WHERE DID FARMERS GET MONEY TO BUY RAILROAD TICKETS TO WASHINGTON

(An Editorial)

Things are coming to a pretty pass when a farmer can't get off of his own little farm and travel around over the country a bit without some Congressman at Washington wanting to know where he got the money to pay expenses with and demand a Senate investigation as to the source of funds to buy railroad tickets.

Senator Hastings, of Deleware, and a Republican, is all "het" up about the farmers from over the country gathering in Washington this week to "look things over" and kinder "Check Up' on what is going on in the capitol city and to tell Secretary Wallace they were satisfied with the Triple A program etc. That is the farmers privilege. If he wants to go to Washington and hold a conference with Mr. Wallace and President Roosevelt, let him go, and if the hat is passed around among his neighbors and friends to raise the necessary money to pay expenses of the trip, that is OK also. Other representatives are sent to Washington by various organizations and their expenses are paid by the organization they represent and nothing is said about it, but let a farmer leave his "rabbit claim" and head for Washington and some Congressman from the East wants to know "where in the hell did he get the money" to make the trip on.

The meeting in Washington recently of the officials of the United States Chamber of Commerce is fresh on our minds. The officials of this organization is composed of big business men of the East, the boys that walk around swinging a gold-headed walking cane and wears a high silk hat and a diamond stick pin in his tie as large as a quarter and puts up at the finest hotels in the city. They were not "jerked up on the carpet" by a Senate resolution and questioned as to where the money came from to pay their expenses of the trip, so why turn the search-light on the farmer when he hits Washington and take a look into his pocketbook and scan his expense account. He is a free-born citizen of these United States and is allowed to travel around at will the same as any other citizen.

When Senator Hastings introduced his resolution. Senator Tom Connally of Texas, lit on him like a duck on a June Bug and told him it was an insult to the farmers' etc. Connally is to be commended on his action in this matter.






