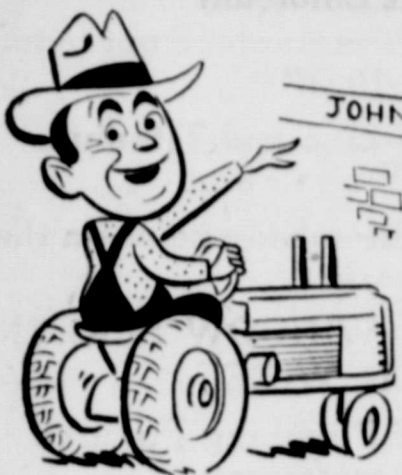

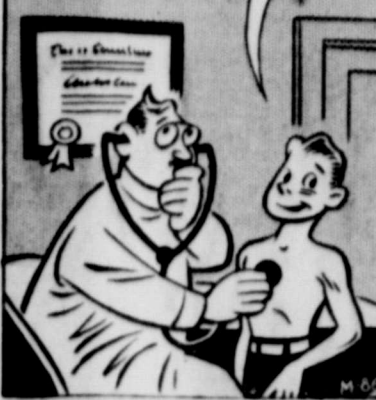

Course Of Feed Prices Discussed

COLLEGE STATION—Grain crop prospects over the country are quite favorable, the USDA reports. Grain producers and consumers realize that supplies of feedgrains are low in comparison to stocks a year ago. Now, with Texas' oats and barley crops not turning out so well, what are feed prices likely to do?

C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist of Texas A. & M. College, says that according to the Bureau of Agricultural Economics prices of feed grains will probably hold near the April level through the spring. Prices this summer will be affected by the size of the grain crops harvested, and by the prospects for this year's corn crop.

If crops are indicated to be average or larger, the oats and barley prices are expected to decline seasonally, beginning late in the spring. Corn prices are likely to be relatively higher than other feed grains and wheat this summer, since most of the decline in corn prices will take place this fall. Prices of feeds are expected to be generally lower in the last half of this year than in the same period of 1947.

So the total U. S. production, or prospective supplies, seem to be the thing to watch. It seems a safe guess

that the feed prices should soon turn lower, if there are no bad weather developments.

Here's what Texas farmers were getting for their grains in April of last year and what they got in the same month of this year:

Wheat	\$2.43 per bu.	\$2.23
Corn	1.67 per bu.	2.25
Oats	.98 per bu.	1.25
Barley	1.34 per bu.	1.77
Grain sorghum	2.70 per 100 lbs.	3.55

Local prices of grain and other crops often decline during the harvest seasons because of temporary "piling up" of supplies. During periods of prospective price declines, the inventory stocks should be held to a practical minimum, concludes Bates.

Board Seeks New President For Tech

Thompson, chairman of the board of directors, announced at the recent directors meeting held at the college.

Pres. W. M. Whyburn leaves the college Sept. 1 to become head of the department of mathematics at the University of North Carolina.

A committee composed of Direc-

tors Leon Ince, Houston; Charles Woodriddle, Dallas; Robert B. Price, El Paso; and O. B. Ratliff, Lubbock, was named by Thompson to interview during the next few weeks applicants and any possible candidates for the presidency, and to make definite recommendations to the board by the next meeting, July 10.

Chairman Thompson said that it is the intention of the committee to narrow the list of candidates to six by the summer meeting.

A spokesman from the board said that the board hopes to make a final choice this summer, but he indicated an acting president may be named for a short period if an appointment cannot be completed before Sept. 1.

COURAGEOUS OPPOSITION

Twelve labor leaders could bring this nation to a standstill "in just half an hour," said Cecil B. DeMille, motion picture producer and director, in testifying before the House Labor Committee, which is reviewing labor laws. He urged laws guaranteeing "the right to work." He is the central figure in a four-year-old dispute with the union over his refusal to pay a one dollar political assessment for which he was suspended by the American Federation of Radio Artists. Since then, Mr. DeMille has not been allowed to work on the air for any employer.

In testifying before the Committee, the witness said: "We have seen the danger to the right to work from employers, but the unions have now broken that, and... the pendulum has swung the other way... the unions have gone too far."

Mr. DeMille urged the Committee to consider a law declaring a "fundamental right to work," and stated a Constitutional amendment might be necessary to guarantee it. He blamed both labor and management for "battering" a man's right to work when and where he pleased. "A Federal right-to-work law backed up by stiff criminal penalties and substantial civil damages would go far to clarify the just limits of the right to strike and discourage use of goon tactics on American citizens who want to exercise their right to work."

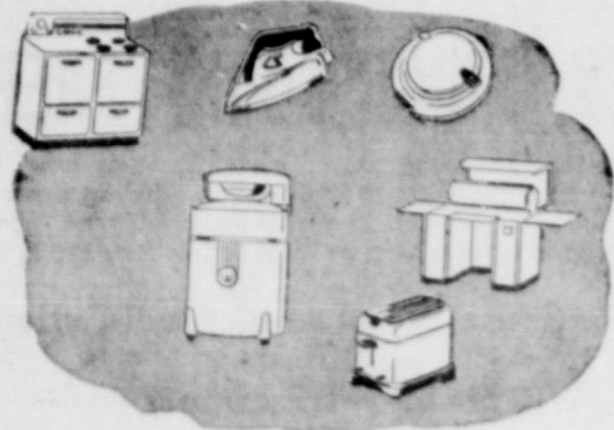

Soil Conservation District News

Mr. W. T. Cooper of Barwise community was recently in the District office wanting some information on harvesting vetch for seed. He has about twenty acres of vetch that is trying to mature a seed crop and is blooming at the same time. Mr. Cooper thought he would cut the vetch with a broadcast binder, leaving it in a wind row. He would combine it from the wind row after it has cured.

W. C. Wisdom of Lockney sowed some vetch in volunteer wheat last fall. It was watered and grazed most of the winter and spring by cattle. He expects to harvest a good hay crop of wheat and vetch.

The Soil Conservation Service technicians assigned to the Floyd County Soil Conservation District assisted Bud Casey of South Plains in an irrigation problem. He had been unable to water all of the ground he needed to.

The field crew has been quite busy making topographic maps on irrigated farms the last several days.

Several irrigation farmers are planning on harvesting a wheat crop and then putting the land into grain sorghums. They expect to cash in on high prices of grain, but it will take a lot of fertility out of the land. Some of this land will be planted to vetch in the fall to aid in building back the fertility.

Sterling Parrish Visits Here Saturday

"It is my sincere belief that the passage of this proposed act would cause an almost immediate increase in the prices of merchandise to the consuming public thereby raising the cost of living and contributing to further inflation. My obligation, both as a citizen and as State Senator, to the general public of this district impels me to fight this legislation."
