## NEW QUOTA FOR REHABILITATION IN CO.

### All Clients Must Grow Their Own Living At Home Under New Program

### DIRECT GRANTS MADE. Loans Made for Teams, Equipment, and Supplies only; Repayable in Five Years

The quota of rehabilitation clients for this county has been increased to where every farm family in distress will have an opportunity of working back to independence, according to information received by Fred C. Wilbanks of Floydada, county supervisor of the Resettlement Administration, who says enrollment of new clients will begin at once. Long-time farm plans will be worked out as rapidly as possible, but in the meanwhile, direct grants for subsistence will be made. All families accepted for either permanent or the temporary program must be approved by the county advisory committee.

The supervisor will be hard pushed within the next few weeks to enroll the new clients, but he expects to continue working out farm plans with the object of getting all families started on a permanent program early in the new crop season. Making the loan is merely the beginning of the supervisor's job. He must see that the client grows his living at home and can support his food to carry him through the winter—an average of 125 quart cans of food for each member of the family. Cash crops are permitted only after enough land has been set aside for food and feed.

A considerable number of families in this territory were accepted for the program this spring, and most of them started at that time on standard farm plans. New families will be started on similar programs. They will be required to make their own arrangements for renting land, after which loans will be made by Resettlement.

The Texas Agricultural Association, represented by 1600 farmers from two hundred counties, at its meeting in Dallas last week, commended the Resettlement Administration and called upon Oklahoma farmers to join them in pushing through the Bankhead Jones farm tenant bill, which would make an adequate sum available for purchase of farms and equipment for worthy tenants without a down payment. Until some such legislation is passed, the Resettlement Administration is confining its efforts in most cases for teams, equipment and supplies. These loans draw five percent interest and are repayable in one to five years.

## CHILD WELFARE GETS \$22,000 UNDER CONDITION

### County Unit May Be Established Here If County Report Is Acceptable to Bureau.

The U. S. Children's Bureau under the recent Social Security act will be empowered to allocate some \$72,000.00 to the Texas Division of Child Welfare if the Texas Legislature will make appropriations to provide for a certain per cent of funds to match the Federal money, and if the state will submit an acceptable plan for spending this amount to the U. S. Children's Bureau on or before Dec. 15, 1935.

It is possible that Floyd County may be selected as the location for one of the several "County Units" whose establishment throughout the State is part of the plan to be submitted to Washington. Such a unit here depends upon the report of your plan.

With the first of these qualifications you can have no direct concern except that of arousing community interest, but with the second your interest can take on the form of active participation by your response to the attached appeal. It is hoped that you will receive this as a privilege rather than a duty for it is possible that your report may be a contributing factor to the establishment of a Floyd county unit.

## SCRIPT HAS BEEN ISSUED BY CITY FOR PURPOSE OF PAVING STREETS

### \$2,000 Of City Script To Be Sold Here For Taxes, Water, And Sewerage

### WORK TO BEGIN SOON

### These Already Pledging Money For Project Will Receive Script For Payment

Two thousand dollars worth of script of the city of Lockney has been issued by the council in \$100 and \$500 lots. It will be sold within the next ten days in accordance with the \$31,000 city bond issue.

The council is employing a new method of six months' payment. It was formerly announced that \$2,000 required of the city in order to receive the allotment would be done by asking the citizens to pledge \$2,000 per month for six months. The city council decided to issue the script in \$100 and \$500 lots and to allow the citizens to pay the same in six months.

The executive committee of the City Council, headed by Ed Whitfill, chairman, J. Taylor, and H. M. Mason, will meet tonight to decide when the town will be canvassed for the selling of the script. Ed Whitfill stated today that he expected the campaign to start within a few days so the city would be prepared to begin the street work when the final approval on the project came in.

This executive committee will be assisted by the following men in selling the script: Arthur Barker, R. E. Patterson, G. B. Harris, Robert Smith, Floyd Huff, Dr. P. C. Anders, Arch Crager, C. A. Wofford, K. L. Canning, Arthur Barton, Dr. N. E. Greer, and Geo. T. Meriwether.

Whitfill said he believed it would be possible for the project to get started within the next two weeks. This money that is being raised by the city will be expended for materials, gasoline, oil, and tools. The plan calls for an eight inch coat of caliche to be rolled.

DRIVERS' LICENSE LAW TO BECOME EFFECTIVE ON APRIL 1st, 1936

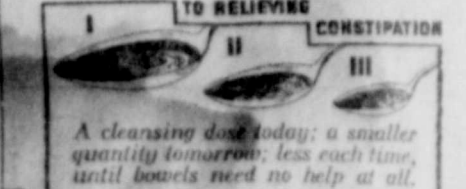
The driver's license law will become operative April 1, 1936 and will mark the State's first effort in that field. The law was pushed through the Legislature with great difficulty despite growing alarm over the increase in automobile fatalities. Sponsors of the law who witnessed the Governor's signature, said it was not as strong as they wanted and that they would attempt to add teeth at the subsequent session. License would be supplied without cost by the State but possession would be mandatory. Drivers would be suspended automatically on conviction for:

- 1. Negligent homicide resulting from use of a motor vehicle.
2. Driving while intoxicated.
3. Use of an automobile in commission of felonies.
4. Failure to stop and render aid after a collision.

Two convictions within one year for violating traffic laws. The initial suspension would be for six months with subsequent violations punishable by suspension for one year.

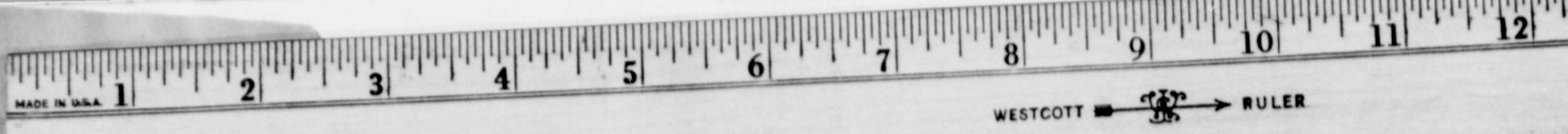

## MEDICAL TOPICS

**DIPHTHERIA**  
 At this time of the year and in this district, some children are going to have the dreaded Diphtheria. Those having it will very probably be under 16 years of age—most under 10. And a few of them, often because of neglect, are going to die.

They will start out with a sore throat—somewhat like a cold—with a temperature of about 103 or 3 degrees above normal. They may not be so very sick for 5 or 6 days, at which time they will get worse rapidly and a doctor will at last be called. Or in young children it may start as a harsh croupy cough and the turn for the worse come in 2 or 3 days.

Consult your doctor when your child shows symptoms resembling the above. If it is Diphtheria he will administer antitoxin. Of those

receiving antitoxin: if on the first day—but little over one in one hundred dies; if on the fifth day—fifteen in that hundred die; and if antitoxin is not given, thirty-five in a hundred or one in three will die—and of this last group, those that live may have had kidneys or especially heart trouble as a result.

Or if your child has been exposed to Diphtheria your doctor can either prevent his having the disease or make the case a very mild one.

Give your doctor a chance and death takes a back seat in Diphtheria.

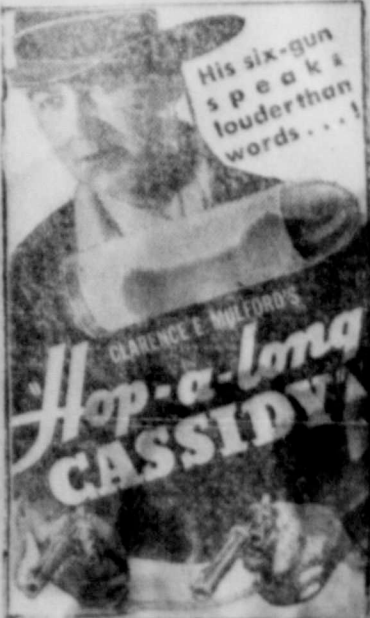
