Mr. Frizzell succeeds Robert W. Smith, whose term expired June 30. 1948. Also on the committee are J. Herschel Green, Route 5, Floydada, and Ernest Lee Thomas, Route 1, Lockney, Texas. A committee of three serves in each agricultural county throughout the Nation in which the agency makes farm ownership and operating loans. Appointments are scheduled so a committee always has two experienced members.

The Floyd County committee has an important place in making supervised credit available to local farmers, according to William E. Anderson, County Supervisor.

Before any money can be borrowed through the agency an applicant must also be approved by the committee. "The members know agriculural conditions in the county, are often familiar with the farm the applicant plans to operate," Mr. Anderson explained.

In addition to approving the loans the committee cooperates with the county supervisor in overall administration of the program in the county. Periodically they review the progress of borrowers to determine whether they have reached a financial position that would enable them to refinence their loans through private lenders. A farmer who is eligible for a lo from regular lending sources is no eligible for a loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

"Using this system of operation, the agency has helped many families in Floyd County toward better farming and better living with farm purchase and farm operating loans," Mr. Anderson said.
