DR Faces Foreign Policy Test

Banner Legion Convention Is Predicted

Beard, Amarillo, immediately past national committeeman of the 40 & 8, the American Legion organization, was in Dalhart yesterday to offer his services in connection with the joint convention of the 18th District of Texas and the Panhandle-Plains Association of the American Legion and Auxiliary in Dalhart Friday and Sunday.

Beard is currently secretary of the Amarillo Voiture, 40 & 8; 18th District 40 & 8 secretary; and advisor of the Hanson Legion post in Dalhart.

Beard, conferring with officials of the Rhoades Legion post and Secretary Beard declared: "Unquestionably you are going to have one of the finest Legion conventions ever held in this Panhandle county and you are going to have an unusually bright array of distinguished guests."

Some of the real attractions of the convention will be Miss DeWitt Williams, daughter of Mrs. W. J. Williams, Amarillo, sweetheart of the 18th District Legion post of Hanson post.

The Amarillo Sons of the American Legion drug and bugle corps is on hand. It is directed by Miller, Fifth Division chairman of the SAL; and member of the SAL committee.

Some of the top-ranking guests will be the commanders of the Department of Texas—Dr. W. J. Danforth Worth; and Lou J. Roberger. Both will be on the program. Dr. Danforth is now national executive committeeman; and is chairman of the Department of Rehabilitation committee.

President Roosevelt faces a showdown with the House this afternoon; the U. S. faces nationwide strike paralysis; and Britain must determine immediately whether it will help protect the vital Caucasus oil fields or leave their defense to the Soviets.

The House, tensed for action, met late this afternoon to complete three and a half hours debate on Neutrality Act revision and then vote, probably between 3 and 4 p.m.

The issue is whether the House will agree to remove all shipping restrictions from the Neutrality Act. Several weeks ago the House passed a bill permitting arming of merchant ships. The Senate also stripped away bans on U. S. vessels sailing into combat zones and belligerent ports, and sent the measure back for House concurrence.

Speaker Sam Rayburn conferred with President Roosevelt last night, and at noon repeated his predictions that the bill would pass. Observers said the vote would be close, and isolationists contended they had a good chance of winning.

The worsening U. S. strike situation has become a factor in whether the House will support the President's foreign policy. A member, who has always voted with the Administration, said yesterday he would no longer support steps toward war till Roosevelt conquers the strike front which continues to strangle defense preparations.

The five railway operating brotherhoods—engineers, firemen, conductors, trainmen and switchmen—last night ordered their 350,000 members out on strike December 7, 8 and 9.

They said the strike would apply to a third of the nation's railroads each of the three days, but they did not announce which thirds would be affected first.

The 14 non-operating railroad brotherhoods are to reply today to the Big Five's strike call, according to reliable reports this morning.

Railroad officials have made no comment. There are persistent reports that the operating unions have asked Roosevelt to intervene but brotherhood officials refuse to confirm this. There is general belief that the President will intervene.

However, the President's immediate problem was the impending captive mine strike which most observers believe John L. Lewis, president. (Turn to Page 16, Column 1)

The Texan, however, did not close the door in the "dust bowl" coiner hunt and posted an additional \$25 reward for the person who coins a new term best describing this area now brimming with a record row crop, best grass within memory of pioneers, fat cattle, big lakes and unparalleled soil moisture.

"We will continue to receive proof of dust bowl coinship," The Texan said, "and will present the coiner with a handsome plaque when and if he is found."

REPAIR YOUR FARM MACHINERY NOW A MESSAGE TO THE FARMERS OF AMERICA!

The year of 1942 will be a critical one for farmers. Prepare for it by repairing your farm machinery now. The Food for Freedom program calls for a record farm production. At the same time defense needs will limit available farm labor. Farmers who are unable to get enough labor will have to rely more and more upon machinery, but the defense program will mean much less new farm machinery in 1942. New farm machinery requires steel and other metals, and metals are a prime need in the defense program. You can help your country and yourself by repairing your old machinery now rather than attempting to get new machinery next year.

REPAIR YOUR FARM MACHINERY AND EQUIPMENT NOW. The Government is taking steps to provide as much steel and other metal as may be needed for all necessary repair parts, manufacturers need to know how much will be required. The only way to be sure of repair parts is to order them immediately. Failure to make repairs now may mean a crop loss later. I suggest you do these things at once:

Check over your old machinery, order necessary parts from your dealer. If parts cannot be obtained, notify your County U.S.D.A. Defense Board.

As replacement needs arise throughout the year use substitutes for steel and iron wherever possible.

In many areas, county agents and vocational agriculture teachers are arranging for instruction in farm machinery repair. You may wish to take advantage of such instructions or to have others in your family do so. Make your old farm machinery and equipment do another year by repairing it now.

WASHINGTON.—No one ever would have suspected that Averell Harriman, son of the great railroad magnate and one of the wealthiest young men in the United States, ever would get on friendly terms with Josef Stalin, dictator of Communist Russia.

Harriman, a large shareholder in the Union Pacific and Illinois Central railroads, and Western Union, represents the acme of the capitalist system which Stalin has fought all his life. In addition, Harriman had a personal row with Soviet Russia several years ago during which they eched him out of a valuable manganese concession.

But despite all this, Harriman's eyes almost glow today when he talks of Stalin. He calls him "a great guy," tells how tough and foreseeing he is, has unbounded confidence in Stalin's leadership, and is convinced Russia will hold out.

Harriman's friends smile a bit at this, wonder if Averell isn't too emotional, or they figure he was shown too much Russian hospitality and not enough grim reality at the front.

However, another man who came back glowing about Russia is William L. Batt, big Philadelphia manufacturer who makes SKF ball-bearings and is a director of various other big business enterprises. Batt can't say enough good about Russian morale and resistance in general.

It is true, of course, that most of the Harriman mission did not get around Russia very much. However, one man who did is General

James Burns, a hard-boiled army officer, who went from Moscow south through the Caucasus, down through Iran, and back home via Egypt and Africa. Burns saw plenty and seems to be just as strong for the Russians as Harriman and Batt.

RUSSIAN TRANSPORTATION

One of the things which impressed him was the manner in which the Russians were saving their industrial materials in the face of the Nazi advance. Fleets of trucks, plus hundreds of railroad cars brought from the Trans-Siberian, were loaded up with machinery. Almost whole factories were transported from the line of advance to be set up behind the cars and trucks were completely loaded, women and children perched atop the cargoes.

This evacuation of precious industrial materials is one reason for the tremendous number of trucks which the United States is sending the Russians now.

Contrary to most reports regarding the inefficiency of Russian transport, the American observers came back convinced that the Russians were doing an amazing job.

It was this enthusiasm which persuaded the President to stop planes, tanks, artillery actually en route to U. S. army camps and send them to Boston for transshipment to Archangel. Real fact is that although one billion in credits has been extended Russia, another billion will be extended shortly.

NOTE.—Tragedy is that the Roosevelt administration marked time all summer, did not send the Harriman mission to Moscow until three months after Hitler invaded, and had gone a long way on the road to Moscow.

WALLY'S FIRST MOVE

Before she became the Duchess of Windsor, Wally Simpson had a long row of broken hearts on her record. Almost every man she met fell in love with her, but there were very few she loved in return. (Some friends say this even included, at first, the King of England.)

In fact, about the only man who never succumbed to Wally's charm was Felipe Espil, the present Argentine Ambassador.

Espil is rated by the State Department as the ablest diplomat in Washington. In addition he has charm, wit, and many ladies rate him as the handsomest man in the capital.

When Espil was a dashing young secretary of the Argentine Embassy he knew the then Wallis Simpson and knew her well. In fact Wallis was reported at the time to be in love with him.

The Embassy office stands on a little side street, and Espil's office at that time looked out on the street. Beneath this window at times, the now Duchess of Windsor often passed, exerting all

OUT-DATED

Senator John A. Danaher, peppery Connecticut Republican isolationist, is a strong advocate of the Hoover plan of sending food to Nazi-occupied Europe.

Recently a constituent, whose husband's relatives live in the conquered Lowlands, called on Danaher and protested his stand. She told of receiving a smuggled, uncensored letter from her relatives recounting their bitter hardships but pleading that nothing be done that in any way would help the Nazis.

Danaher argued with his visitor at great length, constantly repeating, "But my dear Mrs. —, in 1914 Mr. Hoover was able to handle the Germans." Finally, after one of these remarks, the constituent interrupted sharply:

"Senator, before you say that again permit me to point out something to you. You've got your figures mixed. This is 1941, not 1914. You and Mr. Hoover don't seem to be aware of that. I know that our people do not want food sent over."

How To Meet High Cost Of Living Is Detailed

BY ROGER BABSON

Babson Park, Mass., Nov. 14. I know something about "cost-of-living" indices. When I was Assistant to the Secretary of Labor I had a hand in making the government cost-of-living index then in use. The U. S. Bureau of Labor's present index is complete, but impractical, 198 different goods and services are priced. Rents are priced in 33 cities for a varying number of dwellings where wage earners and clerical workers live, depending upon the size of the city, from 450 in Manchester, N. H. to 2750 in New York City.

What's In The Index

The cost-of-living index is made up by combining a separate index for each group of expenditures. The good group is derived from such items as cereals and bakery products, meats, and poultry; eggs and dairy products; fruits and vegetables; fats and oils; sugar and beverages. "Cereals" includes white flour, macaroni, corn flakes, and corn meal; whereas "fruits and vegetables" include apples, bananas, oranges, green beans, cabbage, carrots, lettuce, onions, potatoes, spinach, sweet potatoes, as well as the canned and dried varieties.

Other groups cover clothing, rent, fuel, electricity, house furnishings, insurance, and miscellaneous. There is an index for each of the 33 cities covered. Thus, the index is not meant to represent the cost-of-living on farms. I have adjusted this U. S. index to cover the 15 per cent waste which goes into the garbage pit and elsewhere. I, however, have made no allowance for the billions wasted on crime, harmful drugs, etc. The importance of waste cannot be too highly emphasized in computing a cost-of-living index, particularly in these times. The President, in his proclamation establishing Civilian Defense Week says, — "We must halt the waste and all unnecessary use of critical materials." — I submit my index below:

Cost of Living

Manufacturers and wholesalers are urging retailers to stock up. Retail inventories are now very high and orders for future deliveries of new merchandise are higher than current inventories. However, to date, retailers have not generally marked up prices to meet increased wholesale prices. They may have to do so after current inventories are exhausted.

With more people employed and some having higher wages, more cash is available to spend today than in good many years. As a result, people are demanding the very best and the highest-priced goods. However, in many instances they could, and should, buy the cheaper lines of merchandise. For example, a pair of men's good shoes can be bought for \$3.60. It certainly is not necessary to pay \$8.50, or more.

Cost of Food

Some food prices are up; many are the same as, or lower than, a year ago. For example, canned soups have not risen, nor have fresh fruits and vegetables. Meat sales and prices are both rising; but beef is still a good value compared with a year ago. Salmon has gone up; but crab meat is lower. Rice, dressed poultry, corn, and sugar are also among the items which have not had any appreciable upward move.

Watch the newspaper ads and buy things which are plentiful, as squash and apples are now. Buy cheaper cuts of meat. Bottom of the round sells in Boston for 32 cents a pound and has as much food value as sirloin at 65 cent. Why buy for "tenderness" when you can get as much nourishment for less money and have a smaller dental bill? There is a 3-5 cent difference between canned "standard" peas and "fancy" peas. The standard pea has more food value and cost less. The fancy pea only looks and taste better.

Cost of Shelter

Building costs, including materials and labor, are about 12 percent above a year ago. Before building a new house today prospective home-owners should perhaps consider the purchase of foreclosed property from banks and insurance companies. Much of this property is available and has been put into good shape. Such property may be

financed on a modest down payment and easy monthly installments. Thus the total cost of owning a house today may be even less than in the past if people will take time to shop around.

The rise to date in the over-all cost of living is fully compensated for by the fact that there has been a continual increase in the number of people employed. This monthly increase is now running at the rate of about 450,000 persons. As some one member of a family, heretofore unemployed, gets employment, this raises the total family income and compensates for any increase in the cost-of-living.

Combating Living Costs

Some 80 per cent of our workers are negated in non-defense industries which cannot possibly pay increased wages. Civil service and other government employees are in the same boat. They will feel rising living costs more than any other group. The 5 per cent minority group can readily adjust themselves to meet higher prices. Most of those, however, who are not in the defense industries must change their purchasing habits. This 80 per cent of our people

will surely have to be content with wasting less and spending less on their car. They can do much, however, to combat rising living costs by shifting their purchases from items that have gone up to items that have not gone up. This can be done. We can all also remember the old New England proverb, — "Eat it up—Wear it out—and Make it do!"

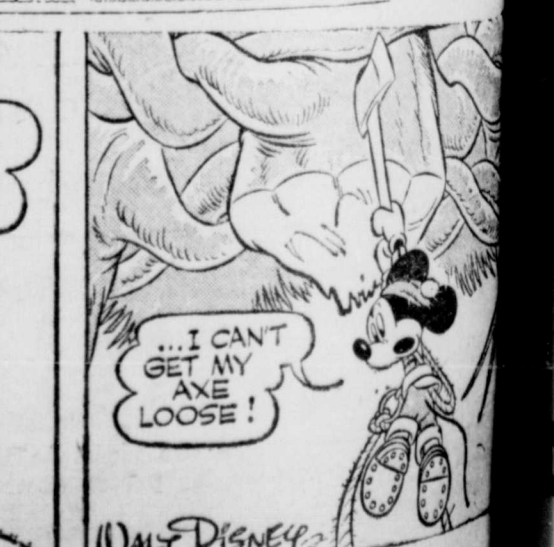

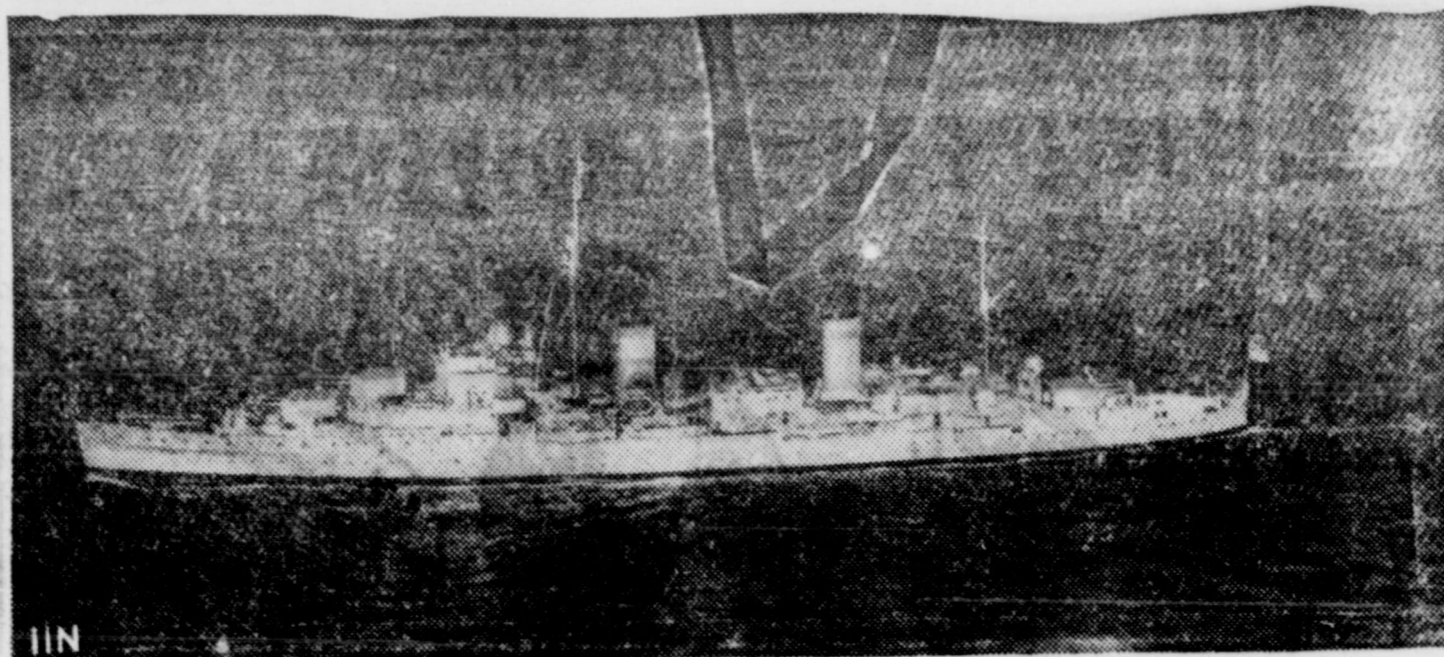

George E. Walker's Brother-In-Law Is Colorful U. S. Miller

Doubtless one of the top millers in the U. S., certainly one of the most colorful, is 80-year-old Edward F. Clark of Minneapolis, brother-in-law of George E. Walker of Dalhart.

He has been with the Pillsbury Mills in Minneapolis since their earliest days. When Philip W. Pillsbury, now president of the company, went to work in the mills to learn the business, Clark was his boss.

Mrs. Clark was a sister of Mr. Walker. She died last year. Clark has been pensioned 14 years and doesn't have to do a lick of

work, but he prefers to be on the job and the company gives him that privilege. He's at the mills, regardless of weather, and really acts in a supervisory capacity. All the executives, even the president, frequently consult him.

Among his numerous mill inventions are rollers still being used to grind wheat into flour. He holds patents on these rollers in the U. S., England, Canada, Australia and South America. His invention cut down the speed of rollers by half, and permitted a better grinding job.

For years Clark had charge of the Palisades mill in Minneapolis and his flour was considered the standard. Goal of the other mills was to make their flour as good as Clark's.

ident of the United Mine Workers-CIO, will call Saturday in support of his demands for a closed shop for the mines.

The Defense Mediation Board early this week turned down his demands. Lewis has never said he would call a strike if his demands were not met, but he set Saturday as the deadline for the board's report.

Roosevelt has called Lewis, CIO President Philip Murray; Thomas Kennedy, UMW secretary-treasurer; and three major steel executives to meet with him tomorrow.

The parley is scheduled an hour after the UMW policy board is to meet to consider whether to call the strike.

President John J. Moran of the independent Federation of Long Lines Telephone Workers has called for a walkout of 15,000 workers one minute after tonight midnight unless wage demands are met. The toll lines in 42 states would be

affected. Workers have agreed to keep open lines essential to national defense.

Several thousand truckers are threatening to strike for higher wages in 11 Midwestern states; and United Automobile Workers-CIO may tie up two plants, according to noon reports.

Secretary of State Hull said today that the nation's best chance to stay out of war is to unify its people and double or triple war production. He said nothing, not even strikes, should stand in the way.

Sidney Hillman, associate OPM director, said today that strikes must be eliminated. The records prove, he said, that there is always a basis for settlement; and added: "We don't have time for strikes."

Axis armies claim they have breached Kerch defenses in the Crimea and are now separated from

the Caucasus by only four miles of water.

The Axis assaults on the Don basin and Rostov fronts, land gateway to the Caucasus, have been revitalized. If Germans knife through these sectors they would also clip a vital U. S.-British supply route to Russia.

Thus the British must make up their mind whether to move troops up from Iran and Iraq to help defend vital Caucasus oil.

This newest threat to the Caucasus brought renewed Labor demands in Parliament that Britain open a second front somewhere to take pressure off the Reds. They also demanded a clear statement of British policy and said failure to open a front is inexcusable if the RAF actually holds superiority over the Luftwaffe, as Prime Minister Churchill claimed earlier this week.

George Marshall, U. S. chief of

staff, denied that a drive for three-year Army enlistments indicates preparations to send an American force to Africa or anywhere else.

He said the longer enlistments are needed to give stability to forces in Hawaii, the Canal Zone, the new Atlantic bases and to the new and highly technical mechanized forces.
