WASH FRUITS **BEFORE EATING.** SAYS DOCTOR

Advice is given by Health Com-missioner William C. Woodard that all fruit should be washed before be-ing caten, in view of the necessity of spraying trees with poisons to prevent the ravages of insects. The warning is givien as a result of lab-recently seized because of the pres-enter of spots of arsenic. The state-ment is as follows: The inspectors of the food divis-found among pears being offered for sale by retailers many pears show ing large white spots which were eveneted to be the results of the drying of an arsenic preparation us-ed in spraying the trees. A chemi-

ed in spraying the trees. A chemi-cal examination of the skin of one of these spotted pears in the labora-tory of the health department show-cd 1-20 of a grain of arsenic, or of arsenious oxide, to be exact, and the these showed nearly as much. This others showed nearly as much. This others showed nearly as much. This amount of arsenic represents a sea-sonable medicinal dose of arsenic for a healthy adult. These findings have since been confirmed by independent laboratory examinations. It has al-so been found that after theze spots were washed off a pear, a fairly good sized dose of arsenic for a child could still be recovered from the skin.

child could still be recovered from the skin. "The fruit was traced to a recent shipment of pears from California to the local market. The "world would starve today were it not for the use of arsenical and other poisons to protect our crops against the ravages of insects. Such poisons must be used and from time to time, we have to expect that the surface of our fruit oor vegetables may by some accident be contaminated by poison to a danger-ous degree, but there is no reason to believe that such poisons ever penebelieve that such poisons ever pene-trate the surface to a dangerouos ex-

trate the surface to a dangerouos ex-tent, or that such poisons cannot be removed by thoroughly washing our fruit and vegetables before eating. "That cases of this kind do not come to our notice more frequently is probably due to the washing that our vegetables get before eating. fruit we are not so likely to wash as we ought to do, but grown persoons at least are likely to attempt to re-move visible spots or dirt before biting into the skin. Children are most likely to neglect to do so and most likely to neglect to do so and the skin of a single one of the pears examined showed more arsenic than it would be advisable to give to a child in a single dose, even though such an amount would not be ex-pected to cause fatal results. "Nor is it to be for otten that the skin of an unwashed pear or apple

skin of an unwashed pear or apple may be contaminated with bacteria more dangerous to a child than the amount of arsenic four, on any of these pears."
