Corpus Christi, 54. White Point, 96. Portland, 80. Port Aransas, 5. Odem and Sinton, 11. Aransas Pass, 2. Rockport, 8.

Twenty-fve additional bodies are reported to have been found this morning in the vicinity of West Portland.

CORPUS CHRISTI Sept. 18.—It is still a physical impossibility to estimate with any degree of accuracy the exast loss of life and property in Sunday's hurricane, which raged throughout this portion of the gulf

The impression seemed to prevail today that the death list will exceed 300. In the back waters of Neuces bay, where an aviator reported there was much wreckage, a thorough search is being carried on. The aviator reported that the water there seemed to be deep enough to float the tons of large houses and that the wreckage covered several acres.

Last night huge bonfires lighted he bay, where the searching parties and relief committees continued their work without interruption.
