1,728 BALES OF COTTON GINNED IN THIS AREA

WHIRLWINDS UPROOT LONGHORNS 33-0

Lockney Made Two First Downs At Beginning; Lider Grandstands For Crowd

Ye old timed rival Floydada Whirlwinds uprooted the Lockney Longhorns last Friday afternoon 33-0 before a damp crowd at Wester Field. It misted rain all during the game and toward the last quarter became heavier.

The Lockney line-up went in to the game full of pep with the idea of proving to the Whirlwinds that their neighbors were the ones to be on the ball. Lockney made two first downs in the first eight minutes of the game and did a good job of carrying the pigskin toward the goal line. But in steps Malcolm Lider, Floydada's 178 lb. one-man team, who recovers the ball and does a bit of grandstanding from then on until the close of the game. Floydada made their first touchdown by completing a pass and running for the goal line. They kicked for the extra point and made it. At the close of the first quarter the score was 7-0.

During the second quarter Lider walked through Lockney's line throwing tacklers aside but was finally downed near the local's goal line. On their third down with one yard to go, Lider carried the ball for another six points. Two other touchdowns were made during this time.

"Fat" Spence made some nice punts during the game and is to be commended for his efficiency. Marvin Sams, Teuton Marvin Brotherton, H A Brotherton also did outstanding playing for Lockney.

Floydada pushed over for another touchdown at the beginning of the third quarter. Lockney completed one pass during this period and incompleated two. Floydada ran in second string with the exception of Lider. W Mathews of the opponents did outstanding playing.

COTTON PRODUCERS MAY CALL FOR UNSOLD CERTIFICATES

The Floyd County agent's office at Floydada announces that all 1934 cotton producers, who placed their surplus cotton tax-exemption certificates in the National Pool, can now call at the office and receive their portion of unsold certificates which are usable for the crop year 1935.

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR COTTON ADJUSTMENT PAYMENTS

In case the cotton is sold on or after Nov. 1, 1935, the cotton sales certificate respecting it shall be so delivered as soon as possible but not later than seven calendar days after the date of sale (not counting the date of sale). Provided that if the cotton is sold after Nov. 1, 1935, but prior to Nov. 9, 1935, the sales certificate respecting it may be delivered not later than Nov. 16, 1935. The County agent office at Floydada is very anxious to get all Cotton Price Adjustment Payments Form No. C A P-1 in the office at once so they can be checked, arranged and filed in such a way, that when the Forms C A P-2 C A P-3 and C A P-4 arrive will be able to give the producer a final check as to number of pounds sold and receipt for same up to date. This will enable it to make a speedy report for the County.

### CHEVROLET ANNOUNCES PRICES FOR 1936 MODELS

The Chevrolet Motor Company announced that, effective with the introduction of its new passenger car models, prices of three of its six Master de luxe models will be reduced below the levels of the 1935 prices, the other prices in this line remaining unchanged. Master de luxe models will be available with either conventional spring suspension or with knee action at slight additional cost.

Prices for the new line of Chevrolet Standard models, which introduce fine car completeness and luxury to the lowest-priced field, range from \$495 for the coupe to \$600 for the sport sedan. Chevrolet for the first time offers a sport sedan and a town sedan in the Standard line. Like the Master de luxe Chevrolets, the new Standards have perfected hydraulic brakes and solid steel turret top Fisher bodies. They are of longer wheelbase than the 1935 Standard series, and there is a full line of models available.

Prices of the two lines are as follows: Master de luxe—Coach, \$580; sedan, \$640; town sedan, \$605; sport sedan, \$665; business coupe, \$560; sport coupe \$590. Standard—Coach, \$510; coupe, \$495; town sedan, \$535; sport sedan, \$600; sedan delivery, \$535.

First showing of the new models was made with the opening of the automobile shows last Saturday, and in dealer sales-rooms throughout the country. Officials of the company declared that more than 60,000 of the 1936 models were built and shipped up to the end of October, and that all the 10,000 Chevrolet dealers received new cars for display and delivery. Production schedules for November and December have been set at the highest figures for any corresponding months in the history of Chevrolet.

### FAKE SECURITY DEALERS ON THE WAY OUT IN TEXAS

The exodus is on. Fake security dealers are on their way out of Texas and legitimate deal-

ers who offer the public sound investments are able to do so. The Texas Securities Act, which passed both houses of legislature without a dissenting vote, is responsible for this happy condition.

However, the state is not completely rid of all fraudulent security dealers and the public is charged with the final responsibility. It is up to the persons who invest in stocks, bonds and oil, gas and mining leases to demand that the dealers they encounter be registered under the state securities law.

If a doubt as to the eligibility of any dealer exists in the mind of any citizen it is the duty of that citizen to inquire immediately. This information can be secured from the Secretary of State's office in Austin.

Many dealers in gas and oil leases contend that they are exempt. Such a contention is a misunderstanding of the law. In some cases lease dealers are sincere in this belief and are laboring under a false impression. In many more cases the dealer does not want to know the law. He is aware that his past record as a swindler and crook will not permit him to become a registered dealer in Texas.

Under Article "A" of Section 2 of the Texas Securities Act it is plainly stated that "any instrument representing any interest in or under an oil, gas or mining lease, fee or title" is to be classed as a security.

This clause was necessary in the law due to the existence of a great number of fake lease dealers in Texas. These parasites have preyed upon the unsuspecting small investors. They have steered clear of wise investors who take time to investigate before they invest.

Under all conditions potential purchasers of securities are urged approach them. The law does to be certain of the dealers who invest. It contemplates in not pretend to guarantee an investigation into the character of the dealer. It is the human element that has been responsible for the fraudulent practices in securities in Texas. A stock certificate can't be crooked but the dealer can be.

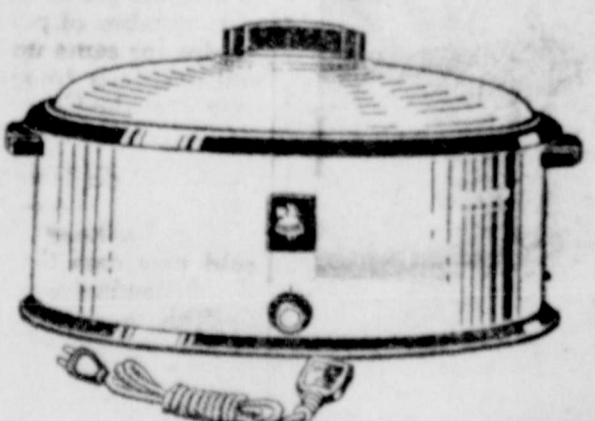

"Could you decide in a moment, or exercise snap judgment on the dozens of questions a news paper man must face daily and get a majority of them correctly? We won't tire you—but if you could do these few simple things and a thousand and one more difficult ones, you should be a news paper editor."

"The point we wish to make is that you can produce a good news paper only after continual diligent study and years of practical experience. You have heard dozens of persons remark that they could turn out a newspaper and a good one too, a bit better, in fact, than the one they are getting. That is not true, unless they have gone through the years and study that a good newspaper demands of its makers."

"Were it not for the peculiar fascination associated with newspaper work, there would be no news papers for there is no greater task-master and money alone would be far too scant consideration." As one of the so called newspaper men, we heartily endorse the above remarks of our contemporary.

### CHEVROLET ANNOUNCES PRICES FOR 1936 MODELS

The Chevrolet Motor Company announced that, effective with the introduction of its new passenger car models, prices of three of its six Master de luxe models will be reduced below the levels of the 1935 prices, the other prices in this line remaining unchanged. Master de luxe models will be available with either conventional spring suspension or with knee action, at slight additional cost.

Prices for the new line of Chevrolet Standard models, which introduce fine car completeness and luxury to the lowest-priced field, range from \$495 for the coupe to \$600 for the sport sedan. Chevrolet for the first time offers a sport sedan and a town sedan in the Standard line. Like the Master de luxe Chevrolets, the new Standards have perfected hydraulic brakes and solid steel turret top Fisher bodies. They are of longer wheelbase than the 1935 Standard series, and there is a full line of models available.

ers who offer the public sound investments are able to do so. The Texas Securities Act, which passed both houses of legislature without a dissenting vote, is responsible for this happy condition.

However, the state is not completely rid of all fraudulent security dealers and the public is charged with the final responsibility. It is up to the persons who invest in stocks, bonds and oil, gas and mining leases to demand that the dealers they encounter be registered under the state securities law.

If a doubt as to the eligibility of any dealer exists in the mind of any citizen it is the duty of that citizen to inquire immediately. This information can be secured from the Secretary of State's office in Austin.

Many dealers in gas and oil leases contend that they are exempt. Such a contention is a misunderstanding of the law. In some cases lease dealers are sincere in this belief and are laboring under a false impression. In many more cases the dealer does not want to know the law. He is aware that his past record as a swindler and crook will not permit him to become a registered dealer in Texas.

Under Article "A" of Section 2 of the Texas Securities Act it is plainly stated that "any instrument representing any interest in or under an oil, gas or mining lease, fee or title" is to be classed as a security.

This clause was necessary in the law due to the existence of a great number of fake lease dealers in Texas. These parasites have preyed upon the unsuspecting small investors. They have steered clear of wise investors who take time to investigate before they invest.

Under all conditions potential purchasers of securities are urged approach them. The law does to be certain of the dealers who vestment. It contemplates in not pretend to guarantee an investigation into the character of the dealer. It is the human element that has been responsible for the fraudulent practices in securities in Texas. A stock certificate can't be crooked but the dealer can be.

CHEER UP—IT COULD BE WORSE

This has been the biggest year in the automobile business since before the depression began. More cars have been made and sold, and the manufacturers, who keep their ears pretty close to the ground are unanimous in their expectations of making and selling still more cars during the coming year.

Any way you look at it whether you regard the automobile as a necessity, a luxury or a menace—the facts about the motor industry don't tally with the notion that we are a bankrupt and starving nation. Quite the opposite is the fact. Because few of us have as much surplus as we did a few years ago, and hardly any of us has as good an income, we have fallen into a habit of thinking that we, the people of the United States, are very badly off indeed. It is hardly necessary to go farther than the facts about the automobile business to demonstrate the utter falsity of the doctrine promulgated by the Jeremiahs who are shedding gloomy tears over the perilous state of the nation.

As professor Einstein might express it, it is all a matter of relativity. It is true that we are not as well off, on the whole, as we were in 1928. But we are better off, by comparison with the people of all the rest of the world, than we were then. They have faced and are still facing harder conditions than we have ever dreamed of, and none of them, so far as anybody knows, is as definitely on the way back as we are in America.

It seems probable that the United States will continue as a going concern for some time to come.

SHARING THE WEALTH

The trouble with most of us is that we know so many things that we don't do. Just now a great many of us are saying, and a lot of us are believing, that we could only redistribute the wealth in some way everybody's share would be over. But a careful study was made of the incomes above \$100,000 a year, it was shown that of the surplus of every individual income above that figure \$100,000 to be distributed among the forty million bread-winners of the nation, it would amount to less than \$100 a year for each family. Most of us have been letting ourselves be "sold" on the idea that one of the causes of our economic troubles is that we produce more goods than we consume. But when we look at the actual figures it would almost seem as if the truth were the other way about. We are not producing, and never have produced, enough goods to go around.

The better distribution of wealth has got to come about by producing more wealth to distribute. The trouble with most of us is that we don't recognize the distinction between wealth and money. Wealth consists only of commodities produced by the application of labor to the land and to raw materials. Money is only a convenient medium for the transmission of wealth from one person to another.

It is true that most of us haven't enough of either wealth or money, but the only way yet discovered to add to the world's wealth is to create it by doing more productive work.

G. H. Nelson, our new Senator elected from this district at a recent called election, to fill out the unexpired term of the late Senator Arthur P. Duggan, introduced a resolution in the Senate on Wednesday of last week with reference to "Unicameral Legislation." This resolution proposed a Legislature of 42 members, two from each congressional district to be elected for four-year terms. One member would be elected from each district every two years. Each member would

receive an annual salary of \$5,000 and would be excluded from taking or receiving any compensation from any individual firm or corporation during the tenure of office. There would be a continuous legislative session. The chamber would recess or adjourn from time to time and would be subject to call by 50 per cent of the membership. Also should a district feel that its wishes were not being followed, it could recall its representative. The Governor's power to veto would not be abridged. Senator Nelson asked the Senate and House of Representatives to go on record favoring a submission of a constitutional amendment to the people in 1937 for the adoption of a "unicameral legislature." Senator Nelson hit the nail square on the head in this resolution and the people of Texas are rotten ripe for such an amendment. 181 men that make up the membership of the Senate and House is entirely too many men to ever agree on any kind of legislation, whereas 42 men could perhaps come to some kind of an agreement in a much shorter length of time. The expense on the state would be less, a whole lot less. These two present called sessions of the Legislature is going to cost the taxpayers at least three hundred thousand dollars, whereas under the Nelson resolution of one house or one legislative body of 42 men it would have cost the taxpayers only \$210,000 for the entire year and they could meet as often as they wished. We will have more to say about this resolution from time to time.

The Texas Senate thought it would be a good idea to broadcast over the radio the proceedings of the Legislature, but the House turned thumbs down on the proposition. A good idea there is too much static emanating from the Texas Legislature to make for good broadcasting, and they do not have anything to broadcast anyhow.

William E. Borah is no longer considered as a possible candidate of the GOP boys. Eastern Republicans dropped him like he was a hot rock, when as he says (Borah) "They found out they couldn't use me." What they are trying to do is to find someone they think they can elect and he will just be a figurehead in the White House.

"BRAIN JEWELS" FROM OUR EXCHANGES

It Is An Easy Job!

Under the caption, "Editors might ask readers if they could get out papers," the Redwood, Minnesota Gazette, in a recent issue carried an editorial which we believe of interest and are reprinting it herewith:

"Getting out a good newspaper is a fascinating task, but it is also a difficult one. No other job that comes to mind is quite so taxing, so hurried, or demands greater pains. From the moment a newspaper is started, be it either a daily or weekly, the work is carried on under pressure, a race against time. Put yourself in an editor's position—could you do it?"

"Could you, for example, spell correctly, offhand, the names of a large percentage of the residents of this town? If you could do that, could you write their initials correctly without resorting to the telephone directory or other authority?"

"Could you gather the trend of a story from a half dozen persons and weave them into an intelligent readable account the first writing? Could you write seven columns of material 1200 or 1400 words each, in two or three days, week after week, year after

year, when you had finished those seven pound out two or three more before press time?

"In writing a head line: could you call to mind in a moment enough synonyms so that you would not repeat the main thought in the same words? Could you judge in a minimum of time what size headlines, and what position in the paper could be given to each of the 75, 100 or more stories that might go into your paper?"

"Could you decide in a moment, or exercise snap judgment on the dozens of questions a news paper man must face daily and get a majority of them correctly? We won't tire you—but if you could do these few simple things and a thousand and one more difficult ones, you should be a news paper editor."

"The point we wish to make is that you can produce a good news paper only after continual diligent study and years of practical experience. You have heard dozens of persons remark that they could turn out a newspaper and a good one too, a bit better, in fact, than the one they are getting. That is not true, unless they have gone through the years and study that a good newspaper demands of its makers."

"Were it not for the peculiar fascination associated with newspaper work, there would be no news papers for there is no greater task-master and money alone would be far too scant consideration." As one of the so called newspaper men, we heartily endorse the above remarks of our contemporary. Only those who know the "grind" can really appreciate the truth of the above statements.—The Oakdale (La.) Journal.

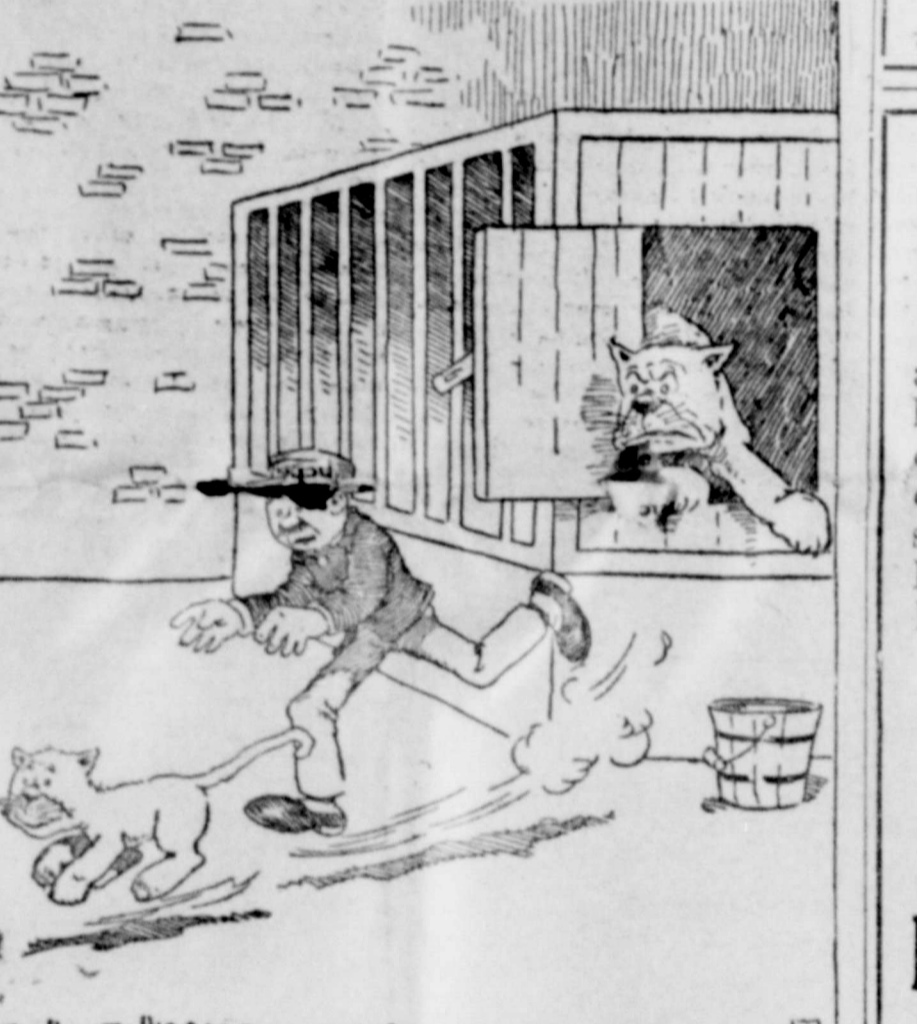

### TEXAS CORN-HOG PRODUCERS FAVOR NEW ADJUSTMENT PROGRAM

COLLEGE STATION—Texas corn and hog producers clearly favor a continuance of the corn-hog adjustment program as was shown by 33,373 producers voting "yes" against a small minority of 6,417 "no's" in the corn-hog referendum held October 26. E M Regenbrecht, chairman of the State Corn-Hog Review Board, announced.

"One of the most significant angles of the referendum was the increased interest Texas corn and hog producers had in voting over last year," Regenbrecht commented. "A total of 39,790 votes was cast this year which was more than double the number of votes cast last year. Approximately 18,000 votes were cast in 1934."

According to final tabulations, 83.8 per cent of the voting producers were in favor of continuing the corn-hog program.

Of the total votes cast 20,385 were by contract signers and 19,432 were by non-contract signers. Contract signers voted 92.4 per cent in favor of continued adjustment, the final report showing 18,785 for and 1,556 against. Non-signers also favored the program by voting 75 per cent in favor of continued adjustment as shown by 14,572 voting "yes" and 4,860 voting "no". More than 50 per cent of the contract signers cast votes.
