Oklahoma Oil Town Scene of Rioting BOTH OFFICIALS AND MOST BELOVED ROYAL COUPLE IN EUROPE COMING TO U.S. •

TELEPHONE OPERATORS STRIKE AND MOB SEEKS TO BURN THE EXCHANGE

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 23.—State officials today are endeavoring to ascertain the seriousness of conditions at Drumright, an oil town in Creek county, where ing broke out last night in connection with the strike of the telephone operators and from which requests for troops to quell the disturbance have come.

Pelephone advices from Oilton today said the chief of police and several deputies there have gone to Drumght, where a mob is reported to be shooting recklessly. An unconfirmed report says a mob is attempting

to burn the telephone exchange and that the riot is beyond all control of the officers.

The reports reaching here today do not tell of any fatalities. It was not known early this afternoon whether roops would be dispatched to Drumright, that dependng upon what information as to how serious the situation is can be secured by state officials. It is declared n reports reaching the capital that the rioting continued he greater part of the night and it was feared today that here would be heavy loss of life if troops were not sent 'Al' Hastings at once to take charge of the situation.


