Floyd County Farm Bureau solicitors and team captains will meet at the Baker Hotel, Lockney, at 8:00 p. m. Thursday evening, October 23 for the kick-off meeting which will launch the Farm Bureau membership drive for 200 members in this county during the state-wide Farm Organization Week, Oct. 23-30. Ben Quebe, president of the county organization has announced.

A radio will be ready to bring the workers the network address of J. Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation which will be heard over the Texas Quality Network from 8:30 to 9:00 p. m. President Hammond will speak to some 7,000 workers assembled in approximately 150 Texas counties who will participate in the state-wide drive for members during Farm Organization week. Floyd County goal is 200 members. The state goal is 40,000 members.

Also to be heard during the 30 minute broadcast Thursday evening will be Edward A. O'Neal, president of the Georgia Farm Bureau, and Chas. B. Schuman, president of the Illinois Farm Bureau Federation. "The Farm Bureau is an organization of, by and for the farmers" Mr. Quebe said, "and it's chief job is to maintain farm prices. To accomplish this, farmers must have an organization strong enough today to adopt and maintain an agricultural program that will stabilize prices of farm products, which in turn stabilizes business and industry." Mr. Quebe concluded.

The State Farm Bureau convention will be held in Amarillo, Nov. 17-19. The National convention will be held in Chicago later.

Court Calls Road Bond Vote Nov. 22

The Floyd County Commissioners Court, in regular meeting Monday, called an election for Floyd County for November 22 to determine whether or not the county will issue \$300,000 in road bonds.

The election was called in response to petitions presented to the Court last week. The plan is to participate in the State Highway Department's farm-to-market road building program. The county will pay three-fourths of the cost of the roads and furnish the right of way while the State Department will pay one-fourth of the cost, furnish the engineering and assume maintenance of the roads.

The roads to be paved under the program are the Rock Creek road running north from Lockney with connections to Sterley and Lone Star, the Sandhill road running east from Floydada, the road connecting Cedar Hill with Highway 267 and a road south of Dougherty into the Antelope community.

Only property tax-payers are eligible to vote and the election must carry by two-thirds majority if it is effective, it was said.

The Court also voted to raise salaries of road maintenance workers from \$175 to \$185 per month. The men work a 10 hour day, it was pointed out.

Bids will be opened next Saturday by the Court on materials for a bridge to be built over the Pease river in the extreme northeastern part of Floyd County. The bridge will be over a quarter mile long and is on a road running from that section into Quitaque.

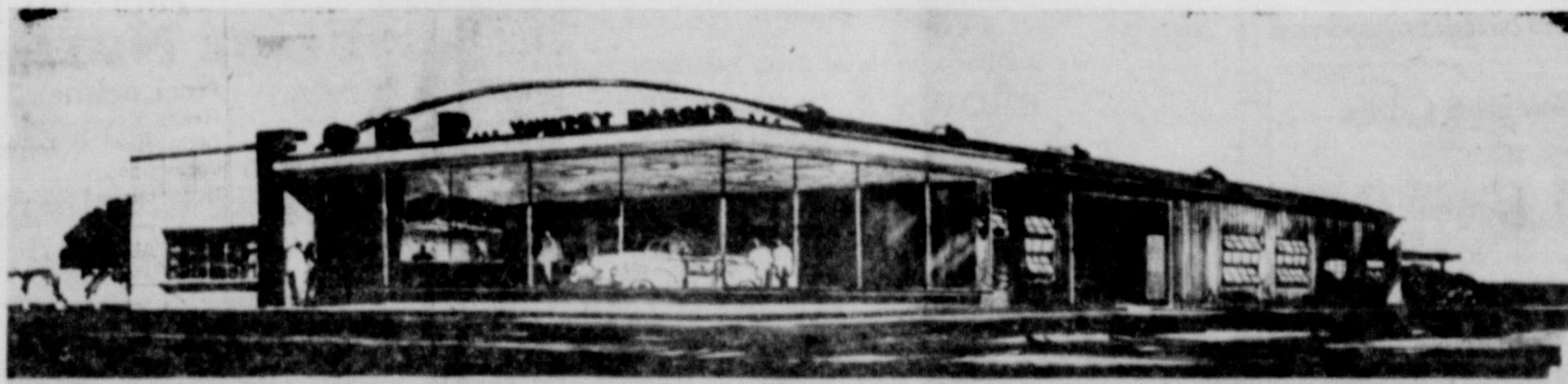
Reports will be heard from delegates who attended the Texas Home Demonstration Association meeting at Galveston the latter part of September.

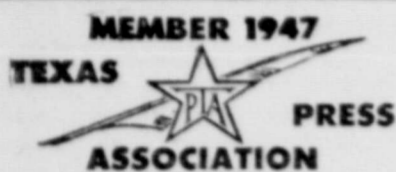

WHY A NEWSPAPER QUIT

The Elmira, New York, News, recently quit publication, and in a final editorial the owners told why. It was because they could no longer endure the conditions imposed on the paper by the strong typographical union.

Before it would renew an expiring contract, the union demanded that the publisher of the News sign a document called "Conditions of Employment". That document did a great deal more than put into effect new wage scales, increased vacation privileges, etc. It made it possible for the printers to walk off the job if anything happened which wasn't to their liking. As the editor wrote, "We had the feeling that to agree to it would be an American and cowardly. A demand for increased wages is one thing, but to agree to many provisions in the document in question would be like lying down to enable a bully to kick you with facility."

will have to consider the problems of the fellow who has to dig up the money to meet the payrolls to pay the men agitators represent, but that time is not here and we do not intend to risk bankruptcy waiting for that time.

"We're dammed well sick to boot, of having to treat with the average present-day union labor leader in order to stay in business."

The rank and file of union labor, whether it works at the printing trades or anything else, wants steady employment and good pay conditions. It doesn't want employers to be forced out of business by union

excesses. But too many of the leaders of labor have the mentalities of dictators. Their lust for power knows no bounds. And that, in the long run, will make serious trouble for the workers, no less than the employers, of this country.

UNLESS LABOR CLEANS HOUSE

Victor Riesel, the well-known labor columnist, recently had an article in Look entitled, "Labor Still Hasn't Cleaned House." He then made several specific charges, including: "There is a cold and brutal dictatorship in many unions. Many unions are closed baronies that refuse to admit new members, charge ludicrously high initiation fees and ban applicants for racial and religious reasons. Skilled communists, now using key labor unions for political purposes, have not been ousted by national labor leaders."

Such charges have been made before. But they are especially impressive when made by Mr. Riesel, as he is completely sympathetic to the legitimate labor movement and writes about nothing but labor matters. It is evident that labor's best friends are now dismayed by the policies and points of view of some of the enormously powerful leaders. These leaders have lost almost all touch with actual labor—the people who do the work of the country. They are busy creating dynasties for themselves and the inner circles which surround their courts. And, as the growing concern over communists in labor's ranks shows, some of them are moved by ideological beliefs which are at the opposite pole from the American tradition.

What this all adds up to, as Mr. Riesel also observes, is that the unions must clean house—or the

public will clean it for them. The labor leaders who are now spending much of their time indiscriminately denouncing the Taft-Hartley law should realize that this measure is innocuous in the extreme compared with what will come if labor excesses continue. Union labor is not bigger than the nation.

Rotan Dairyman Has Prize Winning Cow

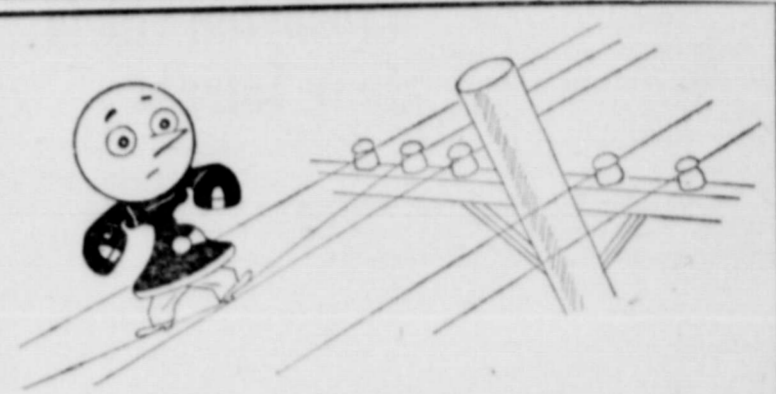
College Station.—Brampton Irene Ash, a registered Jersey cow owned by J. C. White, Rotan, has been given the silver Medal Award of the American Jersey Cattle Club for completing an outstanding production record.

Extension dairymen at Texas A. and M. College were informed by the cattle club's headquarters in Columbus, Ohio, that White's cow has chalked up a production record of 11,369 pounds of milk and 582 pounds

of butterfat over a 205-day period. Her tests were verified by both the University of Illinois and the American Jersey Cattle Club.

In compiling this record, the cow produced more than two and one half times as much butterfat as the average dairy cow in the United States. She has also been officially classified for type by the cattle club and given the high rating of Very Good.

Farm cash income for the South Plains increased 150% from 1927 to 1943, more than any other crop reporting district in the state.

If the government cannot sell war time industrial plants at a satisfactory price by leaving them on location, it is recommended that the plants be sold by removal from plant sites. This suggestion grew out of a meeting of leading financiers, bankers and civic leaders held recently at the Grand Prairie zone office of War Assets Administration. It is admitted that some difficulty has been met in receiving offers satisfactory to the government, to the would-be purchasers and to the communities involved. As a result, an invitation was sent out to important financial and industrial leaders in the Southwest to lend of their business experience in advice to WAA in disposing of these war plants.

The recommendation for sale for removal from premises related specifically to four plants. These are (with their original cost to the government) as follows: Magnolia Petroleum Company toluene distillation plant at Beaumont, \$3,200,000; Kelly-Springfield Tire Company at Houston, \$2,900,000; Cardox Corporation potassium perchlorate plant at Claremore, Oklahoma, \$1,100,000; and Aluminum Company of America, Sinter plant, \$4,000,000. All of these plants had previously been advertised for sale in place. 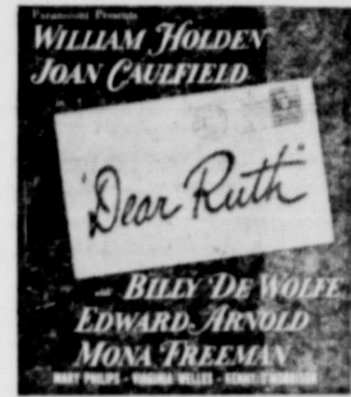

Miss Petty Gives Peach Borer Remedy

Here's your regular horticultural tip from Miss Leila Petty, County Home Demonstration Agent from the Extension Service of Texas A. & M. College, and this time she's talking about an insect that eats Texas fruit growers out of plenty of dollars every year. The peach borer is the insect, and what it takes to kill it is really a mouthful: paradichlorobenzene or ethylene dichloride.

October treatment for the borer will kill him out before the real damage is done, says Miss Petty. First you'll want to check to see if you've got borer trouble, and this consists of taking a look at two or three pieces of wax which comes out of the tree down near the ground line. If tiny sawdust particles are mixed in the wax, you can start treating, because you've got borers.

To apply the paradichlorobenzene, you first want to take a hoe and pull the soil back from the tree, down to the crown of the root system. Scrape off all gum and loose bark. Then pull your soil back up around the tree to a height of about six or eight inches, and smooth off the top of the mound. Then apply your material, one ounce of paradichlorobenzene for a tree that's over three years of age. Pour it in a circle, about two or three

inches from the tree. Don't let it contact the tree or burning may occur. Then cover the material with half-inch of soil and the job is done. If you use the other material, ethylene dichloride, you can pour it around the body of the tree without preparing a mound of soil to hold the gas. The usual treatment is from one-half to one pint of the material per tree, depending on the age and size of each.

Both of these materials can ordinarily be bought at your local drug or seed store. And at a cost of only a few cents per tree, borer damage can be eliminated. Elephants are known to have lived to be 150 to 200 years of age; crocodiles, 100 years; and tortoises over a hundred years.
