Dee B. Bennett Claimed by Death

Dee B. Bennett, a native of Lockney and a veteran of World War I, passed away last Friday, July 30, in the veterans hospital at Temple. He had been in ill health for a long time and had been in the veterans hospitals at McKinney and Temple for 13 months prior to his death.

Mr. Bennett was born at the Bennett home two miles southeast of Lockney on September 20, 1898. He was reared here and lived here most of his life until about four years ago when he went to California. He was employed in that state until he came back to Texas to enter the hospital.

Funeral services were held at the Main Street Church of Christ in Lockney Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock. J. W. Channell officiated at the services. Interment was in Lockney cemetery with Carter Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

1948 Wheat Yield In Floyd County Less Than Million Bushels

A recent tabulation by the County Agent's office of wheat received by elevators from the wheat harvest in Floyd County shows that a total of 675,146 bushels had been received as of July 19th. Grain men estimated that they would receive in the neighborhood of 25,000 bushel more and that approximately 50,000 bushels for feed and seed was in farm storage. Thus the total wheat yield in 1948 may run a little over three quarters of a million bushels. Possibly wheat shipped out by truck to outside selling points might bring the amount produced to a figure somewhat under a million bushels. The Agent said much of the wheat land was plowed early and yields next year should be well above those of 1948, due to a large amount of summer fallowing, if climatic conditions were favorable.

Kenneth Don Hill Improving Rapidly; May Get Well

"Kenneth Don hasn't had a transfusion in a month now. His blood count is climbing. The way he is doing at present it looks as if he might get well completely." Such were the cheering words written to friends here by James Hill, father of Kenneth Don, in letters received during the past week.

Kenneth Don entered the John Sealy Hospital at Galveston over two months ago, a victim of the dread disease leukemia. His blood count was down to one million, his parents were unable to find enough blood donors with the rare ABRH negative type blood, and they had little hope that he would ever recover from the usually fatal disease.

But just at the critical moment, the Amarillo Daily News carried a story of a new chemical which scientists hoped would help leukemia victims. A R. Meriwether of Lockney noticed the story, called the parents' attention to it, and their doctor called the John Sealy hospital for permission to enter the boy there for treatment with the new chemical. Permission was given immediately and he and his mother took a plane for Galveston. Then began treatment with the new drug.

The letters received during the past week by A. R. Meriwether and also by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Cooper, were equally cheering. Other excerpts from the letters were:

"He has been out of the hospital seven weeks. The doctor said for us to stay two more weeks at least, maybe longer. We are going to stay until the doctors think it will be alright for us to bring Kenneth home. His blood count now is over three million. He gets the new drug every other day."

Farm Cash Income Up From May Total

AUSTIN, Texas.—Texas farm cash income, totaling \$131,858,000, climbed 23 per cent from May to June, the Bureau of Business Research reported.

However, June farm cash income slid 29 per cent below June 1947.

Wheat brought Texas farmers \$33,769,000 in June, for the greatest source of farm cash income. Increased marketings of oats, wool, sheep, calves, poultry, eggs, and milk products contributed to the over-all gain from May.

The largest farm cash income was in the Red Bed Plains where farmers' incomes increased 95 per cent from a month earlier, totaling \$24,346,000. Black and Grand Prairies' income totaled \$19,652,000, and Edwards Plateau registered \$18,800,000.

Farm incomes in Black and Grand Prairies and East Texas Timbered

Plains more than doubled their May averages, as sales of wheat, cattle, and fruits and vegetables increased. Decreases over the month were reported in the South Texas Plains, the Lower Rio Grande Valley, the Southern High Plains, the Trans-Pecos area, and the Coastal Prairies, in that order.

Only the Lower Rio Grande Valley, Edwards Plateau, Coastal Prairies, South Texas Plains, and the Trans-Pecos areas reported June-to-June gains, ranging from 19 to 4 per cent. Declines varied from 49-per-cent dips in the Red Bed Plains and the East Texas Timbered Plains to an 8-per-cent drop in the Southern Texas Prairies.

For the first one-half of 1948, farm cash income has been \$539,182,000 as compared to \$579,845,000 for a like period in 1947.

Adjusted for seasonal variations, the Bureau's index of farm cash income for June was 345 per cent of the prewar base period (1935-39).

Carl said that results were gratifying. Many students volunteered, learned facts valuable to themselves and gave his students something to work with.

Unthrifty Pigs May Need Worming

COLLEGE STATION—Pigs that are fed a good ration and still remain unthrifty are likely to have roundworms. Likewise, if you raise a litter of pigs on ground that was formerly occupied by pigs, there is a good chance the second litter will have roundworms.

Dr. W. C. Banks, extension veterinarian of Texas A & M. College, says that these worms may be passed right on out through the body and onto the ground. An examination of the pig lot may show presence of these worms. They can be identified as being large, thick yellow or pink worms about lead pencil size.

Weaned pigs of any age may be wormed, but the best time to worm pigs is two or three weeks after weaning. Pigs are weaned at around 56 days of age, so when a pig is two and a half months old, this is a good time to worm them. For best results, move the pigs to a concrete floor, worm them and bring them back to the pen or pasture after three days.

Another method is to worm them in the original pen, and later move them to different pen, or out to the pasture three days after worming. Moving the pigs helps break the worm's life cycle and thus reduces the number of worms.

Sodium fluoride is the best chemical to use for worming pigs because is 90 percent or better effective, the cost is low, it is easy to get, and is not harmful to the pig if given as directed.

Dr. Banks suggests not to worm over six to ten pigs at one time. Directions call for one pound of sodium fluoride mixed thoroughly with 100 pounds of dry feed. And if you don't have that many pigs, mix one level teaspoon with one pound of dry feed for every pig weighing 25-35 pounds. Some of the larger pigs may be given another pound 12 hours after the first dose. If a second worming is required, repeat the treatment in 20 days.

Two wormings will probably be enough unless the pigs are left on ground that is severely infested with roundworms. Important: keep in mind, says Dr. Banks, that sodium fluoride is a poison, and if it is improperly mixed, or too much is used, the pigs may be poisoned.

Truth is best understood by those who have experienced its value.

THE BERLIN PROBLEM

The importance of Berlin to the Western allies cannot be judged purely on material grounds. We and England, could administer our part of Germany from within our zone. It is possible that we would have been better off if we had never established headquarters in Berlin at all. It is certainly clear that we should have initially insisted on a supply corridor of our own, rather than trusting to generalized verbal agreements with Stalin. But all that is water over the dam, and the unfortunate fact is that American prestige is inextricably tied in with the Berlin controversy. It is now a question of what the Chinese call "face."

On top of that, there is a vital question of moral obligation involved. Should Russia take over Berlin, thousands of prominent anti-Nazi and anti-communist Germans who have sided courageously with the Western world might be liquidated. At best, they would suffer severe privations. And that would certainly weaken the democratic spirit in the other European nations which are on our side.

So Berlin has become a symbol—a testing ground of the strength of two opposed theories of life and gov-

ernment. And that is why we have held firm, and are running the greatest risks in an attempt to hold our ground and to induce Russia to live up to what we consider clear agreements made during and immediately after the war.

It is all a gamble on both sides. We are gambling that the Russians do not want war and will decide to cooperate. Our diplomatic notes, though couched in strong terms, have been designed to give Russia a chance to pull back without sacrificing her own prestige. The Russians are also gambling that the United States will not let matters reach the point where war is the only solution, and will either withdraw from Berlin, or, more likely

will agree to a new conference on the disposition of Germany on Soviet terms.

The high American authorities, both in Berlin and Washington, have acted with calmness and restraint. General Clay has given no ground, but neither has he rattled the saber. Secretary Marshall has said again and again that U. S. policy is based on avoiding "the tragedy of war" with Russia. However, there is always the danger of some "incident" that will stir up great popular anger, lead to a further succession of incidents, and so make the chance of open hostilities imminent.

In that connection, there is one school of people who seem to feel that eventual war with Russia is inevitable, and that we should start it now while we have the A-bomb, and the Communists, presumably, have not. Anyone who believes in this theory of so-called "preventive war" would do well to read an article in the July Harper's by Hanson W. Baldwin. Mr. Baldwin is military editor of the New York Times, and has written many books and innumerable brief pieces on military affairs. According to him, the major Russian industrial targets are beyond the range of present-day bombers, unless we go to the extreme of one-way, suicide missions—which would certainly be alien to the American mentality. On top of that, the Russians are known to be heavy producers of modern fighters. And even if we were to overcome these obstacles, he goes on, we could not destroy the Russian army. It would spread throughout Europe. It has been developed to live off the land to a remarkable extent, thus largely eliminating the need for vulnerable supply trains. We could only achieve ultimate victory, he thinks, by an actual invasion of Europe.

What would be the cost of this? In Mr. Baldwin's opinion, the money cost would be so great as to imperil our economic system and force repudiation of the national debt. In manpower, the casualties would be tremendous—and we have no reason to expect that our own civilian population would be safe from Russian attack with planes and missiles. Further, the very Europe we are trying to save would be lost. In Mr. Baldwin's words, "the ideals and cultures of Western Civilization probably would be forever destroyed if war came before recovery from past illness was accomplished. Preventive war would, therefore, defeat our own purpose; we could conquer Russia, but you do not defeat ideologies by the sword."

Even if we were victorious, in sum, we could lose, and so would all the rest of the world. Each modern war has brought destruction on a scale far greater than its predecessors. No responsible authority believes that World War II would be any exception to this grim rule.

Mr. Baldwin's conclusion is that we must maintain our strength, face the dangers squarely, and do all that we

can to at least delay war. As he puts it, "We face a 'time of troubles.' But we shall not ease our way by inviting war." That, generally speaking, is the attitude of most reasoning people in the West. Under the best conditions, a great many years will go by before the world can recover from the last war. Another, and greater war in the near future would produce consequences beyond the capacity of the human mind to anticipate.

Method of Controlling Bag Worms is Given

A number of local people have reported being troubled by attacks of cedar bag worm on their cedar, Chinese elm, salt cedar, cottonwood, and poplar trees. These destructive pests also sometimes affect roses and can be controlled by spraying with a mixture of three teaspoonsful of lead arsenate to a gallon of water. Four pounds of wettable 50% DDT per 100 gallons of water is also effective where large quantities are needed.

FIRST SCHOOL OF PANHAND

The gentleman from Iowa, sitting on the porch of Clarendon's one hotel, was enjoying the arrival of the Mobeetle stage. Never, at least not during his own three months' residence here, had the stage managed to slip in quietly!

There was always the shrill excitement of the children, the happy barking of their dogs, and, on occasion, an escort of hilarious cowhands. In the background waited the more staid adult population of some two dozen trying in vain to curb their interest in the unloaded mail bags.

As Judge White stroked his little Van Dyke beard and watched the clamoring dusty youngsters, including his own two sons, his mind was jerked to its immediate problem. A school must be started; and somehow, the necessary funds raised.

How about asking the cattlemen to help out?" his wife had queried, but he had vetoed this idea immediately. They were slightly older men with no young children, and were of the rugged individual type that preferred to do things alone.

There was Charles Goodnight, for WATCH YOUR EXPIRATION DATE

instance. He had already become a legend to the people of the Palo Pinto country with his drives through New Mexico. Having amassed a fortune, only to lose it in the crash of '73, he was now on the way towards another. As the first cattle baron on the plains, he had located his Old Home ranch in the Palo Duro canyons in 1876, and the J. A. the following spring. He was also a leader of the Stockmen's Association, which organization was slated to meet in Clarendon quite soon. As went Goodnight, so would likely go the other cattlemen.

Judge Benjamin Horton White, who later became known as the beloved father of Donley County, knew that he had hesitated long enough. As this was a community project, there was only one thing worthy of doing. And he must bear the lion, and do it.

Charles Goodnight listened attentively to the Judge, and then offered to personally present the need to the assembled stockmen. That organization immediately adopted a resolution to establish a school fund. T. R. Dickson, the secretary, was instructed to figure the cost per capita and to mail individual bills to each member.

And thus was instigated the first public school in the Panhandle of Texas. In a picket house and on planks nailed across dry goods boxes, sat the first class: the White boys, the Phillips boys, the Allen girls, the Wagner children, and Wally Parks.
