Deputy Sheriff Earl Cooper said this week that the State Highway Patrol has informed him the lighting requirements under the new state traffic law were very strict on pastrucks and that owners were warned to light their vehicles properly. On passenger cars the vehicle must have two headlights with both bright and dim bulbs. It is a violation of the law now not to dim your headlight-that is a light that flashes on when brakes are applied.
