SEEN IN AMOUNT OF COTTON GINNED

Floyd County Shows An Increase Of 8,979 Bales With Other Counties Measuring Similarly

CENSUS REPORT

Nueces and Jones Counties Lead State in Production Of Cotton for 1935

With the exception of a few, all counties in the state of Texas ginned more cotton in 1935 than in 1934 according to the preliminary reports of the Bureau of the Census sent out by the Department of Commerce.

Floyd county shows an increase of 8,979 bales over the previous year. Crosby and Briscoe counties ginned five times as much in 1935 as in 1934. Hale and Jones also showed over-whelming increases.

Nueces and Jones counties led the nation for 1935 in ginning 88,083 and 61,790 bales, respectively.

Lon Ingram, Assistant Highway Engineer of this district, was in Lockney Monday and informed Commissioner E R Harris that the contract for the topping of Highway 28 from Floydada to the Hale County line and the loop through Lockney, would be let on April 7th. When this piece of paving is completed it will give an all-weather road from Lockney to points east and south.

The highway will receive a Caliche base and a triple Asphalt topping according to the specifications submitted to bidders. Lockney and Floyd county people have waited long and patiently for the completion of this highway. The highway from Floydada east will soon be completed and with the closing of the gap from Floydada to Hale county line the road program east and west through the county will have been completed. Work will probably get underway along about the 15th of April.

EROSION PROGRAM GETS UNDERWAY OVER WEEK-END

Allocated Amount to Floyd County Will Take Care of 15,000 Acres; More could be Secured

\$30,000 TO BE USED

County Committee and Committee men are Selected By Farm Association

Application for wind erosion funds started last week-end following a meeting of the Floyd County Farm Association where a county committee and committee men were selected to handle the \$30,000 allotted to this county for erosion control.

D F Bredthauer county agent says that the allotted amount will take care of 15,000 acres and he believes that more can be secured if needed.

Only sixty per cent of the total amount allowed you by the county committee may be paid at the beginning and the remainder forty per cent will be issued upon completion of the work providing you have carried out the requirements. Funds are to be distributed at the rate of 20c per acre for tillage, and all listings and must bring up a strip-listed and paid for on the basis of actual percent listed or checked.

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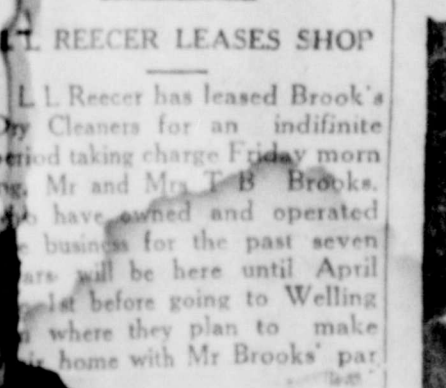
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Mr Mooreland is a former resident of Lockney and is the brother of Lawson and Roscoe Moreland of this city.

New AAA To Retain Base Figures of 1935

District Meetings To Be Held Today And Friday At Convenient Points

Jack Shelton, vice-director and state agent of the Texas Extension Service, said Wednesday base figures used in the 1935 AAA program in Texas will be used this year under the new soil conservation and domestic allotment act.

The announcement came at the end of a two-day extension staff conference on plans to put the new program in effect in the state.

Shelton said extension agents in various counties would call group meetings at convenient district points for today and Friday and that district agents would outline general plans for the new program.

County agents will explain details in counties and committees of farmers to administer the program will be called in each community, Shelton said. He added that organization would begin with a community committee of three to represent approximately 500 farmers. Committeemen from all communities will constitute a county board from which the county committee will be selected.

"Every farmer in Texas will have a community committee," explained Shelton. "The new program will be a success if we can get it started."

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Mr Boedeker said that if enough interest was shown in the county, eliminations will be held to determine winners to be represented at the district and state meets.

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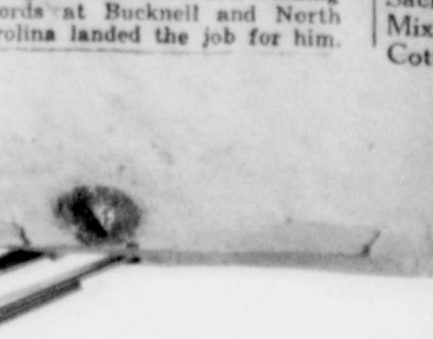
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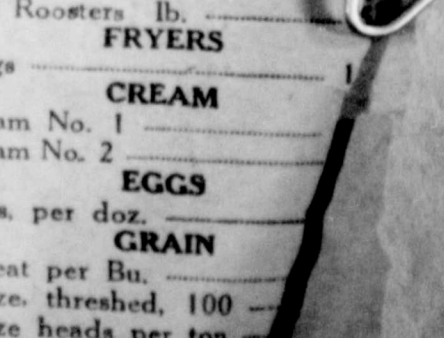

Let's Talk About Clothes

After you've bought your new spring hat, bring it home and try it on. Now look at your hair. Does it do justice to the hat? The season's strongest challenge in coiffures is "away from the hairline," and it's one of the most flattering accents not only for youth, but for the older face as well.

All sorts of individually becoming things can be done. A forward dip over the temple, or a few soft curls high and just forward of the ear, will soften a thin face. Center parts are lovely, and are particularly smart with an upward dip over each temple. Not everyone however can wear a straight and narrow path right down the middle of their head, so be particularly sure that you're the type.

If you have red hair, remember the color carries it. Too many curls only make it look "frozy" and take that smooth sheen that is essential to beautiful hair. A particularly smart curl concession that might be used is a few wisps of curled half bangs on one side of the forehead.
