TELLING 'EM ABOUT RITA BLANCA

News of Dalhart's new lake is being spread to a large territory. Through the facilities of newspapers serving this section, including the Amarillo Globe-News and Ft. Worth Star-Telegram, the public is being advised that the Rita Blanca lake is now a reality. As evidence of this publicity we reproduce below editorial comment from the May 7, issue of the Pratt, Kansas, Daily News:

Good rains at the right time make a farmer happy. A lot of rain has made a town happy. Dalhart, Texas, is rejoicing over its new lake, now practically full of water. The lake has been nothing but a hole in the ground for two years. The government threw a huge earthen dam across the ordinarily dry Rita Blanca draw near the city in 1938 and dust had blown from the bottom of the lake since. But in the last 12 days Dalhart has received nearly six inches of rainfall and now there are almost 500 acres of water in the Rita Blanca lake.

It's easy to imagine what is happening in Dalhart. They are rushing plans for boating and swimming activities for the summer. One small boy is reported to have already tried out fishing there. The Texan is printing warnings from authorities for people to be careful so there won't be any drownings. Health authorities have had officers chasing away boys who have jumped the season and already have gone swimming in the lake.

We rejoice with Dalhart on the acquisition of a lake. A good lake is a community asset. The 100-acre county lake near here has furnished recreation for countless hundreds of people since it was constructed.

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

MEDIATION REFORM

When Senator Harry Byrd of Virginia recently told the Senate that the Defense Mediation Board should have the power to take jurisdiction over labor disputes without waiting for Secretary Perkins to certify them, he was saying out loud what members of the Board have been discussing privately among themselves.

It was an Miss Perkins' insistence that her certifying authority was included in the President's order setting up the Mediation Board. OPM chiefs opposed it for fear that the Labor Department would use it to hold on to cases in the hope of getting credit for settling them. This is exactly what happened in the coal strike, which could have been avoided had the matter been promptly certified to the Mediation Board.





If suspicious thoughts stabbed the mind of the woman who wrote me yesterday to inquire whether soldiers are "allowed" to make love to hostesses, the fault rests at no other doorstep than the Army's. The three women who work at the service club at each cantonment have been targets for more than their share of publicity and misunderstanding. Most of the turmoil might have been avoided had they been given other designation than "hostess," which scared the daylights out of some soldiers' families lest the Army was going in for night clubs and taxi dance halls.

Although camp hostesses must have physical stamina and, warns a War Department document, must "be prepared to put in long hours," three busy women are not expected to be dincing partners for a stag line of several thousand soldiers. The chief hostess is boss of the service club, the camp's social center, and the guest house where soldiers' families may stay overnight. One junior hostess, who must be a dietician, runs the service club's cafeteria. The other junior hostess merely is charged with the social life of 15 or 20 thousand men and must manage the dances and other events at the service club.
