubated eggs." However, the bill adds, if an egg does not conform to any of these classifications, but still is wholesome and edible, it may be designated merely as "egg."

Seneca county (Ohio) poultry raisers had a record of 1,800,000 eggs marketed last year.

VACCINATION WILL CHECK POX LOSSES

Plan Recommended to Owners of Diseased Flocks.

Vaccinating young chickens against chicken pox is now a proven way for farmers to protect the cash income from poultry, according to the laboratory of animal pathology and hygiene, College of Agriculture, University of Illinois. Poultry and eggs now bring in about 11 per cent of the cash income of Illinois farmers, but the total would be even higher were it not for the outbreaks of chicken pox and other barriers to the production of high quality products, it was pointed out. The disease also is known as canker sore mouth or avian diphtheria. Routine vaccination is recommended to all owners of flocks on infected premises as a result of a two year study by the laboratory. Either fowl pox or pigeon pox vaccine can be used. It was demonstrated that there is no danger of causing chicken pox by using pigeon pox vaccine. Occasionally, however, serious results follow the use of fowl pox vaccine. It also was found that unhealthy flocks are not good subjects for immunization with pigeon pox vaccine. Complete protection was not established in all flocks vaccinated with the pigeon pox product in 1932, but in general the results were satisfactory. Vaccination should be restricted to flocks in which the disease occurred during the previous year. All fowls vaccinated with fowl pox vaccine should be placed in voluntary quarantine for two months. 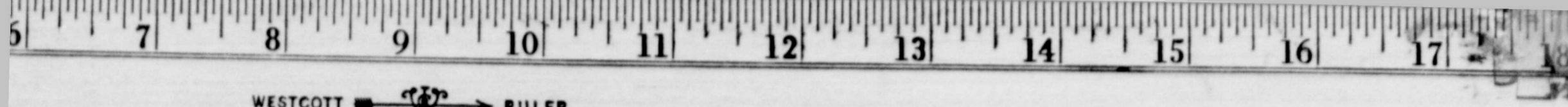
