





CORDOVA, Alaska, Sept. 2.-Completion of a projected automo-bile road of eighteen miles up the .394 beds of, "painted streams" is expected to been to tourists from all parts of the world the Valley of Ten Thousand Smokes, in the Mount Kat-mai region of Alaska, about eighty miles north of Kodiak island.

When the Katmai volcano erupted in 1912 and covered thousands of square miles with ash and pumice, killing all vegetation and game and wiping out more than one settle-ment, it was regarded as a great ca-lamity. But the eruption uncovered a strange formation which is de-clared to be one of the wonders of the word. The "smoke \" literally thousands of them, are clouds or jets of steam under various pressures, emitted from holes and remarkably colored caverns in the solidified volcanic clay. The entire valley, which is shaped somewhat like a clover leaf, liquid hot mud a year ago, are now crossed without difficulty.
