

WORKERS GO OUT IN BODY AND STOPPAGE OF R. R. SERVICE IS NOW UNIVERSAL

LONDON, Sept. 27.—Members of the railwaymen's union apparently went out in a body today and the stoppage of service is complete, following the failure of the government and union representatives to reach an agreement vesterday.

Premier Lloyd George issued a statement today saying that the precipitancy in calling the strikes gives an impression of the deliberate, mature intention of some individuals to seek a quarrel at any cost.

Thousands of persons could not be accommodated by the inadequate bus and tram service and many were obliged to walk. Many resorted to bicycles and even roller skates were used.

The government having failed in its negotiations with the union to adjust the situation, it is said action has been taken by government officials preparatory to operating the railroad by armed forces if necessary, but a definite program for meeting the condition before the country has not been developed.

The ministry of transportation announced shortly pefore 3 o'clock this afternoon the stoppage of traffic on the railroads was virtually complete. No disturbances had been reported up to early this afternoon.


