CITY OF PLAINVIEW LOSES SUIT AGAINST TEXAS UTILITIES CO.

Was Suing For \$70,000 Claimed In Penalties For Failure To Make Reports.

A decision in favor of the defendant was rendered last Friday by Judge W. E. Gee, of the 106th district court, presiding on the 64th court bench at Plainview in the \$70,000 damage suit of the City of Plainview vs. Texas Utilities Company.

Thirteen special exceptions to the plaintiff's supplemental petition were overruled by the court. The plaintiff, excepted to the court's judgment and took the case to the state supreme court.

The chief clerk of the court... Plaintiff was ordered to pay the costs of court. Both sides waived a jury and presented the case to the court Judge Gee presiding for Judge R. C. Joiner, 64th court judge who was disqualified on the grounds of his participation in the case as an attorney before he became judge.

### SCOUTING BIRTHDAY

February reminds us that the Boy Scouts have had a birthday. This time it is the twenty-fifth, the Silver Anniversary, celebrating a quarter of a century of Scouting. During that time 6,530,330 boys and men have in all branches followed its happy, healthy outdoor program and committed themselves to the Grand Oath and Law, which has been described as the Sermon on the Mount in Scouting. Congratulations to America that it has Boy Scouts. The movement was originally devised as a game and is even now played in that spirit. But underneath the game, permeating every aspect of it, are the intangible permanent values of character, of loyalty, good faith, courage and service in forgetfulness of self and in the remembrance of others. "Do a good deed every day" is a motto the Boy Scouts never lose sight of. And in doing that good deed every day they set a fine example for their elders, and better equip themselves for their future place in the world.

We were indulging in the National pastime of reading the Congressional Record the other day and noticed where Senator Dieterich (Democrat) of Illinois attended a Lincoln birthday affair at the Mayflower hotel. That would have been alright, but they called on him for a speech. Well, he made a rousing Lincoln speech, it seems, and the Washington Post carried an account of the address, and of course all the other Democratic Senators read about it. So he gets up before the Senate to explain the matter and claimed that the paper misquoted him, etc., and a fact appeared in the affair. Senator Dieterich, that is right, you need not and you Old Tack of the Amarillo News attended one of those Lincoln birthday affairs at Amarillo and did not offer an excuse or apology to any one. You were just like "Old Dog Tray" got caught and had company.

Butter and eggs are skyrocketing in price with the former going to 45c a pound and eggs two bits a dozen. This gives the farmer more money in his pocket in one sense of the word. Still you hear quite a few farmers complain. "To be sure we get more money for what we sell, but we have to pay more for what we buy." You just simply can't keep your pie and eat it too. It just don't work out that way. Farmers cannot sell their products high and buy the other fellows cheap. We will admit that both sides get a little "lop-sided" once in a while, but pretty soon everything will right itself. What we want to see is good wages paid to all those who work and good prices paid for products of the farm. Fact they should both be just a little high if we are to have prosperity as we would like and expect to see it. But, boy, howdy, that is some job. But we are gaining ground, and if you do not believe this statement take a look back down the hill to the spring and summer of 1933. Yes, those butter and egg prices are ok with us. Let 'em go higher.

Members of the House of Representatives at Washington have been complaining to President Roosevelt that patronage for the folks back home is mighty slow coming up, and that quite a few Republicans were holding jobs that should go to Democrats. A check-up has been made on the payroll of January and it has been discovered that nearly 40 instances have been discovered where clerks or secretaries with the same name as the Representatives drew January pay. In that instance it looks as if "my son John" might be on the payroll as secretary or clerk as well as a raft of other kinfolks. Still they are "griping" about no jobs to hand out to their deserving constituents. We say cut out the kinfolks if you want to get along

with the voters back home. As far as our Representative the Hon. George Mahon, is concerned, he does not have kinfolks on his payroll that we know anything about. Lloyd Croslin of Colorado is his secretary, and no kin whatever. If he has other employees, we do not know who they are.

Well that famous Gold Case has been settled. The Supreme Court handed down a decision. President Roosevelt and his New Deal administration scored another victory. The Supreme Court ruled that Congress had power to nullify promises to pay in gold contained in the bonds of private corporations. However, where its own bonds were concerned, it does not have this power, but federal bondholders have suffered no damage, and has no right at present to other than a dollar-for-dollar redemption. This all turned out just about as we told you it would in these columns three weeks ago. This decision does not affect anyone directly in this community that we know anything about. If it had been a decision on copper we would have all be affected.

It looks like we will never get rid of this Hauptmann business. Now the jurors in the case may go on the stage. There has been more publicity and more money expended on this case than any case in history. There has been several other children kidnapped and murdered since the Lindburgh incident, but you very seldom hear about those cases. Money and fame sure do command attention, more especially money. We would not travel one city block to see the jury in the Hauptmann case, they are just human beings like everybody else. If we were the Lindburghs we would put a stop to all this publicity and money making out of the death of our baby boy.

With the Bruno Hauptmann and the Gold Case out of the way, we are just wondering what the daily papers are going to do for headlines. All of the outlaws in Hamilton have been run to earth. The State Legislature or the National Congress are doing nothing to command big head lines. It sure is going to be tough on the newsboys peddling daily papers. Nothing sensational to "Cry" about.

bonds, the Treasury explained will yield the 2.0 per cent if held until their 10-year maturity. They will be sold on or about March 1, on a discount basis which means the interest will be deducted from the purchase price.

For instance, purchasers will pay \$18.75 cents for a bond of \$25 maturity value; \$37.50 for \$50 bond; \$75 for a \$100 bond; \$137.50 for a \$500 bond, and \$750 for a \$1,000 bond.

# Poultry Topics

Poultrymen have little control over basic prices of feedstuffs and eggs. Usually the best we can do is to adjust our operations to prevailing conditions. Without government subsidy, poultrymen continue to realize a comfortable profit. Some are making greater returns than others, however, because they have a greater number of profit factors working for them.

A careful study of poultry raising indicates that these various "profit factors" can be classified into about 12 distinct groups. Those making greatest returns have practically all of these factors working for them. Those making less returns are shy some of these factors. It is a fact that feed is one of the most important factors in obtaining profitable returns from a flock of chickens. First, a chick must live before we can start making a profit. Nothing can be realized if chicks do not live, and a high percentage of livability requires good feed adapted to the requirements of the chick's body. Second, sturdy normal growth is necessary if the chicks develops into a profitable bird. They cannot grow without the proper feed. To make them grow from chick to maturity, a good growing mash is essential. Third, the birds kept for layers must produce, and to get maximum production from a flock of layers they must have a well balanced egg mash.

The best feeding plan or the best feeding combination of ingredients in a mash formula is one that will give the producer the greatest net return. The use of a so-called cheap feed should be avoided, because in the long run, it is the most expensive. Price per hundred pounds is not an indication of quality nor of the results that may be expected. Profit over feed cost should be the deciding factor in making a change in a ration when deciding what feed to use. Buying feed on price alone, just to cut down on expenses is a mighty poor feeding practice. Sawdust and sand has bulk and weight and they are cheap, but how long will a hen live and lay on such a combination? This cheap feed buying is an evil that should be corrected. Be willing to pay a fair price for poultry feeds if they are backed by the integrity of the producer and based on experience, plant efficiency and scientific control.

## A MOTHER IN ISRAEL HAS FALLEN

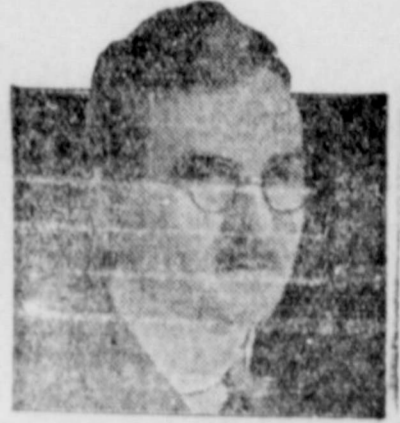

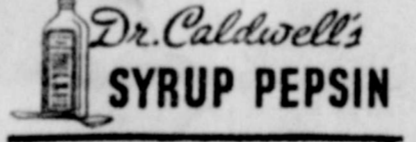
Sub-shells, or eggs with imperfect shell have practically no value in the market place. This condition may be due to the lack of vitamins or lack of the necessary minerals. Modern rations are usually complete with regard to vitamins. The important thing is to insure plenty of shell-making materials by having clean bright oyster shells or oyster shell flakes or one of the limestone products in easy access at all times. It costs only about three cents to supply a hen's shell needs for a whole year, where certain types of shellmaking material are used. The best is usually the cheapest.

More attention is required when battery started chicks are transferred to the traditional brooder quarters. They have to be trained to use the new source of heat correctly. This is the more difficult the older the chicks at the time of transfer. Chicks should not be held in batteries so long that it is necessary to transfer them directly to range conditions. Such attempts are usually fraught with disaster.—R. B. Galloway in Amarillo News.

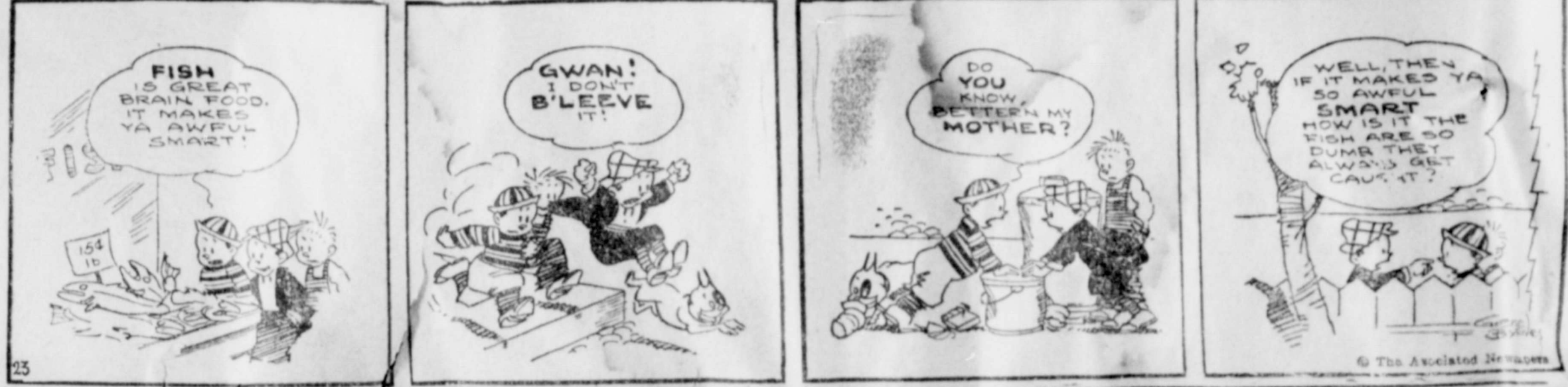

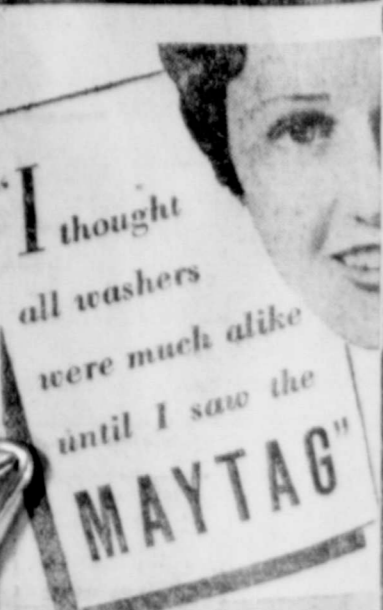
