The couple will stay five years before their first furlough home and thereafter will get a furlough every seven years. They must take with them furniture for a five room house, and clothing, linens and everything else they will need, except food, sufficient to last five years.

Japan has been given top priority for mission appointments. "The door is open in Japan now but will not always remain open unless we take advantage of our opportunity," Dr. Cauthen stated.
