#### Future of Dairy Business Depends On Good Breeding

That's what extension dairymen of Texas A. &. M. College are saying. And that "if" is mighty important.

"If the herd replacements are the result of a good bull; If the feeding program is built around good pastures, high quality hay and plenty of silage, and If the job of managing the herd is handled in such a way that the cows produce quality products for the market, then the dairy outlook is good."

Good dairy management goes back. in the end, to one thing: The right kind of sire for the herd. The feeding program won't help much if the cows are culls; there won't be plenty of quality products for the market if the cows aren't good producers and aren't handled right. The way to get the best results, all the way round, is to pick out a good bull.

The extension dairymen say that a prospective buyer should thoroughly investigate the bull under consideration. Go back to the records of his sire and dam and his grand sire and grand dam. The production records and type classifications of tested
