I am proud of my record as County Judge and earnestly solicit your inspection of that record. As budget officer of the Court, I have tried to hold the expenses of the county within our budget and income. As you know that has been hard to do in the face of rising prices. If you will inspect the County's financial statement taken from the records of the county treasurer and published by the County Clerk in February, you will note that all the county's accounts are in excellent shape. Not too much surplus, but in the black as of Jauary 1, 1948. I have always opposed the raising of valuations of our property and will still oppose same unless it becomes an absolute necessity, realizing that once we get our bonded indebtedness, interests, etc., adjusted to a higher valuation, it would be hard to reduce them and ever get out of debt.

You have had the advantage of my training and 18 years experience in practicing law, in leading the Commissioners Court and in conducting county court.

Believing that I have a good understanding with the Highway Department, I would like to help complete and carry out according to promise the new gigantic highway program you have voted for the county. We are promised some additional federal farm-to-market roads to be set up in possibly September, recently set up by Congress.

I am for working out a co-operative plan to control the bindweed and the Johnson Grass along our roads. I assure you it has been a pleasure to serve you as your County Judge.


