## Tubbs, Hamilton County Winners

G. C. Tubbs was nominated as County Judge of Floyd County in the second Democratic primary last Saturday. He received 1717 votes to 1156 for Tom W. Deen, his opponent.

T. T. Hamilton received the nomination for Assessor-Collector of Taxes winning over Mrs. Elizabeth McCollum of Lockney by about 309 votes. He received 1589 to 1284 for Mrs. McCollum.

In precinct 3, Carl Plumlee, the present commissioner, defeated Roe Jones by only seven votes. Plumlee's vote was 214 to 207 for Jones, according to unofficial returns.

In precinct 1, Fay Hart won over Claude Fawver. Hart received 283 votes to 235 for Fawver.

Coke Stevenson carried Floyd County by a 269 vote majority over Lyndon Johnson. Stevenson received 1518 votes to 1313 for Johnson. The race was for U. S. Senator. Late returns Thursday showed that Stevenson had a bare 262 vote lead in complete unofficial returns from over the state. Stevenson had 494,336 to 493,965 for Johnson. The actual outcome of the race may not be known until Sept. 13 when the vote will be canvassed by the state Democratic Committee.

Kilmer Corbin of Dawson County carried Floyd County over Sterling Parrish in the race for State Senator. Parrish is the present Senator. In Floyd County Corbin had 1508 votes to 1223 for Parrish. In the district Corbin had a lead of approximately 7,000 votes in almost complete but unofficial returns. Corbin's vote was 28,906 to 29,769 for Parrish.

Hugh Counts, unopposed on this ballot for Commissioner, Precinct 2, received 11056 votes.

**Tech to Play Four Home Games**

Lubbock—Reservations for the Texas Technological college football games in Lubbock this fall are being taken at the stadium offices. Indications are virtually capacity crowds will witness each game. Morley Jennings, Tech athletic director, has observed.

Fans holding season tickets for the games last year have until Sept. 1 to reserve the same seats, he said, and seats not reserved by that date will be assigned others. A sizeable waiting list already has been started. Tech will play four home games

this year: The night of Sept. 13 against West Texas State; afternoon of Oct. 30 in the Homecoming encounter against Rice; Nov. 6 with Texas Mines; and Nov. 20 with the New Mexico Lobos, coached by Berl Huffman, former Texas Tech coach.

Morley Jennings said the bleachers are part of the sections that will increase seating capacity by about 2,500, giving a total capacity of well over 20,000. They are being placed at the north end of the playing field.

**Grass Planting Time**

The planting time for improved pasture mixtures, irrigated pastures, is here. Normally, fall planting is more desirable than spring planting.

Usually, several grasses and a legume are planted in a mixture. This prolongs one growing season and a green plant is available for a longer period of time. Smooth brome, perennial rye, orchard grass and meadow fescue are the best grasses to plant. In the past, crested wheat grass was recommended but it does not respond to irrigation as well as the other grasses. However, if plenty of water is not available, crested

grass will give good results. A legume adds to a pasture. Alfalfa is the best legume but it may cause bloat. Sweet clover or vetch may be used also. In some cases a mixture of grasses without a legume is used.

The rate of seeding is usually 15 to 20 pounds of grass seed, plus 1 to 3 pounds of a legume.

Around one-half inch is the best depth to sow.

The Floyd County Soil Conservation District has a special grass drill for

seeding these mixtures. It has several advantages over a regular grain drill, in that it has two boxes—one for legumes and the other one has an agitator for the light grass seed. The depth of planting and rate of seeding are better controlled and it leaves a firm seed bed. Several District co-operators have rented this drill and more expect to do so in the near future. Bob Simmons of Lockney is looking after the machine for the District.

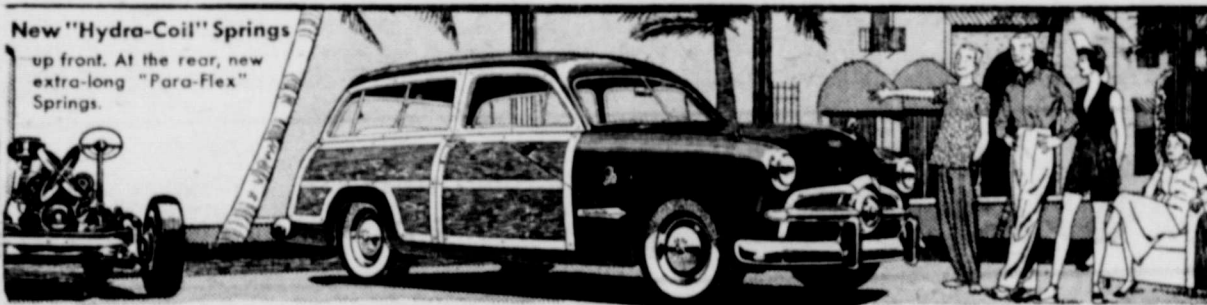

### IS UNIVERSAL MILITARY TRAINING A DEAD ISSUE?

Universal military training did not die at the last session of Congress. It was simply deferred, and the limited draft was enacted as a stop-gap measure. It will be up again next year and unless there is an amazing change for the better in the international scene, it will stand a better than even chance of enactment. Both President Truman and Governor Dewey have gone unequivocally on record in favor of it. So, whoever wins in November, the head man of the government will be a UMT backer.

The arguments pro and con for compulsory training have been and will be argued fervently. But there is one phase of the problem that has been pretty well overlooked. It is this: if we are to have a really effective military force, whether or not it is based on UMT, the people in uniform will have to be given some incentive, and sold on the idea that

they will receive a decent break. At the end of the last war, millions of soldiers, officers included, left the service with the utmost contempt and dislike for the military way of doing things.

This is the theme of an important article in the August Harper's Magazine, written by Robert Wood Johnson. Mr. Johnson is chairman of the board of Johnson & Johnson the well known surgical supply concern. He served in both world wars, rising to the rank

of brigadier general during the second. The core of his idea, as a Harper's editorial note puts it, is that the peacetime army "should be run by men who understand the elementary principles of good management."

Mr. Johnson observes that the traditional military system is to force men to do things. "From this premise," he writes, "grows so much of the dissatisfaction so rampant in the services. Discipline does require authority, especially for the recalcitrant few. But true discipline grows out of confidence in a leader's ability, intelligence, and sense of justice." He cites the fact that progressive industry has learned that the good worker is the man who has pride in his job and a secure sense of his own dignity as an individual. An industrial executive doesn't have to go around loaded with brass and impressive insignia in order to accomplish his duties. And industry has learned that it must give some consideration to the wishes of the people who work for it if the best results are to be obtained.

What this all adds up to, Mr. Johnson thinks, is that the people who run a military force must be experts in personnel, just as are the people who run a successful business. But he realizes that this is nowhere near enough—that men and women must be offered tangible benefits if the military service is to seem attractive as a career. Mr. Johnson cites, for instance, good housing, instead of the dreary barracks which typify most army and navy posts. Other factors would be equitably rotated tours of duty, and educational opportunities on a par with those available to civilians.

Of every great importance, he advocates that "there must be a clear channel of promotion from bottom to top." While some reforms have been made, it is evident that promotion in the military services at present is too dependent on the mere fact of seniority—or worse yet, ability to curry favor with superiors.

Mr. Johnson stirs up a hornet's nest when he advocates the elimination of West Point and Annapolis as they exist today. His basic reason for this is that these institutions "are the fountainhead of the military

caste system which dominates the professional officers of both services. This system sets up insurmountable barriers between the enlisted men and an officer aristocracy and teaches blind obedience to the orders of a ruling class. It creates bitterness from one end of the service to the other." As a substitute for the service schools, he advocates that our regular officers should be turned out in the existing civilian educational system. To support this, he points to the Marines, whose record as a fighting force is unsurpassed. For the most part, this corps is officered by men who came into it via the ROTC system in the universities.

In conclusion, he writes, "Management is a state of mind. On the one

hand, you have management by compulsion, the kind you find in the services today. On the other hand, you have leadership with enthusiastic followers. If enforced military training is allowed to encourage and enlarge upon the malpractices of our present military system, it will weaken our defenses from the top down. It can easily become the Maginot Line of America."

It's a safe bet that the editor of Harper's has been deluged with protesting letters from military men who believe that the present system is the only one. It is only fair to say that some officers with fine records of combat service, such as the late General Patton, were heart and soul for the toughest kind of discipline. Even so, it is difficult to conceive of young Americans going into military service with anything resembling

enthusiasm as long as the caste system exists in its current form. And it may well be that this will become one of the big issues when universal military training comes up for consideration.

Fine Livestock Exhibits Expected At S. P. Fair

Lubbock—The finest livestock exhibits ever seen in the Southwest are indicated for the Panhandle South Plains Fair in Lubbock Sept. 27-Oct. 2 according to Jason O. Gordon, former Lubbock County farm agent, general livestock superintendent.

Helping to stimulate more interest than he ever has observed previously, he said, are the increase of about 50 percent in livestock premiums and the great enlargement of the cattle and swine barns. The departments are better equipped for exhibits than ever before.

"But an important contributor to interest simply is that farmers have more time to think about exhibits for the fair," he explained. "They have been mighty busy the last few years producing the food for a war of survival. That tension has been eased this year."

Mr. Gordon offered some suggestions which, he said, might help those interested in competing for the substantial cash prizes.

He suggested exhibitors should make sure their registration papers are in order and that they get their animals blood-tested if they are not on a regular Bangs' control program. The best plan, he said, is to study the regulations and thus insure that no last-minute difficulties will be encountered.

Mr. Gordon invited inquiries from anyone interested. They will reach him if addressed to the Panhandle South Plains Fair Association.

GO TO CHURCH SUNDAY

Southern Baptists Seek 600,000 New Sunday School Pupils

Southern Baptist Sunday School workers, in the closing session of a six-day leadership conference at Ridgecrest, N. C., last week launched a program to add 600,000 new pupils to the enrollment of their schools and to establish 3,000 new schools during the coming year. The largest gain in any one year in Sunday School enrollment was 265,000.

Dr. R. G. Lee, president of the Southern Baptist Convention said, "Southern Baptists are able to accomplish this enlarged program. The spiritual needs of our nation demand that this job be done now."

J. N. Barnette, secretary of Sunday School promotion for Southern Baptists speaking for the state and south-wide leaders, presented the major items in the expansion program. Mr. Barnette said the present Sunday School enrollment in Southern Baptist churches totals 4,100,000 but there are forty million white people in the territory of the convention not enrolled in any Sunday School.

W. A. Harrell, head of the department of church architecture, said that a recent survey of Baptist churches in the South revealed that thirty million dollars would be spent in the enlargement of church buildings in the next year, and three hundred million in the next ten years. He said that at the present rate of building, Southern Baptist churches would double the capacity of their Sunday School equipment in twelve years.

Dr. W. A. Criswell, pastor of the First Baptist church, Dallas, brought the closing message of the conference on "The Call of the Unfinished Task." Rev. Criswell used as his text the words of the Lord to Joshua, "Arise and lead this people over Jordan."

"Our forefathers have given us marvelous instruments of conquest," declared Dr. Criswell. "They preached, they taught, they built, they organized. Yet they committed to us an unfinished task—one of the most challenging in all of our history. Like our fathers of old, we will face this task courageously and accomplish it."

Employing visual aids, Mr. Barnette used sixty people to present dramatically the threefold emphasis of the expansion program—(1) the enrollment goal of 600,000 net gain, (2) expanded Bible teaching program and (3) a soul winning emphasis.

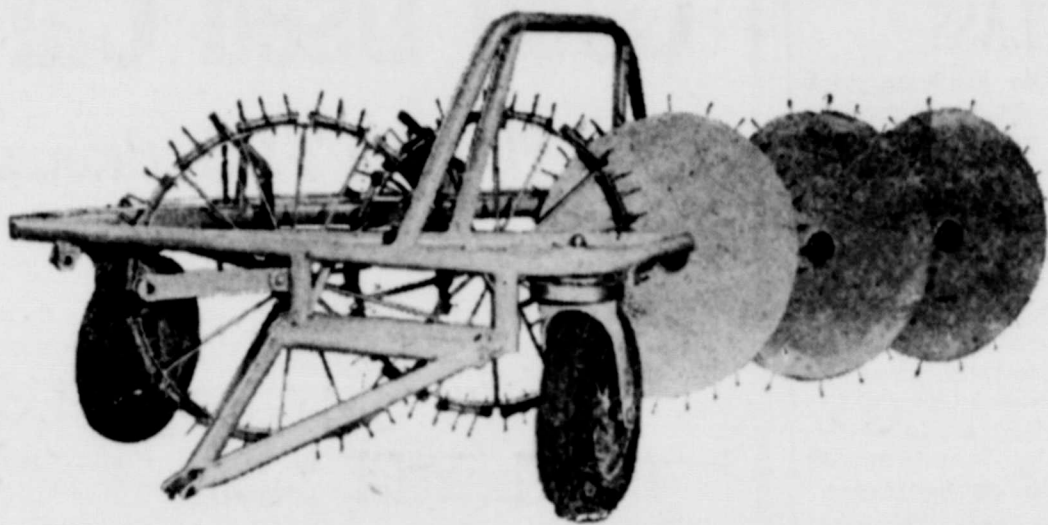

**Insist on Proper Cafe Sanitation**

Austin—The Texas State Department of Health cannot maintain daily inspection of all eating places and the public is urged by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer to insist upon proper sanitation of the establishment where they eat. If the public is careless in this respect the incentive to maintain clean food service will be lessened and operators will only maintain the level the public is willing to accept. He urged that the public patronize "eating establishments which measure up to the high standard of cleanliness."

The State Health Department is making every effort to improve sanitation of eating places. Dr. Cox said, and there is "no excuse for cafe owners not taking advantage of the food handlers schools which are being offered all over the state." He

regulations which require the use of approved equipment and methods in such establishments.

"The public should be aware of these sanitary rules and regulations and insist that restaurants observe them. Patrons should realize that tables and counters will be many times cleaner than the kitchen and other places out of sight," he warned.

He urged milk appraisal by the patrons also. Texas law requires that a milk bottle state the grade of milk, and whether it is raw or pasteurized. "Insist on having the milk served in its original container, with a covered cap and a legal label," Dr. Cox advised.

"Obviously," he said, "the best in sanitation can be had only by close co-operation between the public and the investigators of the State Health Department."

**Surplus Gov't Bldgs. Available for Grain Storage, Announced**

All available surplus government buildings in West Texas will be released for emergency grain storage use in answer to requests to the War Assets Administration by a number of congressmen and farm organizations representing six midwestern and southwestern states, it was disclosed today by Colonel Karl E. Wallace, regional WAA director at Grand Prairie, Texas.

In a move to make immediately available urgently needed storage space for grain sorghum and other products threatened with spoilage because of lack of warehousing facilities in the area, the War Assets Administration has designated the Grand Prairie office as focal point for throwing open surplus government facilities. The Denver and Kansas City WAA offices will relay storage requests from states in their region.

The action followed wires sent to Jess Larson, War Assets Administrator, by Congressman George Mahon in behalf of his district and those of five other congressmen. Similar requests have been received by WAA in the last few days from Walter Hammand, head of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, and from other farm cooperatives, all indicating that the storage situation is critical.

"All suitable buildings not yet sold nor classed by the military as contaminated will be made available to ease this situation," Colonel Wallace said. He added that the program called for utilization of surplus facilities by organized agricultural cooperatives and bonded grain warehousemen.

Structures to be used include the greater portion of the sprawling Panter Ordnance Works near Amarillo. Negotiations with WAA for transferring this installation to Texas Tech college are now in progress, but Texas Tech will cooperate in allocating maximum space, it was indicated.

The WAA will also release available portions of the South Plains Airfield, Lubbock. As they are needed facilities in Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, New Mexico and Colorado will be designated for emergency storage purposes.

Mr. D. W. Williams, vice president for agriculture of Texas A & M college declared that the Bluebonnet Ordnance Works, which the college recently acquired from WAA, would be made available. Producers needing warehousing space, he said, should contact Mr. H. O. Hill, director of the Bluebonnet plant or Mr. J. D. Prewitt of the extension service at College Station, Texas.

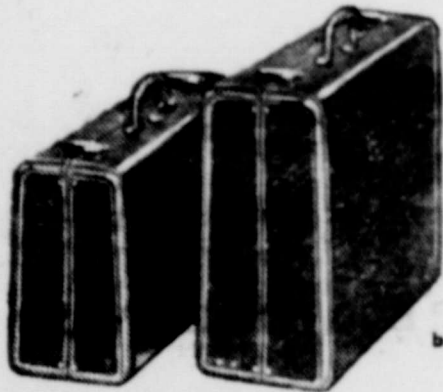
