A fact that is constantly overlooked by the taxpayer when a bond issue is presented to be voted upon, is the saving in the cost of transportation over an improved road. It has been demonstrated by actual tests that an improved road will save much as five hundred per cent in hauling costs per ton-mile over an unimproved road. In Eastland county this saving will be much greater, due to the excessively bad condition of the roads. If this saving in the cost of transportation was capitalized at six per cent interest, it would be found that the county could well afford to spend one hundred million dollars on the roads instead of the proposed four and one-half millions. 


