# JULY 1 SET FOR PENSION PAYMENT

Needy Peoples' Applications Being Attended to First so They Will get Money July 1

Orville S Carpenter director of the old age assistance com mission estimated this week that 33.000 to 40,000 persons will be on the pension rolls by July I and receive their first payments within a short time.

He explained that many was are eligible however will not get any money on July I but a start will be made on that date. Those persons who are depending upon the payment for an absolute living will be attended to as soon as their applications are ap proved. You may be eligible but maybe will not get your applica-tion approved before July 1. therefore you will not receive

any money on that date but later. Special consideration is being given to those who appear to need the pensions the worst and so far the approvals have outnumbered rejection three to one. The commission is especially eag er to pany the needy persons first and that is the reason they are trying to dispose of these applications first. Even if the old peoples applications are not approv ed until after July 1. they may be assured of receiving as much money as though their application already had been passed on.




