On the Federal program for consideration when the new Congress meets is a much bigger and broader scheme of public works than has yet been announced, financed partly by Government loans to localities, partly by direct Government grants of money. The theory is that if the Government spends a billion dollars it will create four or five times as much work for the unemployed. Nobody knows yet, because the Administration's plans are not complete, how big this new Public Works program will be. There is talk of "five billion a year for five years," but that is only talk thus far. How to do this and keep on with the other lines of work in which Uncle Sam is spending money, without resorting to currency inflation, is keeping some of the financial and economic experts awake at night. There has been, of course, a great inflation of credit, worked by the same system that was used during the war. The Government sells its bonds to a bank, taking a deposit credit on the bank's books for the price paid. The bank then can, in turn, when in need of currency, "hook" the bonds with the Federal Reserve Bank and get brand-new Federal Reserve notes, which, in effect, have nothing back of them but the Government's promise to pay, represented by its bonds.

One hears quite a lot these days about Old Age Pension plans. Clubs are being organized over the country and donations made to a national organization to push an old age pension bill through the National Congress. The Townsend Plan seems to be the favorite plan of almost all of our people that have or soon will reach the age of 60 years. Perhaps the reason for looking on the Townsend Plan with favor is because his plan recommends a pension of \$200 per month. Dr. Townsend, author of the proposed bill makes his home in California. We are sure that we will have some kind of old age pension legislation enacted at the coming session of Congress, but it will not be \$200 per month, that is too much money to be paid out in the way of a pension. In reality, our people do not wish to draw a pension from our Government when they reach the age of 60 years, but instead want an opportunity to accumulate sufficient funds by work and planning to keep them in their old age, that makes them independent and independence makes good citizens. We do not believe it such a fine idea to become all excited about going to draw a pension of \$200 per month right away. That is a lot of money, it sure is.

Huey Long of Louisiana thinks he is some powerful fellow. He has just about done all the mischief he can down in his own state and has practically all of the people eating out of his hand, so now he thinks he would make a jam-up good president of the United States. He is mad-crazy and somebody will have to stop him, and sooner or later that will happen. He is a nuisance in the halls of Congress and keeps up a continual hullaboo that never amounts to anything.

There was only one farmer in Crockett county and a bear killed him the other day. The bears have been chasing the farmers for a good many years and if it wasn't for the bulls they would have starved every farmer to death. This Crockett man was keeping this bear around the place for a pet, but you can't make a house-cat out of a bear.

It looks as if Sam Rayburn has the inside track in the race for speakership of the House of Representatives at Washington. Marvin Jones, who kinder had a hankering for the job, has withdrawn and will support Rayburn. If Sam lands this speakership job, we will have several Texas boys "riding herd" at Washington, and they are making good top-hand too.

The Administration's relations with organized labor are beginning to show signs of shifting. The Federation of labor is not pulling such a strong oar as it seemed to a few months ago. There is a tendency toward conciliation of labor disputes, which was not apparent last Spring. A noteworthy example is the ease with which the troubles between the unions and the Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company were adjusted. Less emphasis is now being placed by the Administration upon the importance of raising wages and prices, and more upon the desirability of selling goods at prices that will move them and putting and keeping people at work at the best wages industry can afford, under depression conditions, to pay.

1000 pounds of potatoes and will apply not only relief roll families but also the transient bureau of the state.

Distribution will be made on the basis of 30 pounds per family of five per month, large families receiving more, small families less. C. Z. ### NEW FARM CENSUS TO BE TAKEN JANUARY 1ST.

Starting promptly on Jan. 1 next American farmers are again to have their noses counted. The department of Agriculture will take a complete census of rural life, and some say it will be the most important enumeration since the custom was introduced away back in 1840.

Farm families around Lockney who want to better their condition will cooperate heartily in this new undertaking, for legislation designed to bring them better prices will be based on what is revealed. One hundred questions will be asked by the enumerators when they bring around the 1935 census blanks, though not all will apply to every farmer. They will cover ownership and acreage, with special attention to crop land, pasture land and woodland. They will want to know the total value of the farm, acreage and yield of crops and vegetables; number of trees; value of nut crops; number and value of livestock; what the farmer makes from his poultry and eggs; what is the size of his family.

Work of picking enumerators is now under way, the preference being given farmers, their sons, wives and daughters. It is promised that all information and figures will be kept confidential and no individual figures used in any way for taxation purposes. It promises toward need farm legislation to be the most important step ever undertaken and the results

to come from it are certain to prove beneficial to every farm family in the United States.

### MAKERS OF AUTOMOBILES TO PUT LESS STRESS ON SPEED

Will Talk About Safety Features, Low Center Of Gravity, Ease of Control, Etc.

We understand that the makers of the 1935 automobiles will put less stress on the speed of which their cars are capable and more on such features as unshatterable glass, low center gravity, reliability of breaks and ease of control, as well as economy in gas and oil consumption. It seems to us that necessary in the matter of speed, they have gone about as far as is there are few, if any, cars now on the market that cannot be pushed up to 60 or more miles an hour. And for most drivers on most roads that is faster than considerations of safety warrant.

There is a steadily growing number of fatal automobile accidents, as the speed of cars increases and the mileage of hard-surfaced roads multiplies. Most of these accidents are unnecessary. Leaving out consideration the fools who try to drive after they have had a few drinks, there is an irresistible temptation, particularly to the young and reckless, to step on the gas when the road ahead seems clear, regardless of what may be approaching from the crossroads.

Some bright fellow remarked that the weakest point of every car is "the nut that holds the

steering wheel". Even the most careful driver has to deal with the "nut" who may be driving another car on the same road.

As Winter sets in the risk of driving is increased. Careful analysis of some thousands of motoring accidents shows that more of them occur between daylight and dark, in the twilight hours, than either in broad daylight or after dark. Headlights do little but confuse in the half-light just after the sun has set, and the driver's instinct is not to rely on them.

We think that the greatest room for improvement in automobiles is the matter of headlights. The genius who will discover a way to light one's own road without blinding approaching drivers has a fortune waiting for him to pick up:

The Rice Pilau, the Glazed Apples and the Date Fondue may be baked all at one and the same time—and with the same amount of heat (that helps make it economical). The grapefruit cocktail may be the juice of the segments of canned Florida grapefruit which require no previous preparation except chilling. The romaine or lettuce salad takes but a minute, and you may buy your beets already pickled. Here are the recipes.
1-2 teasp. salt
1-2 cup sugar
1 cup pasteurized dates
1-2 teasp. vanilla
3 egg whites
Scald the milk in a double boiler. Add the bread crumbs, butter, beaten egg yolks, salt and sugar. Cook until the mixture thickens. Cool. Add the dates (cut) and snaila and fold in the stiffly beat egg whites last. Pour into greased custard cups. Place cups in a pan of hot water and bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven 350 degrees F. until the custard will not cling to a silver knife. Serve with lemon sauce.
Other Oven Dishes
Pineapple Sweet Potato
Parboil sweet potatoes; peel. Cut into slices about 1/2 inch thick; arrange a layer of potatoes in an oiled baking dish, cover with a layer of thinly sliced pineapple, then another layer of potatoes. Dot with butter and pour over about 1-2 cup dark karo. Bake in a moderate oven 375 degrees F. until glazed and brown.
