

Monday night called for a re-run of the May 20 sewer-bond election, under new ground rules.

COMMISSIONERS called the new election for July 26 and are holding their breath, hoping the interest rate on the revenue-bond issue won't go up before election

The original bond election, which carried by a 2-1 margin in a light turnout May 20, was invalidated by a recent US Supreme 10 Pages Court ruling which held that all registered voters should be allowed to cast ballots in bond elections, whether they are on the property tax rolls or not.

The Supreme Court ruling which stemmed from a Louisiana case - also invalidated a section of the Texas Constitution and knocked down 40 other Texas bond elections that had been passed since May 19.

THE NEW election here will be open to all registered voters. It will violate the state constitutional code but will be in keeping with the new US Supreme Court rul-

"Our bonding attorneys think we may have to use the results of both elections to get the bond issue qualified legally," City Manager E. B. Noble said.

## Bible Thoughts

SINS OF THE TONGUE James 3:8

If you want to know what is in a person's heart, listen to him talk for a while, for "out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh" (Mt. 12:34). There is nothing in all the whole wide world that so reveals the true character of a man or a woman as his or her speech and conversation. A person naturally loves to talk about what he cherishes the most. We do not care to listen to things in which we have no interest, nor do we talk about that which has no appeal to us. How boring a conversation becomes when it concerns things we do not care about. True fellowship results only when there is a common interest among the members.

It is also true that the tongue can do untold damage. Gossip is a more deadly weapon than a gun or a dagger. It is a more devastating sin than stealing, drinking, or physical assault. If a person steals from another, the object can be returned or replaced. If an individual gets drunk, he can sober up; if he assaults someone, the wounds will heal again; but a person who gossips starts a fire that cannot be quenched. The damage cannot be undone; the words cannot be recalled. Gossip and slander are worse than robbing a man of all material possessions, for they deprive him of his reputation and murder his character.







### **Public 'copters** now available

The Department of Public Safety has launched five new "public service" helicopters, which join two others available over the state for any type of emergency mission that might arise.

MAJ. C. W. BELL, commander of Region 5, which includes Castro County, said, "The DPS is very desirous of expanding its services to the people of this area and to the city police departments and sheriff's departments. We feel this is a splendid apportunity to provide them with better and more versatile service.

"It is seldom a day passes that we don't receive a request for assistance in an incident in which a helicopter can be very useful, such as looking for lost persons, rescue operations, and so forth," he said. "We plan to station these aircraft strategically so they will be more readily available when needed.'

The main thrust of the new program. Bell continued, is to increase the capabilities of the DPS in all phases of emergency and law enforcement work, particularly mercy missions such as the rapid transfer of injured persons, when feasible, from limited treatment centers to hospitals with more sophisticated facilities.

The helicopters also are used in search and rescue operations, and in surveillance work.

## **VA** housing loan maximum is hiked

President Nixon has signed into law the first direct veteran benefit measure passed by the Congress in his administration.

AMONG ITS principal provision PL 91-22, which became effective June 6, increases from \$17,500 to \$21,000 the maximum amount which the Veterans Administration may loan a veteran for a

Also raised from \$10,000 to \$12,500 is the amount which the VA may grant paraplegic veterans for specially adapted hous-

Another provision of the new law extends the specially adapted housing benefit to veteran who have either lost, or lost use of, one lower extremity and are suffering other service-connected neurological or orthopedic disability requiring regular use of a wheel

Previously, only veterans who had lost or lost use of both lower extremities as the result of military service were eligible for VA 'wheelchair home' grants.

FINALL, the new law relaxes the first lien requirements for VAguaranteed home loans to permit guaranty of homes for veterans where basic financing requires first lien security for monthly charges to home buyers for develtional facilities.


