Judges said the contest was whisper-close between Miss Hansen and her school chum, Vicki Vaughan.

Miss Vaughan, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Vaughan, is also a DHS junior and cheerleader. She performed a classic dance interpretation of "Whipped Cream" for her talent entry.

SECOND runner-up was Leisa Dannevik, 16-year-old DHS sophomore, who

Courthouse bond vote set

City visitors addled as clerks freak out

Mrs. Margie McGowan of Parsons Drug, looking like a walking case of female indecision, was the first-place winner in Dimmitt's "Crazy Days" costume contest Saturday.

SECOND-PLACE winner was Wade Maynard of Harman's, decked out like a psychedelic Western marshal. Third place winner was Mrs. Odie Mundell of TG&Y, a very happy, snaggle-toothed "Miss Hardware, 1969."

Mrs. McGowan was breath-taking in an outfit that was a slack ensemble on the right and pedal-pushers on the left. She accented her half-and-half outfit with a red knee stocking, and topped it off with a straw beach hat.

Maynard freaked out in pullover pajamas under white short-shorts, western hat, pattern vest, unmatched western boots, wild cotton tie and a black western hat, then parted his hair down the middle and painted on a handle-bar mustache and sideburns.

MRS. MUNDELL presided over her hardware department as "Miss Hardware 1969," with a homemade banner, crown, matching "Crazy Daze" patches on her skirt, and small tools hanging from her dress. She smiled with a blacked-out tooth and carried a bouquet of plastic daisies.

The three winners were awarded cash prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10 by the Chamber of Commerce, which sponsored the city-wide "Crazy Days" promotion. Honorable mentions went to Sherry

and DeeAnn McGowan of Parsons Drug, who wore polka-dot hose, frayed jean shorts and large freckles; Mrs. Edith Acevedo of TG&Y, who wore a patchwork dress made by her niece; Hal Heathington of Polson's White's Auto, who donned gym shorts, pajama bottoms, boots, sweat shirt and butcher's apron; Mrs. Loretta Durbin of C. R. Anthony Co., who wore homemade tow-sack slacks, tiger boots, ski sweater and pocket-watch pendant; Duke Chapman of TG&Y, who combined an old Marine shirt with hippie glasses, pajama bottoms and polka-dot cap; and Mrs. Juanita Bruegel of the Village Shop, who wore an 1890's polka-dot swim suit and braided her hair in "pig-tails."

STRANGERS in the city Saturday must have thought they were part of a "Candid Camera" experiment. One out-of-town salesman who sat down for a cup of coffee in Parsons Drug was served by a girl in polka-dot hose and cut-off jeans, and as he meditated unceasingly over his coffee, lady clerks passed by dressed as baseball players, comic cowpokes and freckled beach-combers, carrying out the routine duties of the store.

Finally, a Dimmitt man commented to one of the coffee-counter waitresses about her costume and about the "Crazy Days" promotion. The stranger heard the comment, breathed a sigh of relief, smiled, and said, "I was afraid to ask ..."

The commissioners court voted Monday to call a \$250,000 bond election to double the size of the Castro County Courthouse.

THE EXPANSION plan, which has been on the drawing board three years, will come up for a vote April 19 — and is expected to be a hotly debated issue despite the obvious space shortage in the courthouse.

The commissioners' election order calls for the county's voters to decide whether to issue up to a quarter million dollars' worth of 20-year bonds bearing an interest rate "not to exceed the maximum prescribed by law at the time of issuance."

Complete text of the election order is on Page 12 of this issue.

COUNTY JUDGE Raymond Wilson, chairman of the commissioners court, said the preliminary plan calls for increasing the courthouse floor area from its present 17,900 sq. ft. to approximately 35,200 sq. ft.

"By comparison," Judge Wilson said, "the Floyd County Courthouse has 42,000 sq. ft., and serves a county about the same size as ours."

Judge Wilson estimated that the expansion project would cost "less than \$400,000," and added that the county

now has \$150,000 in its permanent improvement fund — most of which has accumulated "just within the last few years" at the current tax rate.

He said many offices in the courthouse are crowded to the point of being illegal.

"OUR JAIL doesn't comply with the state minimum requirements," he said. "We don't have women's or juveniles' cells in our jail, and this has created some real problems. It's against the

Social Security counselor to visit

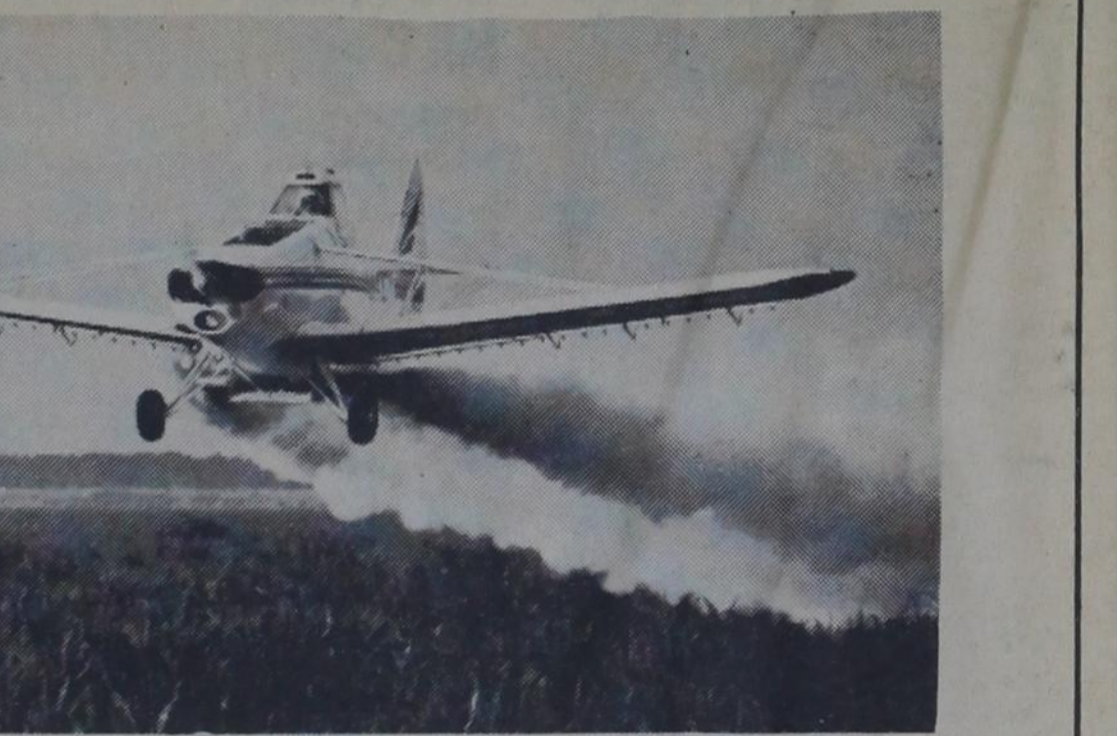

Aerial spraying firm now serves Hart area

The growing aerial-service industry here marked another take-off this week with the opening of Hart Aerial Sprayers, Inc.

THE NEW spraying firm is owned by James Burnam and M. A. "Buster" Tidwell of Dimmitt, and DeWayne Brown of Hart.

Burnam is a long-time farm operator and land owner in the county. Tidwell has been in business in Dimmitt 10 years as the owner of Tidwell Flying Service. Brown, a Dimmitt native, has been the manager of Farmers Grain Co., Inc., of Hart for seven years.

Burnam is the office manager of Hart Aerial Sprayers, and the pilot is Harley Wilke, who previously was a spray pilot for Tidwell Flying Service.

The firm's landing strip is located 2 1/2 miles east of Hart on the Kress Highway, and is the only aerial spraying service within a 15-mile radius. A hangar and office are now being built at the landing-strip site.

USING a Piper Pawnee 235 spray plane, Hart Aerial Sprayers will provide aerial field care with all approved chemicals, plus a free field-checking service. The firm will concentrate on servicing farm operators in the Hart area, "but we'll spray anywhere we're called," a spokesman for the company said.

Hart Aerial Sprayers, Inc., will use telephone, mobile radio and ground-to-air radio to take orders and dispatch prompt service to area farmers with a minimum of "on the ground" time during the busiest seasons.

In addition to providing security for the President of the United States and other dignitaries, the Secret Service under the Treasury Department administration carries on a relentless war against counterfeiters.

Most counterfeiters are well organized and operate under regular commercial type management. This consists of the manufacturing, the wholesaling and the retailing.

The manufacturer produces the plates from which the spurious bills are printed. The wholesalers purchase the bills in large quantities at a big discount. They then sell to "retailers" who employ "shovers" to pass the notes.

Shovers resort to many sneaky methods for getting rid of their fake wares. They are skilled in selecting trusting and uninformed tradesmen, paying for

small purchases with five, ten or twenty dollar counterfeit bills.

EXTRACT FROM THE RULES OF THE TEXAS WATER QUALITY BOARD

RULE 320.3 PROTESTS:

(a) MANNER OF PRESENTING: In the event a person desires to protest an application, it is requested that a protest or opposition be filed in writing at the office of the Board on or before the date on which the application has been set for public hearing. To assure proper consideration of the protest and to give the applicant the opportunity to prepare for the hearing, it is urged that the protest be filed with the Board and a copy mailed to the applicant at least five (5) days before the date of the public hearing.

(b) PROTEST REQUIREMENTS: A written protest shall comply substantially with the following requirements:

(1) The protestant shall state his name and address and whether or not he plans to attend the hearing.

(2) The protestant shall state the basis of his interest in the proceedings and shall present any facts and data he has relative to any pollutional effects of the proposed waste discharge on the uses of the waters in the State.

(3) Whenever property or a facility owned or operated by a protestant is material to the protest, he shall describe its location relative to applicant's place of discharge or deposit.

(4) Protestant shall call attention to any amendment of the application or adjustment which, if made, would result in withdrawal of the protest.

Man-wife team starts A-A-A Flying service

A new aerial spraying firm, A-A-A Flying Service, Inc., has gone into operation with headquarters eight miles south and 1 1/2 miles east of Dimmitt.

OWNERS of the new company are Mr. and Mrs. Ben Holcomb, who live on the Dick Reinhardt farm between Dimmitt and Sunnyside.

A landing strip has just been completed near the Holcomb home and a hangar will be built soon, Holcomb said.

A-A-A's spray plane is a Piper Pawnee 235, which applies insecticides at the rate of 100 acres an hour and fungicides, herbicides and fertilizers at a rate of 60 to 80 acres an hour.

The pilot for A-A-A Flying Service is Curtis Snitker, who has moved to the Sunnyside community from Friona.

Although A-A-A Flying Service performed its first spraying only two weeks ago, "we're already running behind," Holcomb said.

"IT LOOKS like we're going to have a bad greenbug infestation in our wheat this year, but the wind and rain storms has been keeping all the spray planes grounded," he explained.

A-A-A Flying Service — thus named "so it will be the first name in the phone book" — provides complete aerial crop care and six-day-a-week service.

A-A-A also will be the dealer for the Champion aerobatic plane, built in Osceola, Wis. This two-placer is the only American-built plane certified for aerobatics, Holcomb said.

HOLCOMB is convinced of the need and the future of aerial spraying in this area.

"Time and trouble saved are the main two advantages of aerial spraying," he said. "The cost factor is about the same whether you use ground equipment or planes, but aerial spraying is much quicker, less troublesome and much less hazardous. To get a crop treated aerially, you only have to make a phone call instead of lining up field equipment and hands. And a plane can treat a field when it's too muddy for field equipment to get in. Also, the application of chemicals by plane is much safer than having a man do it with field equipment."

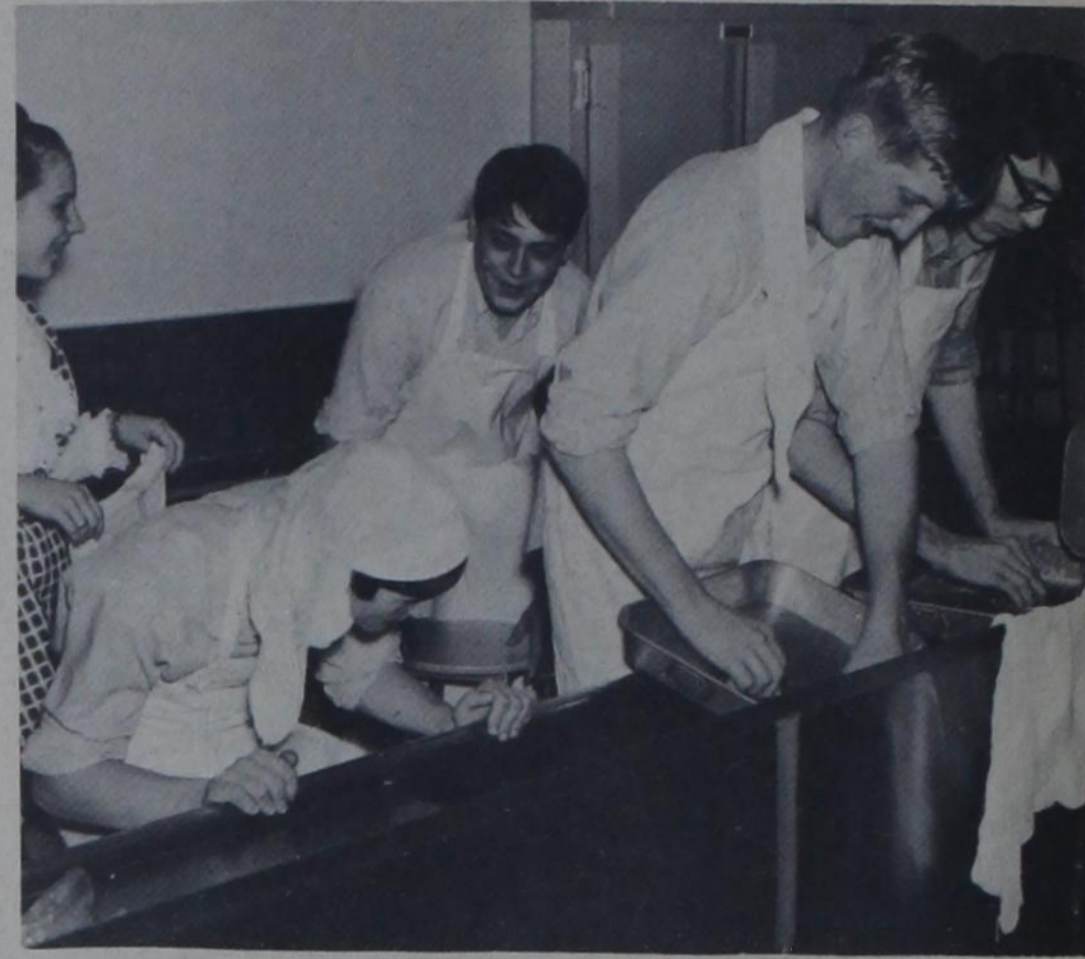

Producers, bankers and government worrying about cotton, Price says

Congressman Bob Price told Texas Cotton men in Dallas Friday that he believed there "is more concern about cotton than ever before."

SPEAKING to members of the Texas Cotton Association at their 58th annual convention, Price said this concern was "not only by cotton producers and the cotton trade but also by government officials and financial institutions."

"It is encouraging to note," Price said, "that the use of cotton still exceeds that of man-made fiber. And despite all the advancements of man-made fibers, not one of these fibers can duplicate all the fine qualities of cotton."

Price said, however, he was disappointed at the poor performance of cotton markets this year which he attributed to a lack of expansion in world trade.

"There are fierce competitors for US cotton in world markets," he said. "One is foreign grown cotton, and the other is man-made fibers." The use of both, he

said, is increasing abroad.

COTTON ALSO has suffered record losses in the domestic market during the past year, Price said. Cotton's share of the fiber market fell to 42 percent last year, a loss of seven percent from 1967, while man-made fiber's share of the market increased by the same percentage. Price said a new chemically modified rayon fiber is now selling below the price of cotton, and that use of the newest competitor, non-cellulosic man-made fibers, had risen 31 percent during 1968.

Lower prices for man-made fibers and higher fabric prices have stimulated the use of polyester fiber, particularly in blends of cotton, Price pointed out. He quoted James R. Donald, senior cotton analyst for the Department of Agriculture Economic Research Service, as predicting that foreign free-world countries will be producing all the cotton they need by 1972.

"It is his opinion," Price said, "that a drop of one or two cents in the current level of US prices in import markets could boost US exports in a year or two by 500,000 to 750,000 bales. He believes," Price added, "that a stable price a cent or two lower than current prices would keep us in the 3 1/2 to 5 million bale export range."

Price also mentioned proposals by an "increasing number of people" of a way . . . to bridge the gap between the competitive price at which cotton must be sold in the market place and the price producers must receive to cover costs and allow a reasonable return for labor, management and investment.

"One alternative," he said, "would involve a cost adjustment certificate attached to every bale produced." The certificate, he said, would be valued at the amount necessary to provide the difference between a competitive market price level and the cost of production, and would be redeemable by anyone handling the bale in market channels.

Another proposal has been made, Price said, to spread price support payments over total cotton production without limitation to that produced on domestic allotment as at present.

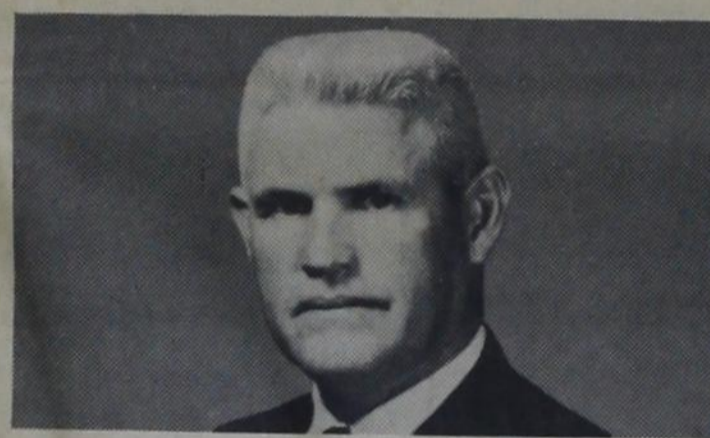
Evangelist Durre's Thursday sermon on "What About My Membership?" and the Friday topic, "The High Cost of Low Living," will conclude his messages in

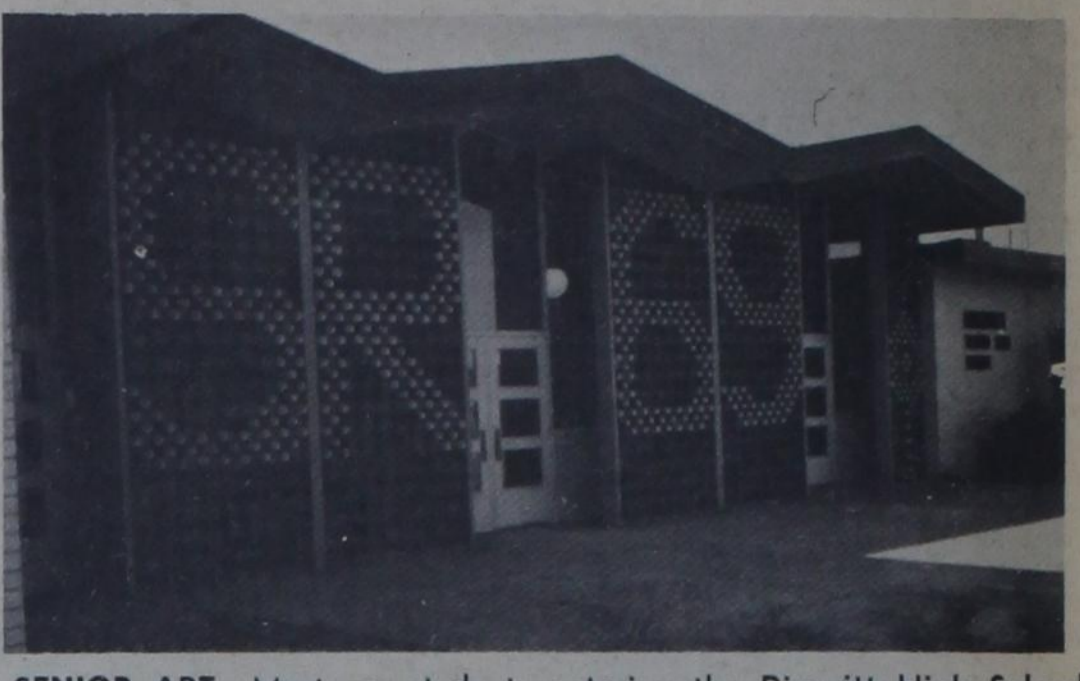

Elcor increases price of ammonia

Roy E. Campbell, president of Elcor Chemical Corp., Tuesday announced a \$5-a-ton increase in the company's ammonia price.

EFFECTIVE Tuesday, Campbell said, the price of Western Ammonia brand anhydrous ammonia — which is manufactured here — is \$65 per ton to retail customers "for the product delivered to the field in nurse tanks with application equipment supplied."

Where customers supply their own application equipment, the field-delivered price is \$60 per ton, Campbell said.

He added, "The recent practice of allowing a trade discount to a customer pulling a nurse tank from a sales location to the field has been discontinued."

Campbell said Elcor hiked its price because "the present depressed price levels are inconsistent with the cost of products and services essential to the farmer in obtaining maximum benefit from his efforts."

(Continued from Page One) law to keep juveniles in with adult prisoners. Also, we've had twice as many in our jail at one time as it was built to hold."

He added, "Our county clerk is having to store county records wherever we can find the space, and these records should all be kept in one department instead of scattered around. Our county agent and county home demonstration agent are having to share an office; we have no office space now for the district judge and district attorney; and our jury room is too small and has only one rest room because it was built when only men were allowed to serve on juries."

The judge said the county also is paying rent on three outside offices — the veterans' service office, Texas Employment Commission office and Office of Economic Opportunity — "because we don't have room to put them in the courthouse."

HE ADDED, "You could argue that we aren't obligated to provide space for these state and federal agencies, but that's the only way we can get them here. If we didn't furnish them with office space, our people would have to go to Plainview, Hereford or Amarillo for these services — and we'd lose trade if they did."

Details of the proposed expansion plan and the county's ability to pay for it will be reported in the News before the bond election date.

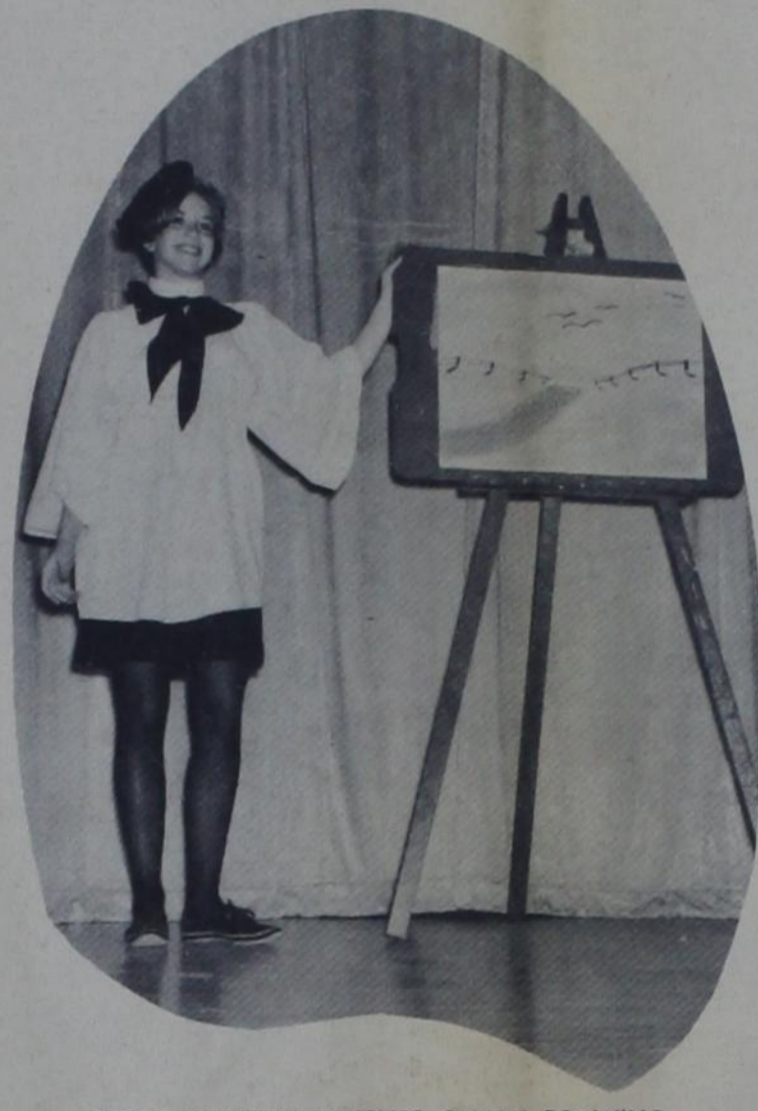

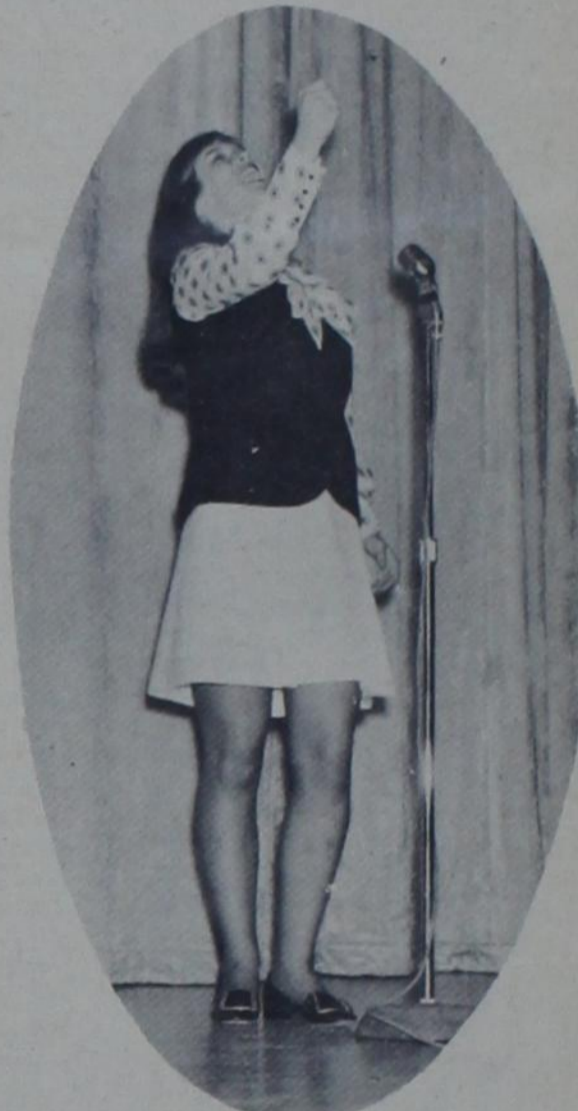

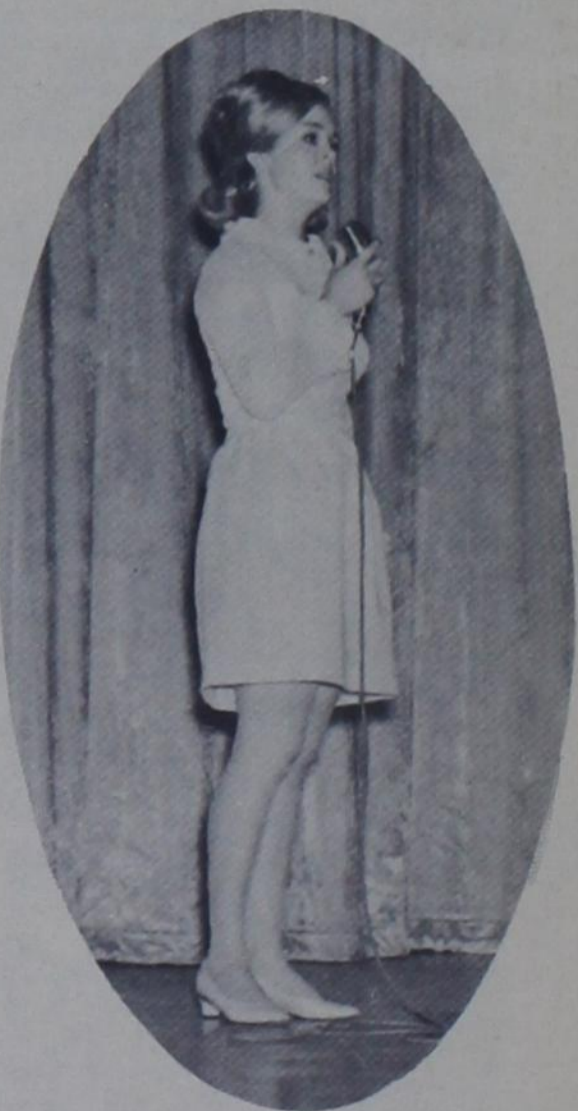
