## 87 will receive DHS diplomas

About this time every year we think that it is not only advisable, but necessary, that attention be called to the need for even more care in our driving practices and habits. There will be another danger in many forms, during the summer months, kids that is. Some will be running, some walking, some riding bicycles and some just standing there. They are probably not going anywhere in particular, nor do they expect to do anything when they get there. They are just around checking things out, with lots of time on their hands. If they all are to enjoy that abundance of time, every one of us must drive very carefully.

We are publishing pictures, and short school histories, of all the 1982 Dimmitt High School graduates in another section of the News. This is your opportunity to get acquainted with the eighty-odd seniors that are completing their public school education. While our attention is riveted on school activities during this last week of the school year, we would also call your special attention to the congratulatory advertisements, by business firms and individuals, that are always in the forefront in supporting school activities of every nature.

The battle of the national budget continues. The smart people, in charge of concocting the thing, don't seem to know what is best, or anything about it for that matter. If the smart ones can't figure it out, I guess the rest of us shouldn't even try.

One thing that might be tried, for a change, is to come up with a figure that is somewhere in everybody's ballpark. Then instead of sluffing it all out at one time to every agency, or bureau, dole it out in small doses as the need is proven. Then down toward the end of the budget year cut them off altogether to be sure they don't use up their portion of the budget. By taking the waste, stealing and skulduggery out of the administration of necessary government programs would insure a huge surplus at the end of the year that could be applied to the national debt.

There shouldn't be any sacred cows where government spending is concerned. Many of the goodies, referred to as entitlements, should be discontinued, at least for the present. Since inflation, according to statisticians, is down considerably, increases in social security and similar programs should be discontinued. There are countless numbers of retired civil service workers, military personnel, government officials, including legislative, judicial and administrative (with many double-dipping) receiving pensions, and other favors, that should be frozen, reduced or eliminated.

covered the trucks, and protected the wooden storage buildings. The funnel ripped the lean-to apart, scattered pieces of tin sheathing from it all over the farm yard and into

nearby fields. The wooden sheds were moved off of their cinder block foundations, and a hog shed behind them was also demolished.

## Tornado hits farm near Nazareth

Tornado funnels snaked out of the clouds Saturday night east of Dimmitt, and Monday night one touched down on a farm southeast of Nazareth,

demolishing several outbuildings and an elevator leg. The tornado hit the Eugene Hochstein farm, where the Tommy Wethingtons live,

only about a mile north of the Wade Mills farm which was struck by a tornado a week earlier.

Part of a series of storms

hit the area in the last week, the tornado was preceded by heavy rain and high winds, according to Mrs. Wethington.

"All of a sudden the lights went out at about 8:30 and then both the front and back doors were sucked open. I ran to shut the door, and when I looked out, all I could see in the lightning flashes was flying tin," she said.

She said she called to her husband that there was a tornado and to take the children to the basement. They were able to close the doors and started for the basement when the doors were sucked open again. "We were so fortunate the house wasn't hit, or we may never have made it to the basement," Mrs. Wethington said.

The tornado passed within about 50 feet of the house, damaging two trees and carrying off a rabbit hutch near the driveway, depositing the hutch in a cow feeding lot about 100 feet away. Apparently, the tornado

had touched down in a field northwest of the Wethington place, evidenced by some unbound round bales, and traveled in the same southeasterly direction as the tornado that had hit the nearby Mills farm a week earlier.

"The worst damage was to the lean-to, which covered some trucks and protected some wooden storage buildings. It was stripped of nearly every shred of tin sheathing and the storage buildings were knocked off of their foundations," Wethington said. He added that two hog sheds were also demolished, an elevator leg was knocked to the ground, and a gasoline tank was sent flying from its elevated stand.

"It knocked the kids' monkey bars all to pieces, but didn't touch the slide right next to it," Mrs. Wethington noted.

"I don't have any idea what the dollar amount of damage will be. It mostly just scattered things around, leaving more than it took," Wethington said.

The class song, "Time," will be performed by six seniors. Laurie Sides, Wendy Bruegel and Jay Reeve will sing while accompanied by Mark Broadstreet on piano, Paul Carroll on guitar and Brad Murdock on drums.

Pam Nelson will give the valedictory address following the song.

Supt. Robert Ryan will present the class for graduation, and School Board Chairman Charles Wales will present the diplomas.

Tim Wales will give the benediction, followed by the recessional.

Ushers will be D. D. Bishop, Shelly Frye, John David King, Kevin Cleveland, Tammy Calhoun, Amy Ross, Shawn Jackson, Dina Heard, Mike Anthony, Keith Gregory, Jeff Watts and John Smith.

Each graduating senior has 10 tickets to give to family and friends. Only those with tickets will be admitted to the commencement exercises.

## County moves to keep CETA under CAC control

Presently, the CETA (employment and training) program in Castro County is handled through the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corp. However, the county commissioners learned Monday that CETA may be taken away from Community Action unless the Dept. of Labor approves the program.

Earlier in the year, the county board approved a resolution by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and gave the PRPC the authority to handle the program here. Then on Jan. 25, the county officials were informed that Community Action had been in charge of CETA since its inception in 1973 and wanted to retain that position. The commissioners reversed their earlier resolution and decided to allow Community Action to continue its control of CETA.

"The court (county board)

should have the right to rescind any decision if it so chooses," said Herschel L. Allen, director of Community Action in Amarillo. But, he recommended that the local board communicate its official action to the Dept. of Labor for final approval.

County Attorney Jimmy Davis said there was still some confusion, but he assured the commissioners and Allen that he would write to the Dept. of Labor and send copies of the letter to PRPC and Community Action "to correct misunderstandings."

"That should settle the matter," he added. Volunteer firemen asked that the county consider purchasing a radio system for the departments in Dimmitt, Hart, Nazareth and Sunnyside including mobile units, hand-held radios, repeater and control.

"The radios we now have are outdated," Tommy Cleavinger said. "They can't be changed over."

The complete system with Motorola would cost over \$17,000, Carroll Gerber said.

The commissioners told the firemen to check further, decide what radios they could "get by with and add to later on," and to check with PRPC for possible financial assistance.

In other action, the county governing board:

—Heard requests from representatives of the Harvest Day's committee for some means to cool the Expo Building. Large floor fans, large ceiling fans or down-draft evaporative air conditioners were suggested. Other suggested improvements included painting inside the building, especially in the kitchen, and adding lights inside a quonset-hut building. The committee talked about getting a tent or awning for additional fair activities outside the Expo Building.

—Stood by its earlier decision to keep the Expo Building fee at a minimum of \$50 a day. Merton Powell of the Dimmitt Promenaders said that the club could not afford to pay that amount for each square dance that it had. The commissioners said that

the fee must be the same for everyone, without special exceptions.

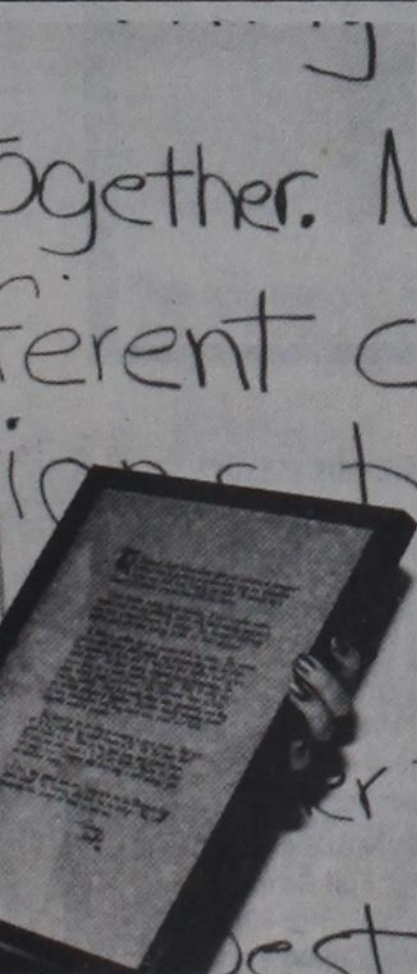
—Approved the use of the Expo Building for the muscular dystrophy telethon on Labor Day. The Castro County Lucky-7 CB Club will not have to pay a fee for building use because of the nature of the event.

—Decided not to put auto license tag money in a savings account because "it would be more trouble than it is worth" due to the low interest and high auditing charges and other expenses.

—Heard a report from County Tax Assessor-Collector Billy Hackleman that the revenue from auto license tags in the coming fiscal year could be as much as \$350,000. He also reported to commissioners on a recent state meeting of county tax assessor-collectors in Abilene.

—Heard Davis' suggestion that the justice of the peace precinct boundaries be realigned to match those of the commissioner precincts. The commissioners asked Davis to draw up a resolution to that effect for the next meeting, June 14.

—Approved the proposed installation of a telephone line along the east side of sections 12 and 21 of R. M. Thompson Addition, Block T, in southwest Castro County. The Five Area Telephone Cooperative, Inc. made the request for a buried line addition leading to a new house.

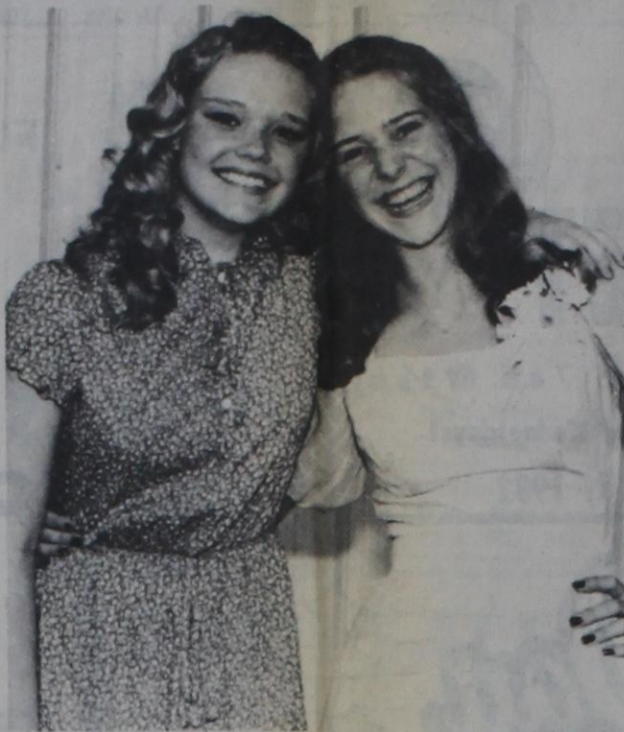

## Plan irrigation management

Before you begin another crop take a close look at your water supply. Be certain that you plan your irrigated acreage to correspond to your water supply, said Clayton Jobe, Soil Conservation Technician of Dimmitt.

It is generally more profitable to take higher yields from fewer acres than to take less yields from more acres, he added.

Plan next year's crop now as if you didn't plan to get any rain at all. Total irrigation requires about 7 GPM per acre, and vegetables or alfalfa require at least 10 GPM per acre. For example, if your irrigation well pumps 700 GPM, you should not plant more than 100 acres of grain sorghum or 70 acres of vegetables. If your field is of a permeable type soil or is not fairly level you might need to reduce your acreage accordingly, Jobe said.

Highest yields for the most economical cost are essential. Some ideas which tend to reduce cost and increase yields are:

—The steeper the slope of your land the shorter the length of irrigation run is needed.

—Often as much as 25 percent of the irrigation water you pump is lost in open ditches. This represents about 25 percent of your pumping costs, as well as reducing the acreage you can irrigate by 25 percent.

—To do a thorough job of wetting your soil often requires the wasting of lots of tailwater — often 50 percent or more of the amount pumped. A properly installed tailwater recovery system would reclaim approximately,

A total of 153 students were named to the President's List for the spring, and 242 students were named to the Dean's Honor List.

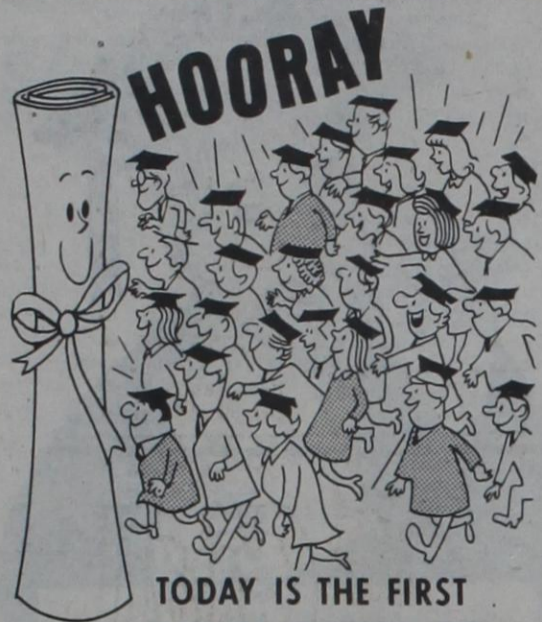

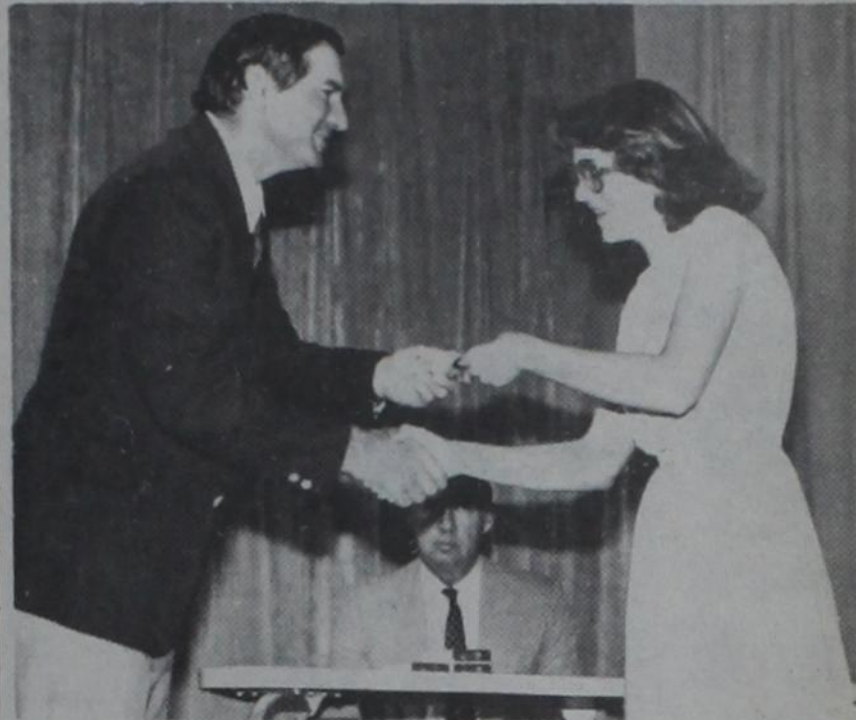

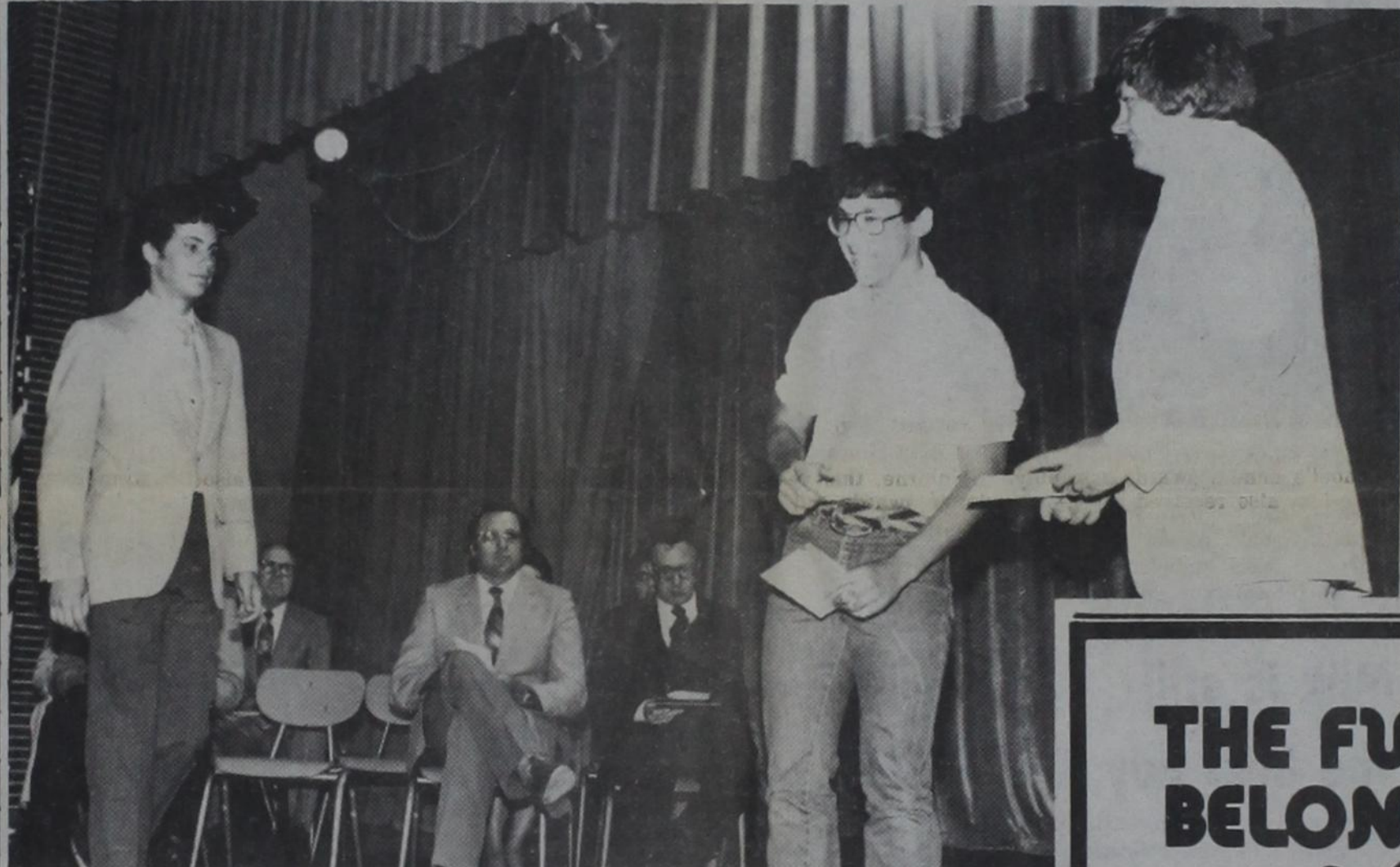

During WWII, U.S. Navy submarines operated under a news blackout and became known as "the silent service." Comprising less than 2 percent of all the military forces in action against Japan, U.S. submarines accounted for more than 60 percent of all Japanese naval, military and merchant ships sunk or destroyed by all forces combined. While doing this, our submarine forces suffered the highest losses of any military branch in action against the Japan-

ese. In addition to erecting memorials to shipmates who lost lives during WWII, preserving and displaying WWII submarines for the general public, 52 college scholarships are awarded each year to dependent children of submarine veterans, as living memorials to those 52 submarines and their crews lost during World War II.

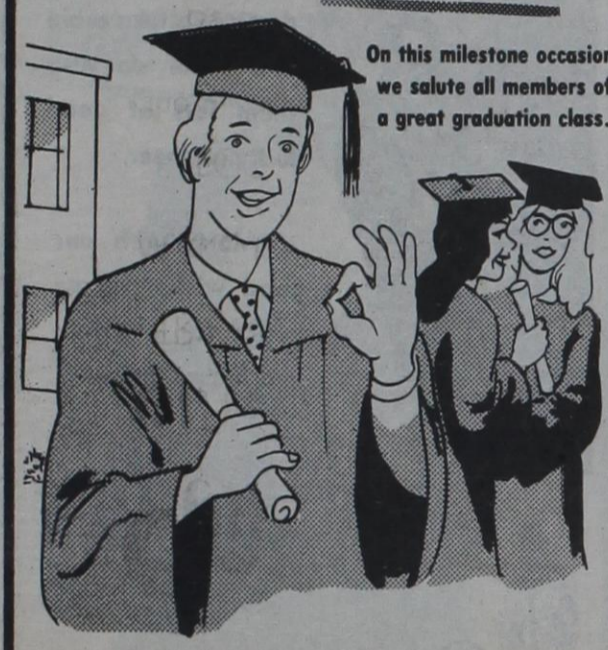

### Milk is still the best buy

Put a little milk-processing "jargon" into your collection of shopping skills, and you'll stand a better chance of getting the nutrients you want for the price you pay — without extra calories, a food and nutrition specialist said.

Modern processing techniques protect nutritive value of milk and its by-products, but different items vary in actual content of total nutrients, Mary K. Sweeten said.

Sweeten is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

Pasteurization destroys harmful bacteria in milk by partial sterilization, but it also dissolves small amounts of water-soluble vitamin C and thiamine, she explained.

Of course, a big risk is involved without pasteurization, such as in cases of drinking raw milk even though it is certified for a low bacterial count, the specialist said. Certain pathogenic (disease causing) bacteria which cause tuberculosis or other febrile-related diseases may be harbored in raw milk, she added.

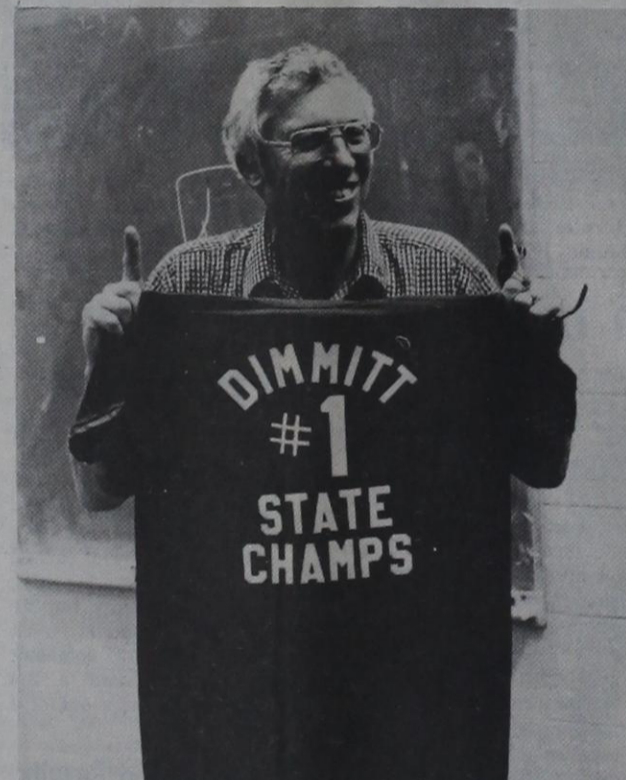
Protect milk, too, from direct sunlight, since riboflavin, an important part of the vitamin-B complex, is destroyed by light rays, Sweeten said.

Low-calorie milks, such as skim milk, non-fat or low-fat milk with no butterfat or cream also lack vitamin A, the specialist said.

True these are lower in calories — an eight-ounce glass of whole milk has 170 calories, while the same amount of skim milk has only 80 calories.

Finally, one sure way to know which products have the most nutrients for the money is shopping carefully and comparing labels and nutritional information, the specialist added.

**Social Security in Castro County**  
By JANICE GRANN



The dusty days of spring are drawing to a close. Daylight savings time has begun, and school has recessed for summer vacation. Will this be the year your child gets his or her first job?

"Do you have a social security number?" Potential employers will ask this question and the answer can determine which applicant gets the job. Now is the time to apply if a number will be needed this summer.

In order to apply for a social security number, you must complete an application. These are available at the local office, 1401-B W. 5th St., Plainview. Or if you live outside of Plainview, your local post office maintains a supply of applications. You will need to complete it and either mail it to the office or bring it in with the proper documentation.

We will need to see proof of age and identity. A birth certificate or a religious record of your birth will prove your age. Any document with your name on it will prove identity. Report cards, library cards, immunization records, drivers licenses are all examples of proof of identity.

If you are over 18, we will need to talk to you in person before we issue your number. However, in all other cases, everything can be handled by mail. We will look at your documents and return them immediately. It is necessary that we see the originals or certified copies. Our regulations do not permit us to accept photo copies of documents.

Once all is complete, we will code the information into the computer system and you will be issued a card within 10 to 14 days. This speed is due to a new process that has been in effect since February, 1982. Previously, we mailed your application and it was processed by hand. As a result, new numbers could take anywhere from four to six weeks to be issued.

This increase in efficiency and speed is one of our latest efforts to improve service to you. But don't let this lull you into a false sense of security. It is still best to apply for your number now rather than waiting until a potential employer asks to see your card.

If you have any questions, call our toll-free number, 1-800-392-1603 and we will gladly answer your questions.

Our representative, Sandra Alewine, is in Dimmitt the first and third Thursdays of each month. She is at the courthouse from 10 a.m. to noon and she will be glad to help you with this or any other social security problem.

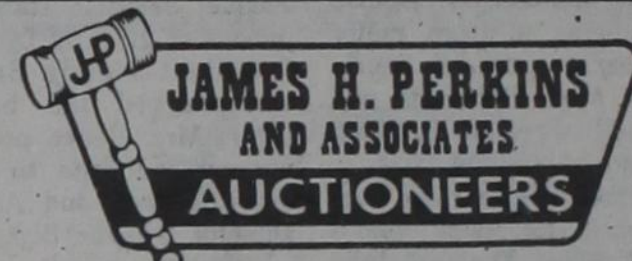

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## View from the library

During the winter, several patrons asked about Beatrix Potter's books. You readers may remember that Beatrix Potter was a children's book author. If you're really sharp you may even remember that she wrote "The Tale of Peter Rabbit."

Oh, yes, you do! "Once upon a time," it begins, "there were four little Rabbits, and their names were Flossy, Mopsy, Cottontail and Peter." And etc.

Sure you remember! It's an all time favorite and a child's classic. Finally we located and bought a fine set of Beatrix Potter "Peter Rabbit" books. There are 23 of them.

For the purpose of this column, Beatrix Potter became a subject of one of our more extensive reference searches. There appears to be little to say about her.

She grew up in a wealthy English family. Nannies took care of her, and she was educated at home. Since her only brother was sent away to school, she was alone most of the time and took up sketching animals as a little hobby. She was a shy, quiet girl and was ill at ease among adults.

As a young adult, she lavished attention and affection on younger cousins and other child friends. She would illustrate her letters to them for their amusement. To little Noel Moore she sent a long, illustrated letter with excellent illustrations. It was called "The Tale of Peter Rabbit" and was meant to amuse him while he was ill. The year was 1902.

The story was so cute that young Noel showed it to his friends. They thought it was cute, too. Parents suggested to Beatrix that she should publish it. She did, and it was moderately successful. Frederick Warne & Co., a publisher, took it and published it commercially. It was very popular; during the next ten years 22 other Peter Rabbit books followed. Now, 70 years later, they are still regarded as fine children's literature.

In 1913 Beatrix met and eventually married William Heelis, a country lawyer. Theirs was a very happy marriage.

The earnings from the Peter Rabbit books amounted to a pretty penny. So Beatrix Potter, now Mrs. Heelis, bought a country house and became a devoted sheep breeder. She also was a hard working community leader. This left no time for her writing and illustrating.

In her later years she wrote several other children's books. However, her main interest was her husband and her sheep. She passed away

at the age of 77 in 1943.

Her one and only biographer wrote a book about her in 1946. She recalls that Beatrix Potter was a kindly little lady with a passion for privacy. She was modest about her Peter Rabbit books but enthusiastic about sheep breeding.

It goes to show that true talent is not always obsessed with itself. Sometimes it's sheep.

## Package may cost more than food

Consumers, the package your food comes in may be as expensive as the food in it, says Dr. Cass Ryan-Crowe, a food and nutrition specialist on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Ready-to-eat items like desserts, chips, syrups, gums and soft drinks have a packaging value twice that of the ingredient, the specialist explains.

Raw meat, produce, cheese and sugar packaging value may be as low as three to seven percent of the food ingredients, she points out.

On the average, consumers spend \$1 out of every \$11 on packages and containers, Ryan-Crowe says.

## Farmers advised to protect acreage bases

"Now that the signup period for 1982 farm programs has ended, the next step will be certification of crop acres," Melvin Barton, Chairman of the Castro County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee, said.

This step is necessary to assure eligibility for program benefits and to protect 1983 crop acreage bases. Therefore, both program participants and nonparticipants need to report crop acres, he said.

Acreage bases for participating crops will not be reduced in 1983, according to Barton.

"This means that the 1983 acreage base for program crops will equal the 1982 crop acreage base except for rotation farms," he said. The 1983 acreage base for crops with zero planted acres reported will equal the 1982 crop acreage base except for rotation farms.

Barton said the crop acreage base on rotation farms will be protected in accordance with established rotation patterns in corresponding years.

"To protect their 1983 crop acreage bases, it is important for farmers who are not participating in the 1982 acreage reduction programs to report their acreages," the ASCS official added.

ASCS office at Third and Bedford Streets in Dimmitt or call 647-2153.

Barton also said that price

support loans will be available until Monday on 1981 corn, sorghum, cotton and soybeans.

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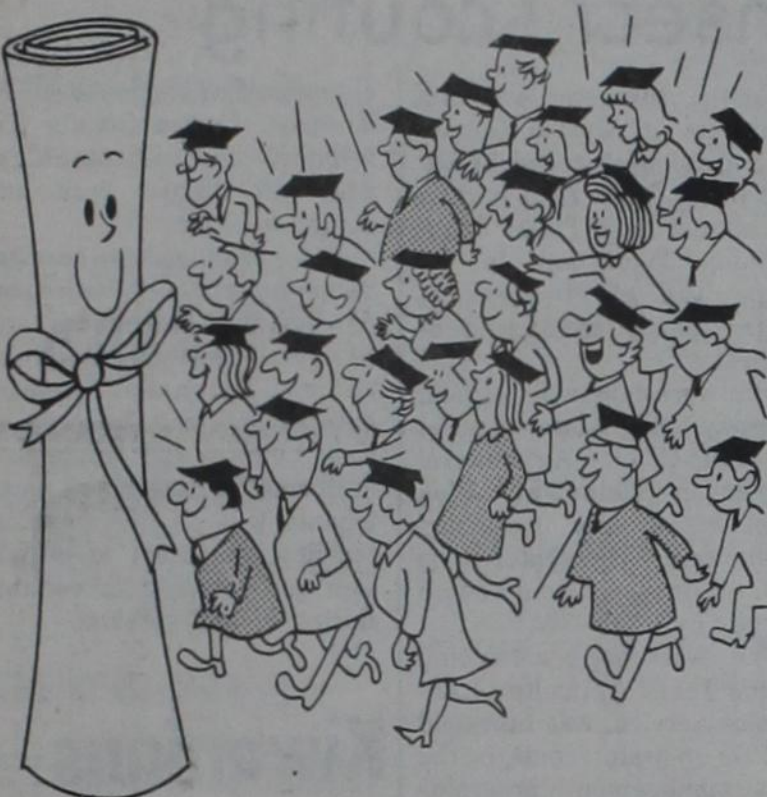
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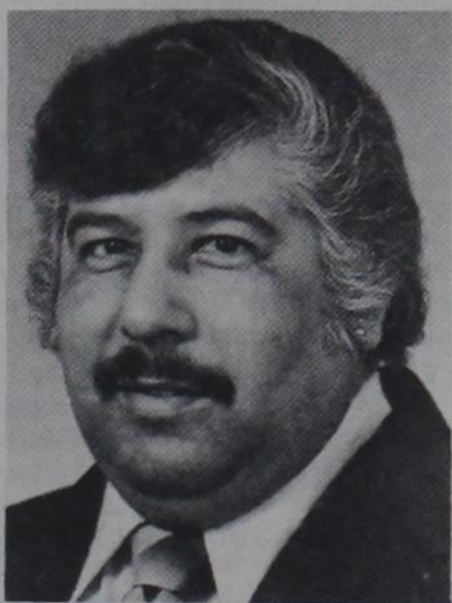

## Farmers to study insect scouting

Cotton, corn and sorghum producers in Castro County are receiving a special invitation this year to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.

The workshop will be held Tuesday and Wednesday at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview, Allen Knutson, County Extension agent, said. The center is on U.S. 87 Business Route south of the city.

The workshop, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs conducted by Extension. In subsequent years, it has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators, and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects.

The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yield and hold down production costs, Knutson said.

The Tuesday session opens at 8:30 a.m. with Dr. Pat Morrison outlining the scope of the workshop and explaining pest management concepts. Also on the morning program are Dr. Dale Pennington, Extension soil chemist; Dr. James Supak, Extension cotton agronomist; Dr. Robert Berry, Extension plant pathologist; and Dr. Jim Leser, cotton Extension Entomologist.

The afternoon program will include Dr. Kirby W. Huffman, Extension agronomist; Dr. Pat Morrison, Extension entomologist; and Allen E. Knutson, Castro County Extension agent-entomology, who will discuss corn and sorghum pests.

The Wednesday session, beginning at 9 a.m., will focus on scouting procedures and reports. Instructors will be county Extension agents-entomology Greg Cronholm of Hale County, and Knutson.

During the afternoon, participants will receive practical training on insect identification and scouting procedures during a field session.

"Back when I first started with the department, we tried to never have a project that cost more than \$10,000 per mile, except maybe for some major projects that would run up to twice that much," Lust said. "But this present project is costing around \$143,000 per mile for the 17 1/2 miles."

He said the construction company should begin hauling base in about two or three weeks, adding that the entire project will not be completed until next summer.

## Wentz is Amstar chief executive

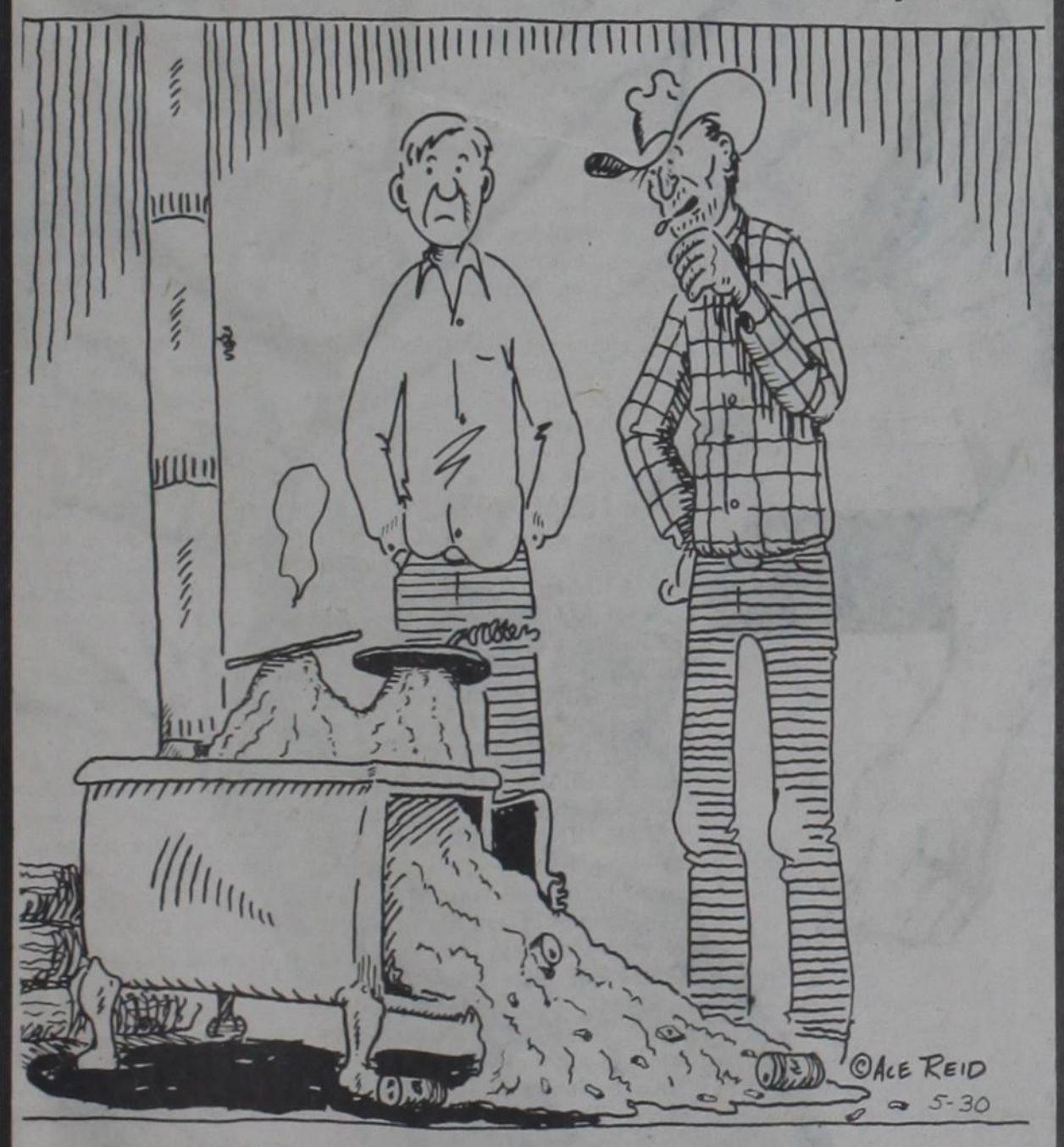
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# DHS choral students receive awards Friday night
