#### Soil of Plant Food **Mineral Supply Needed To Restore Fertility**

Home Demonstration Agent.

Heavy wartime croppings drained twice as much nitrogen from Illinois soils as was put back by fertilizer applications or legume crops, de-clares O. L. Whalin, University of Illinois. What was true in Illinois was true of farm soils in numerous other Midwestern states.

Approximately 3,300,000 tons of nitrogen were removed from the soil in harvested crops in the 1942-46 period, Whalin points out. But only about 1,500,000 tons of nitrogen were returned to the land. This replacement included nitrogen in fertilizer applications, plus 60 per cent of the nitrogen in legumes harvested and in sweet clover turned under.

The supply of other mineral eleed for quality and price. ments was seriously depleted. Whalin estimates that only about half of the phosphorus taken from the soil was replaced. Less than onethirtieth as much potash was added through commercial fertilizers as sheets and one type of percale were was removed by harvested crops. shown "This heavy drain on the soil's

mineral supply," says Whalin, "has reached the point where crop yields on many soils definitely depend on the amount of minerals applied. Manure, inoculated legumes, phosphate and potash are required, will maintain and even increase yields on







CHICAGO. - Harry Anheier, secret service chief in this city, announced the destruction of a \$600,-000 counterfeiting ring which had flooded the Midwest with bogus \$10 and \$20 bills.

Five men were arrested in raids throughout the city and agents seized \$415,000 in counterfeit bills, a sympathy and kind deeds, that number of engraved plates both used and unusued, and stocks of printing ink and paper. It is expected that at least an additional \$100,-000 in false money will be uncovered after the prisoners have been questioned further, Anheier said.

#### Largest Since 1934. The secret service chief described the counterfeiting ring as the largest since 1934 when "Count" Victor Lustig and his gang flooded the nation with nearly 21/2 million dollars in bogus notes. Lustig received a 20 year prison sentence

#### Homemade Weighing **Bin Speeds Work Device Aids Automatic** Feed Handling Setup

It is an old saying that all farm equipment was first thought of by a farmer. Whether that saying holds certain that much of it did come into being as the result of ideas which some farmer had concerning performance of his various chores. A pertinent example of this fact is shown in the accompanying illustration. It shows a homemade weighing bin, which was conceived by a Midwestern farmer for use with his automatic feed handling setup. It holds several tons of feed and is fixed to the ceiling by a series of heavy springs and turnbuckles, one spring being located at each corner of the bin in the center of two turnbuckles. Tension on the springs moves a pointer across a scale at the bottom of the bin to indicate weight up to 3,200 pounds.

A slide gate at the bottom of the bin permits feed to spill out into a cart in desired quantities. The bin

is placed below a chute leading from a two-ton mixer in the barn mow. The entire setup operates as follows: Whole grain is blown into an overhead bin, from which it flows into a blower-equipped hammermill on the first floor. Ground grain is blown back into the mixer and then drops into the weighing bin. The mixer and grinder are operated by five-horsepower motors, whereas the whole grain is blown into the storage bin by tractor power.

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

First Bought Legally.

Most smuggled goods are first bought legally in Hong Kong from foreign suppliers. From there they are routed to Canton or Macau, from where they make their way to the wealthy Shanghai market. With the government tightening up at Canton, more goods are going by way of Macau. American business men in Shang-

hai are of two minds about seeing their goods arrive this way. One said:

"We are in the Far East to do business. As far as we are concerned, we legitimately sold our goods to purchasers in Hong Kong. What happens to the goods afterward, and whether or not they are smuggled into China, is none of our concern.' But another American, represent-

ing a large Américan firm, said this:

"Hong Kong is one market. China is another. We don't like our goods flowing from one market to the other illegally, causing price fluctuations in either market which we are unable to control and which might react unfavorably toward public reception of our goods when the restrictions are off.

But neither he nor any of the business men interviewed could guess when the restrictions are likely to be "off."

#### California Plans Relief Ship To Carry Supplies to Europe

SACRAMENTO, CALIF. - Gov. Earl Warren has disclosed plans for California to send a unique relief ship filled with food and clotning to Europe.

The governor announced that preliminary arrangements had been completed to use the training ship "Golden Bear" of the California Maritime academy on the trip. Donations will be solicited, he said, for the 1,500-ton cargo the ship will carry to Greece, Italy and possibly France.







## **3** Unions Block Labor Peace-Refuse Wage Boost Already Accepted by 19 Other Railroad Unions!

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engi-neers, Brotherhood of Locomotive Fire-men and Enginemen and the Switchmen's Union of North America, representing 125,000 railroad employes, have refused to accept the offer of the Railroads of a wage increase of 15½ cents an hour. This is the same increase awarded 1,000,000 non-operating employes by an arbitration board in September, 1947. This is the same increase accepted by

This is the same increase accepted by 175,000 conductors, trainmen and switchmen by agreement on November 14, 1947. Agreements have been made with 1,175,000 employes, represented by nine-teen unions. But these three unions, representing only 125,000 men, are trying to get more. They are demanding also many new working rules not embraced in the settlement with the conductors and train-

Incidentally, the Switchmen's Union of North America represents only about 7% ot all railroad switchmen, the other 93% being represented by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and covered by the settlement with that union

#### Strike Threat

The leaders of these three unions spread a strike ballot while negotiations were still in progress. This is not a secret vote but is taken by union leaders and votes are signed by the employes in the presence

of union representatives. When direct negotiations failed, the leaders of these three unions refused to n the railroads in asking the National Mediation Board to attempt to settle the dispute, but the Board took jurisdiction dispute, but the Board took jurisdiction at the request of the carriers and has been earnestly attempting since November 24, 1947, to bring about a settlement. The Board on January 15, 1948, announced its inability to reach a mediation settle-ment. The leaders of the unions rejected the request of the Mediation Board to arbitrate. The railroads accepted.

#### What Now?

The Unions having refused to arbitrate, the Railway Labor Act provides for the appointment of a fact-finding board by the President.

The railroads feel it is due shippers, passengers, employes, stockholders, and the general public to know that throughout these negotiations and in mediation, they have not only exerted every effort to reach a fair and reasonable settlement, but they have also met every requirement of the Railway Labor Act respecting the negotiation, mediation, and arbitration of labor disputes

It seems unthinkable that these three unions, representing less than 10 per cent of railroad

employes, and those among the highest paid. can successfully maintai. he threat of a par-alyzing strike against the interest of the entire country-and against 90 per cent of their fellow employes.

The threat of a strike cannot justify grant-ing more favorable conditions to 125,000 em-ployes than have already been put in effect for 1,175,000, nor will it alter the opposition of the railroads to unwarranted wage in-creases or to changes in working rules which are not justified.

A glance at the box shows what employes represented by the Engineers and Firemen make. They are among the highest paid in the ranks of labor in the United States, if not the highest.

#### **64** Lose Their Lives **Climbing Alps in '47**

#### **Drouth Conditions Are Blamed** For High Mortality.

ROSENLANI, SWITZERLAND. -Climbing in the Swiss Alps during the 1947 season was marked by several notable feats, but an unofficial tally indicates that the sport took 64 lives.

The dead include 52 Swiss, 8 Englishmen, 2 Frenchmen, 1 Scotswoman and 1 American. Victims ranged from amateurs to veteran climbers, from 7 years of age to 80. In addition, some 30 persons were seriously injured.

The unofficial death list of 64 compares with a toll of 57 officially reported for the summer of 1946.

Drouth conditions which made rocks brittle and opened crevices in creased toll. Reports from Mont Blanc in France and from the Italian side of the Matterhorn indicated that similar conditions there led to an increased number of accidents. The Swiss figures do not include more than 20 who lost their lives in the Mont Blanc area, just across

the Swiss-French frontier. While no definite figures are available, the number of climbers in the summer of 1947 far surpassed the figure for 1946 because the number of tourists had increased. Also, a minimum of snow and ice on the Alpine peaks attracted many who otherwise might not have ventured

In one day, at the peak of the season, 150 persons climbed the 13,-700 foot Matterhorn from the Swiss side. Never, since an Englishman, Edward Whymper, conquered the Matterhorn 82 years ago, had so many persons representing so many nationalities tackled the peak.

Meanwhile hard bitten climbers continued the conquest of more difficult peaks. Swiss Guide Jakob Hefti blazed a new trail up the north wall of the Eggstock. Two other Swiss, Alfons Voit and Rob-





#### Chinese Fishing Boat Sinks; **19 Soldiers Are Drowned**


TSINGTAO, CHINA. — An over-loaded fishing vessel sank 10 miles off Tsingtao and 19 soldiers and the owner were drowned.
