Lucas 78 Bushel **Wheat Sets Record**

A record for any country was set by O. A. Lucas on his farm located just south of Aiken and four miles west of Lockney this year when he cut slightly over 78 bushels of wheat off of a 5 ½ acre patch. The wheat was cut last Friday and heralded in several daily papers as the highest yield ever recorded in this area.

Standing almost five feet high, the field was almost a solid mass of heavy heads.

Mr. Lucas owns an 80 acre farm. The land was summer fallowed last year and the year previous produced a crop of potatoes. The round was irrigated once before planting and three times after coming up. The wheat was certified Tenmarq.

O. C. Bailey also produced a good crop on his farm just at the south edge of Lockney. Final calculations showed that the field located on the highway produced 48 bushels per acre and the field just west of his house produced 42 bushels per acre, he said this week. His wheat was certified Westar.

Other heavy yields have been reported. W. H. Fields, who suffered a 50% hail loss last Friday afternoon had cut two or three rounds in his wheat before the hail and some estimated that it was making 60 bushels.

Tom Rankin who lives in the Lone Star community had some excellent wheat before he also suffered a hail · loss Saturday night.

Elevator men are estimating that the wheat harvest is probably 35 to 50% through in this immediate area.







COLLEGE STATION-Wheat with fertilizer and wheat without fertilizer showed quite a difference on Hale county farms, reports County Agent

Manuel W. Ayers. Mr. F. B. (Buck) Hunt, who lives 10 miles northwest of Plainview, has several plots for demonstration purposes, and is finding out quite a bit about how good fertilizer really is.

On his 350 acres, Hunt has tried several difference farm management practices where he uses different amounts of fertilizer on his plots. On one wheat plot Hunt applied 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate last fall before plowing. Another section is in summer fallow wheat land, and some has been planted to wheat only year after year. One plot under each of these conditions was left as a check plot.

The fertilized wheat on summer fallow looks as if it is doing the best of all, says Hunt. He estimates about 45 bushels to the acre. The unfertilized on summer fallow is estimated at around 20 bushels. On one plot of





Hunt realizes that commercial fertilizer is not the whole answer to keeping the soil at its highest producing level. In order to maintain his soil fertility, he will have to develop a crop rotation system using winter legumes and other cover crops that add humus to the soil.

Hunt is not the only one. Quite a few farmers in Hale county are having similar experiences with fertilizers on irrigated crops this year, reports Avers.
