

## Floyd County Couple Going To Japan As Missionaries

A Floyd County couple are going to Japan soon to help Christianize that nation. It became known here this week. They are Rev. and Mrs. Raymond Spence. They have been appointed as missionaries by the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and expect to leave for that country between October 1 and 15.

Housing has already been provided for the couple at Tokyo, Japan, where they will reside the first two years and study the language. Then they will probably be sent to some mission point or place where the Baptist work has already been started to carry on. However, the first two years will not be wasted as far as their work is concerned, Rev. Spence pointed out. They will probably teach English in a school there, teach the Bible, work in Sunday Schools and take a recorded sermon out and play it to groups who did not hear it in the original. They have a wire recorder with which they will record the sermon of the missionary preacher in the Japanese language. They will then take it to other parts of the city for other groups to hear.

### WILL SPEAK SUNDAY—

Rev. Raymond Spence, recently appointed a missionary to Japan, will speak at the Lockney Baptist Church Sunday morning. It was announced this week by the pastor, Rev. E. J. Cobb. Everyone is invited to attend this service and hear Rev. Spence speak, it was said.

The couple will stay five years before their first furlough home and thereafter will get a furlough every seven years. They must take with them furniture for a five room house, and clothing, linens and everything else they will need, except food, sufficient to last five years.

Rev. and Mrs. Spence received their appointment as missionaries in March of this year. They were required to pass a physical examination, and then went to Richmond, Va., to be interviewed by the appointment committee of the Foreign Mission Board. They received their appointment at that time.

Rev. Spence is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Spence of Lockney and was reared here. He is a graduate of Lockney High School, and also Wayland College and Baylor University. He received a Bachelor of Divinity degree from the Southwestern Theological Seminary at Fort Worth on May 7 after a three year course there. He has held pastorates in both Texas and Oklahoma.

Mrs. Spence is the former Inez Gilliland, daughter of S. F. Gilliland and the late Mrs. Gilliland who lived at South Plains for many years. She is also a graduate of Lockney High School, of the Baylor Nursing School and of the University of Texas where she received a Bachelor of Science degree. She was reared at South Plains but her father now lives at Hereford.

Mrs. Spence is being sponsored by the First Baptist Church of Woodward, Okla., who will pay her salary. The Noland Baptist Church plans to pay Rev. Spence's salary as a missionary. It was reported. This church of 300 members is already supporting one missionary on the foreign field.

Baptist Mission work opened in Japan in 1889 and after 41 years the work has produced only 9,000 converts Rev. Spence said. However the Mission Board reports that work has been much more productive since the close of the war. Only 11 Baptist missionaries are working in Japan at present but 18 additional missionaries have been appointed and are going soon to that field. Southern Baptists hope to have 100 missionaries in Japan by 1950, according to Dr. Baker James Cauthen, secretary for mission work in the orient. Japan has been given top priority for mission appointments. "The door is open in Japan now but will not always remain open unless we take advantage of our opportunity," Dr. Cauthen stated.

McDonald, Pontiac dealer of Floydada, of a 1948 Pontiac Torpedo Sedan Coupe, with hydromatic drive and directional signal lights.

Mr. Poe received severe injuries as a result of a plane crash during his war service, and notwithstanding long hospitalization, remains totally disabled.

Mr. Poe applied to L. C. McDonald for the automobile about July 15, and was promised delivery as soon as a car equipped with the necessary special attachments could be shipped from the factory at Pontiac, Michigan.

About September 1, the Pontiac wholesale office at Oklahoma City notified Mr. McDonald that the car was ready, and he immediately brought the car to Floydada where, on Saturday morning, September 3, it was delivered to Mr. Poe. The list price of \$1699.00 for the car will be paid by Veterans Administration, in accordance with the terms of Public Law 663, but Mr. McDonald made no charge whatever for his extensive services in securing and delivering the car, and received no commission on its sale.

## Bank Now In New Quarters

The First National Bank in Lockney moved Tuesday night of this week into their newly remodeled quarters. The bank building has been completely refinished inside and complete new fixtures have been installed.

Remodeling of the building included the lowering of the ceiling and installation of an acoustical covering, installation of new steel casement windows with a green tinted plate glass, installation of venetian blinds, and the laying of a rubberized floor covering of light color. The walls have been plastered and refinished and all woodwork and facings refinished.

Imported Italian marble has been used as a wainscoting on the walls and also used on the partitions and counters in the installation of the new fixtures. A refrigerated cooling system which may be changed into a heating system in the winter time, has been installed. New fluorescent lighting has been put in throughout the building, and new desks and chairs have been purchased.

More than \$17,500 has been spent in remodeling the building and installing new fixtures, W. A. Waldrop, president of the bank said this week.

Although no special function is planned, a formal opening of the new building has been set for Sept. 15, which is the nine month anniversary of Mr. Waldrop's arrival in Lockney. ## Rain Breaks Drouth And Heat Wave; Hail Does Damage

The West Texas drouth is really broken. Rain which started falling Tuesday evening late broke the drouth and the unseasonable September heat wave that had gripped this area for some time. Hail also damaged crops in some sections.

The total rainfall here was measured at 2.45 inches on the gauge at Hammond & Co. This moisture fell all Tuesday night and spasmodically most of the day Wednesday. The rain covered a large portion of West Texas.

An area north of Lockney and just south of Lone Star suffered considerable crop damage. Eight inches of rain and considerable hail fell in that area. Leslie Ferguson had about a 50% loss on cotton and feed on his place 5 1/2 miles north of Lockney, and Becton Potts, just north of Mr. Ferguson reported a 75% loss on his crops. Sid Thomas, Hubert Frizzell and others in this area suffered considerable damage. The damage extended as far east as Sterley, it was reported.

Rain was lighter south of town with about an inch reported by Paul Kropp. Crosby County received very little rain, it was reported.

Although the rain is too late to benefit feed and probably will damage cotton to some extent, it did fall right for the wheat farmers and the large acreage that has been summer fallowed this year because of lack of moisture will probably be sowed to wheat as soon as it is dry enough.

Buffaloes Take on Flagstaff in First Game at Canyon

CANYON, Sept. 16.—(WTNS)—Coach Frank Kimbrough will herd his West Texas State College Buffaloes into the Border Conference football season Saturday night, Sept. 11. The Flagstaff, Arizona, State College Lumberjacks will be the opponents. The game will start promptly 8 P. M. under the new lights in Buffalo Stadium.

Coach Kimbrough and Odis Crowell, his line coach, predict the Buffaloes will be ready for the Lumberjacks, but will not be near the point of perfection the coaches would prefer.

"We are going to be a better ball club this year than last," said Kimbrough at the opening of the pre-season training period on Sept. 1. He explained that last year's 19 freshmen ought to be greatly improved because of the year's experience.

"But," Kimbrough continued, "all of our opponents should be better, too." He said his squad of 41 candidates has a great team spirit. "One of the best I've ever seen," he declared, "and, although we lack speed and weight, we are going to try to

make up for this handicap by being in top physical condition and having a high morale."

With only nine days of practice behind them, the Buffs will not have a wide variety of plays for the opening game. Too, they naturally are going to have something for the Texas Tech game in Lubbock on Sept. 18.

However, Panhandle fans will see the famed Double C combination of Sophomores Bill Cross and Eddie Conner, halfbacks, in plays with no punches pulled. Cross is the Canadian lad who was a sensation in 1947 as a freshman. Conner, The Kid from Floydada, also starred last year as a freshman. Kimbrough is building a tricky set of plays around these two carriers, Cloyce Box, big, long-passing quarterback, and Lloyd Johnson, Wheeler, at fullback.

In the line, Kimbrough will start Marvin Bowman, Lefors, and Charles Kitchens, Childress, at ends; Wayne Hill, Vernon, and Leon Chapman, Borger, at tackles; Pete Bromley, Clarendon, and Harold Dalton, Brownfield, at guards; and Buck Garrett, Borger, at center.

WTCC Will Oppose New Water Laws

Ablene.—West Texas will vigorously oppose the writing of new water laws, recently proposed at a meeting in Austin, which stand as a threat against municipal and domestic needs for water, it has been announced following a meeting of the Water Resource Commission of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce here.

In a declaration of principles the commission went on record in strenuous opposition to that section of the proposed code which provides that all previous appropriations of water shall now be regarded as "vested right of priority."

This it was pointed out by D. A. Bandoen, general manager of WTCC, is wholly in conflict with present laws, which allow a city, town or municipality to recover from other inferior users all water necessary for domestic purposes.

"The new proposal makes worthless our municipalities' present superior rights, and such West Texas waters as are now being used for big industries and rice growers on the Gulf coast can never be recovered for our own use," it was pointed out in the committee's declaration.

The entire WTCC water commission came here for the meeting. It is composed of Winfield Holbrook, Plainview, chairman; James N. Allison, Midland; W. O. Foegenberry, Lubbock; C. E. Coombes, Stamford; and Charles South of Coleman. Homer Hunter, WTCC consulting engineer, also was present.

The group is making its report to President C. P. Dodson and the executive board, following the proposals recently offered for a revision of the Texas water code, by the Texas Water Conservation Association.

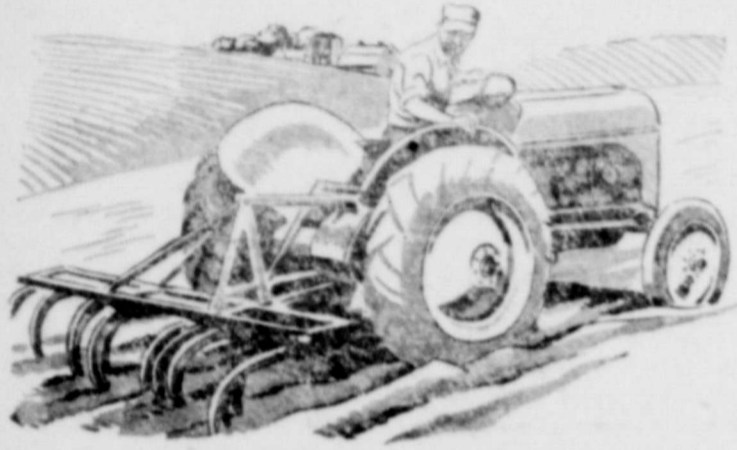
"That part of the proposed surface water code, which gives the present big dams the right to appropriate the ordinary flow, underflow, storm, or rain waters in amounts and quantities equal to the holding capacity of such dams' over and above the right to impound water for domestic purposes" is opposed by the group as "in conflict with Article 7472 which gives our municipalities

the unquestioned right to recover the unappropriated for inferior uses.

"On our Brazos and Colorado watersheds where appropriations are now nine times as large for hydro-electric power purposes as for domestic and industrial purposes combined, it means that hydro-electric activities must first be carried on before our West Texas communities and cities can have their drinking water."

The proposed law treating ground water as "property of the state also was attacked. "In line with our previously adopted declaration of principles, we recommend opposition to this proposed groundwater code until more facts are available on sources, depletion and replenishment of ground water, and until ground water can be treated from the fundamental principle of the doctrine of correlative rights rather than on a state ownership basis," the group said.

Opposition also was expressed against rewriting the entire water laws of Texas, which would void the WTCC — Wagstaff — Woodward measures which now gives full protection to domestic users. It was pointed out that such revision would

mean unnecessary litigation, because these provisions already have been constructed.

While opposing these several actions, the group went on record as favoring a reorganization of the State Board of Water Engineers, but pointed out that any newly created board should represent the public interest "and be wholly divorced from water use authorities."

AUSTIN, Tex.—Plans for working out a new federal-state program for farm-to-market roads were announced here by Chairman John S. Redditt of the State Highway Commission.

During the next six weeks, Redditt said, district engineers will contact all county commissioners courts—including newly-elected commissioners—to get their ideas on what farm roads are needed in their areas.

"It is unfortunate that the funds for this type of road will not be as large as those of the present program that is under construction," Redditt said. "Available funds for this purpose will enable us to build about one-half the mileage of farm-to-market

roads that we have built since V.J. day."

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**Protect Farm-stored Grain Against Weevils**

COLLEGE STATION—"With the shortage of grain storage space, there probably will be a lot of corn and grain sorghum stored on farms in Texas this year," Dr. H. G. Johnston, extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College, points out. "The wise man will start early to protect his grains against weevils."

The first thing is to be sure that storage bins are weather and fumigant tight, Dr. Johnston says. If the grain is not in storage yet, clean the bins and spray thoroughly with a five percent DDT spray.

Dr. Johnston recommends two mixtures for the fumigation process. The first is three parts of ethylene dichloride, and one part carbon tetra-

chloride. One thousand bushels of grain will use six gallons of the fumigant. Sprinkle with ordinary sprinkling cans over the top of the grain.

The second mixture recommended is one part carbon disulfide (highlife) and four parts carbon tetrachloride. Again, six gallons of the mixture will fumigate 1,000 bushels of grain. Pour it in shallow pans and place around the bin—it will evaporate and the fumes soak through the grain.

"Weevil control is important," Dr. Johnston concludes, "not only from a grain-saving standpoint, but to protect your stored wheat if it is under government loan. August is a good month to get started on this important job."

What this country needs right now is day clubs for night workers.

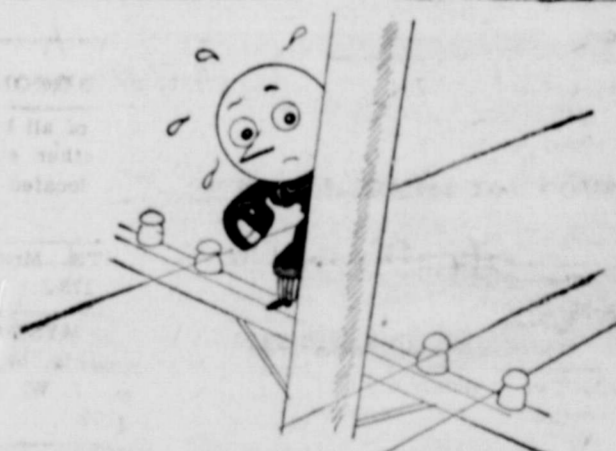

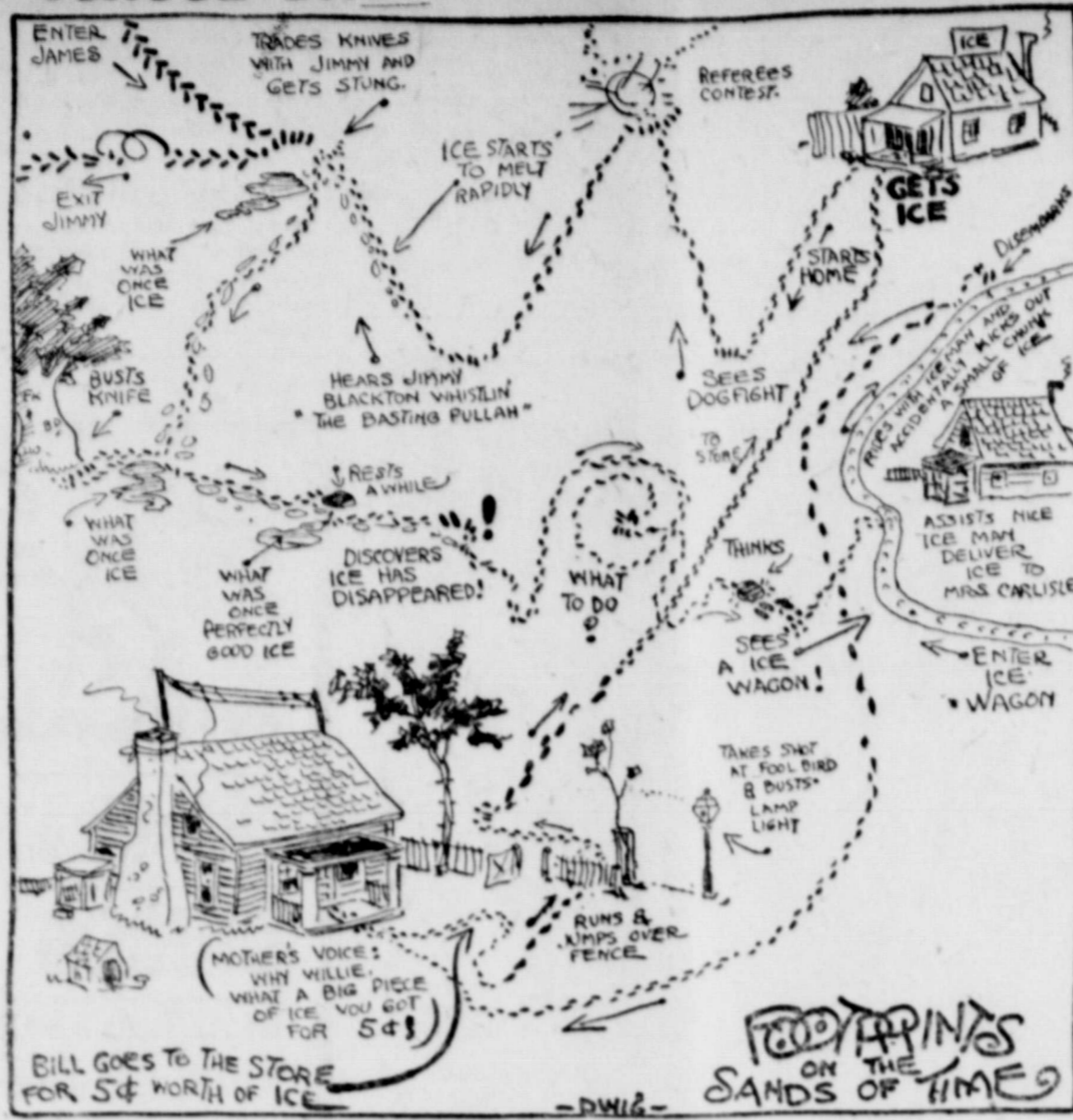
This tribute to the American doctors was well earned. The doctors rolled up their sleeves and talked shop, and on top of that they performed more than forty major operations while in Poland.

### FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

This year, Fire Prevention Week will be observed from October 3 to 9. And never in our history has there been a time when the week was more important.

Our fire waste is still running at an all-time high. During the first seven months of this year alone the destruction amounted to more than \$437,000,000—far exceeding the total for the entire year of 1944. And we cannot blame this on higher prices and values. They are a factor, of course, but the fact remains that we are having more fires, and that the average fire is causing more destruction.

Fire prevention is especially important on farms and in rural areas, which usually lack first-class fire fighting facilities. According to the National Board of Fire Underwriters, farm fires take 3,500 lives and do \$100,000,000 worth of damage annually. And nearly one-third of those fires could be prevented by the installation of lightning rods of the proper type on buildings. Other major causes of farm fires are improper handling of gasoline, and chimneys

and flues which are dirty or in bad condition. Simple care and adequate maintenance would eliminate the vast majority of these dangers.

The toll of death and destruction by fire can and must be checked. Fire Prevention Week will witness a peak of activity by the forces whose job is to prevent fire and to educate the people of fire safety. If the country will listen and learn, this needless waste can be reduced now.

LUBBOCK—Classes will begin Sept. 20 at Texas Technological college with an estimated 6,800 students. Early registration has reached the 4,000 mark through replies to pre-registration forms mailed by the Registrar's office.

enroll during the three days, Sept. 16, 17 and 18, set aside for formal registration.

The academic deans are in charge of the pre-counseling period. The opening session is a general assembly Sept. 13 at 1:30 p. m. in the college gymnasium.

**Committee Endorses School Grouping**

"The movement of grouping small school districts is sweeping the State of Texas." So begins a Citizen's Committee report to the Gilmer-Aikin Committee.

"This movement is eliminating many small local administrative units thereby allowing the expenses formerly used in administration to be used in the actual teaching of the children of the State," the report stated. The Citizen's Committee said that this movement is good.

These statements are verified by a report from the State Department of Education in January, 1948, which said that 469 common school districts and 36 independent school districts were eliminated last year. This year the number will probably exceed the 505 total districts eliminated last year.

Faults that have been listed by the people of the present set-up in the administration units include:

1. Too many very small districts.
2. Too many high schools which do not have pupils enough to justify a varied curriculum.
3. Transportation routes are not well mapped out and the systems are not carefully supervised.
4. Too many small classes in small and middle-sized high schools make the cost entirely too great.

According to the Citizen's Advisory Committee, there is no general law permitting countywide consolidation of districts. A special law exists which applies to Counties of certain sizes. A general permissive law for all Counties has been suggested to the Gilmer-Aikin Committee.

The Gilmer-Aikin Committee has not made any proposals to the people
