CITY TO INSTALL NEW PUMP IN OLD WELL SOON

Have Purchased Kimball-Krough Pump of One Thousand Gallon Capacity

WELL TO BE DEEPER

Will Drill Well To 240 Feet Depth To Secure Sufficient Water For City

The City Council has purchased a new Kimball-Krough pump of 1000 gallon per minute capacity to put in the city well. The present pump has been in the well for about ten years and is of small capacity, only producing a little over three hundred gallons per minute, which is not sufficient to supply the city with ample water at all times.

The well will be drilled to a depth of 240 feet. It is now 140 feet and does not have sufficient water to supply a larger pump. Mr Handley has the contract to sink the well to a greater depth.

The city has two wells on the property, the other one a small well with a small pump. This well will be used until the other one is completed.

The city has been of considerable worry to the City Council for quite a few months. It seems that we are using more water than we should and then, too, the water level is sinking to some extent, and this being only a shallow well, enough water is not available and the present pump is entirely too small.

It will take several weeks to complete this improvement.

Funeral Services Held Wednesday for T M Johnson, 89, Resident of Lockney 28 Years

Death took another one of Lockney's treasured pioneers, T M Johnson, 89, Monday night near 10 o'clock at his home in the east part of town after a lengthy illness.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock p m at the Main Street Church of Christ for the 28 year old pioneer. Bro. J H Nall conducted the rites.

Mr Johnson is survived by six daughters all of whom were present at the time of death; twenty six grandchildren; and twenty-four great-grandchildren. His daughters are Mrs C W Biller, Amarillo; Mrs J A Carruth, Floydada; Mrs J S Barnett, Tulsa; Mrs W M Collins, Amarillo; Mrs W C Watson and Mrs H P Coleman, both of Lockney.

Thomas Monroe Johnson was born July 21, 1846 in Doyde County, Georgia. He moved to Lockney from Farmington, Tex., in 1908 and was engaged in farming near here for sixteen years. He has been retired and living here in town for the past twelve years. The last seven years of time he has been blind. Mr Johnson's wife, Mrs M Watson, has made her home with him since the death of her husband in 1920.

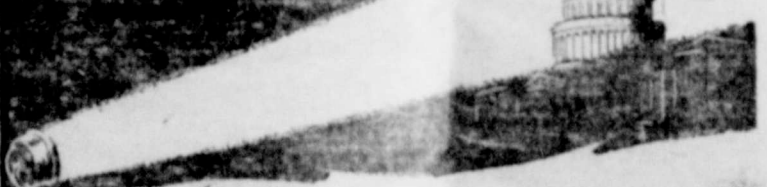

On Good Friday I went over near McKinley to see some Flagellantes in action but arrived too late. From reports of several people who saw them it seems that the Flagellantes lashed their bare backs with switches until bloody welts were produced, then another person kindly cut gashes in their backs with a knife after which the lashing was resumed. It is said that for this act of pious devotion the people concerned get food furnished for a year. I

waited around for half the afternoon watching the Passion Play as performed by the Filipinos but could never tell just what was going on.

LETTER RECEIVED FROM T. W. DOBSON OF PHILIPPINE ISLAND

The following is a letter received recently by Mrs. J. T. Dobson from her son, T. W. Dobson who is enlisted in the United States Army, Nichols Field, Rizal, Philippine Islands. Dear Mother,

I hope you will excuse my unpardonable delay in replying, but life is lived in a listless tempo in the tropics so I have repeatedly procrastinated. However, conditions have become satisfactory and I have dedicated this period to writing you and others to whom I owe letters.

In your last letter you requested a picture of me in my uniform but I have not seen fit to comply due to the fact that the uniform worn in the tropics is not so "hot." While at Fort Sill I had a photo graph made in my serge uniform but got it misplaced and I never had any more made. You will find enclosed some snapshots that I have taken and had taken.

I have recently purchased a Kodak and am now engaged in compiling an album so when I reach home I shall be able to show you many of the sights Manila and surrounding country has to offer.

My foreign service tour will be completed in July and, if I get to go to New York, I will probably be discharged about September the 10th. If I don't get authority to go to New York I may be held around San Francisco until my regular discharge date of November the 21st.

As to what I propose to do in the future I am very undecided. I am considering trying to get in to civil service work as I would be granted five points on any examination due to the fact that I shall be an ex-service man. Also I am considering enlisting in the Navy but dislike the idea of becoming involved for such a long period of time.
