AMERICANS AND COSSACKS CLASH IN SIBERIA; JAPAN TRIES TO INTERFERE

Confessions Are Made in Wholesale Looting

GNOLIA COMPLETES W. CONNOLLEE NO. 7 IS 1,200 BARRELL WELL

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Gnolia Petroleum company's T. W. Connollee completion, the fifth producing well on the mile north of Olden, and is making 1,200 barrels from the black lime, from 3,235 to 3,245 feet. Total production of the tract now is more than 3,000 barrels. E. Roper No. 10 is a lime well, making 300 to 400 barrels from the black lime, from 3,235 to 3,245 feet. It is a Prairie-Oil & Gas company operation. Prairie's O. Cotton No. 1 is completed and making 200 barrels, with pay from 3,420 to 3,444 feet. Two Texas company wells are due for production on and both will be sizable wells, according to the history of the tracts. The J. C. Littleton lease, which furnished the sensation of the west field two weeks ago, in No. 3, will have No. 5 in before long. The well is near top of the black lime at 3,420. W. T. Boyd No. 5 got to the top of the lime at 3,260 feet and is drilling at 3,280 feet. This tract has furnished two good wells. Harpoon No. 3 of the Sinclair Gulf Oil company has reduced the hole at 3,206 feet, which is top of the lime. No. 6 found the top of the lime at 3,231 and is drilling at 3,330 feet. It made a flow Monday night. J. W. Barnes No. 5 is showing a little gas at 3,235 feet. C. B. Jones, in the Ranger field, just over the Stephens line, is shooting today, total depth being 3,555 feet. Yocum No. 1, making some water at 3,602 feet, is plugging and will shoot. Lee No. 1 still is fishing at 3,276 feet.

Police Uncover Thefts Totaling Tens of Thousands

Exposure of systematic channels of disposing of stolen goods, recovery of oil field property valued at the thousands of dollars, confessions of several of the men said to be implicated in the wholesale looting and arrests of several more whose cases are yet to be investigated are the results, so far, of work of the Ranger police department on cases that have been occupying much of the departments attention the last few days. County officials, including Senator Brelsford of Eastland, acting as advisory counsel to the prosecutors department, are working with Acting Chief of Police Peevey's men in ferreting out the facts, making out complaints and listing the property that has been recovered. Three hundred and thirty-three feet of casing in the possession of I. Barris of the Ranger Pipe & Supply company has been identified and recovered by the owners. This piping is valued at \$500; 3,500 feet of 6 5/8-inch casing and 1,700 feet of 12 1/2-inch casing, worth \$3,500, is alleged to have passed through his hands from one big company alone. Barris is in the city jail at Ranger and two complaints of grand larceny have been filed against him in these two cases. G. D. Crowe, a teamster, twenty-six years old, made written confession, the police say, to the fact that on the night of September 13 he and a man named Si Johnson stole fifteen joints of 6 5/8-inch casing from the neighborhood of the Bullock school house, near Caddo, and took this casing to a concern in Ranger, where they sold it for \$100, which was much below its real value. Johnson also made a confession, according to local police. Others are being investigated and complaints filed as fast as the officers find sufficient grounds.

TWO AMERICANS ARE UNDER ARREST--1 BEATEN MAY CAUSE BIG CRISIS

VLADIVOSTOK, Sept. 30.—Major General Graves, commander of the American forces in Siberia, has demanded an apology from General Rozanoff, commanding the Russian troops in Priamur province, for the arrest of Captain Johns of the Twenty-seventh regiment and of Corporal Sperling of the Thirty-first, and the flogging of the latter by Cossacks commanded by General Kalmikoff. Investigation of the conduct of a Japanese officer at Iman, where the arrests occurred, has been begun by the Japanese high command. The incident, which occurred September 5, is considered the most serious since the allies landed in Siberia. The two Americans were in uniform and on official business. They went to Iman, 170 miles north, on a section of a railroad guarded by Chinese troops, passports being unnecessary, by an agreement between the allies. While at a hotel there a detachment of Cossacks entered and arrested the Americans, claiming they were not provided with the proper identification papers. Captain Johns escaped and caught a moving train, on which he went to Spassk, where he reported the incident to the American officer in command. A detachment of Americans immediately went to Iman, taking three Cossacks hostage. They found General Kalmikoff's men entrenched near the station and prepared to use force, when a Japanese major interceded for the Cossacks, stating that in the event of hostilities between the Americans and Cossacks, Japanese troops would side with the latter.

WAR DEPT. SAYS ARMY IS NOW DEMOBILIZED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—In announcing that 10,000 emergency officers must be discharged within the next five years in order that the commissioned strength of the army may be brought to 18,000, the war department declared in a statement today that "the incident of war and the demobilization are at an end." Officers are to be retained by selection from applications for permanent appointment.

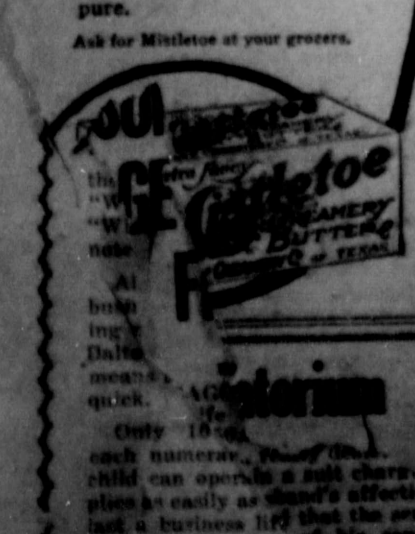

(By International News Service.) CLEVELAND, Ohio, Sept. 30.—Cleveland saloonists are prosperous again and it cost the State \$20,000 to make 'em so.

Last Winter they were closed up several days on account of the flu epidemic and heathless Mondays. Eleven hundred brought suit for a license rebate of \$97.50 each and the court has ruled in their favor.

C. M. A. WOULD ENTER WINTER QUARTERS SOON

The Christian and Missionary Alliance contemplate establishing itself in winter quarters as soon as they are provided, according to Rev. O. W. Edwards, pastor in charge. The alliance entered the religious and evangelistic field here several months ago and probably has held more revival services and religious meetings than any other Christian force in the oil fields.

At present they are worshiping in a crude tabernacle, or brush arbor, at the end of Hunt street, on the Hodges estate. The weather is expected to be so cool in the next few weeks that the alliance will have to find another place to carry on its aggressive work.

Up to this time no location has been found for the winter services. The pastor and his assistant, W. W. Moore, have been conducting the services here without asking for public funds and they have performed a good work where efforts seem to have been but little prosecuted. They would be pleased to have any one who wishes to further the work of the gospel and who is able to assist in furnishing a structure to communicate with them as soon as possible.

The work is strictly Christian in its scope and no effort is made to profit financially. The pastor declared that he wants to see the way paved for the institution in Ranger of a Christian mission where services can be held every night in the week and on Sundays. The work is non-denominational. Nothing but the old-time doctrines are taught. No new-fangled ideas are furthered. It is a society for the propagation of the Christian religion and those who are giving their time and labors to the work have asked for no compensation from their congregation.

Every dollar donated to the cause will be applied in obtaining a structure where these services can be held. Any person who wishes to assist in this program of church building is requested to communicate with Rev. O. W. Edwards in his tent at the foot of Hunt street. The offering will be gratefully received.

400,000 ACRES OF TIMBER ARE BURNED

HELENA, Mont., Sept. 30.—While exact figures will not be obtainable until late autumn, when snow comes and foresters can make a complete survey, it has been semi-officially estimated that between 300,000 and 400,000 acres of valuable timber will have been burned in Montana this year.

The heavy loss this year is exceptional, but there has been scarcely a year in which the damage was not tremendous. The state press is beginning to urge vigorously a reorganization of the government's forest protection system. One recommendation which has attracted considerable attention is to use military forces in peace times for forest patrol.

CONFEDERATES TO RECEIVE PENSIONS. AUSTIN, Sept. 30.—Every Confederate pensioner in Texas will receive \$23 for each of the next two quarters beginning September 1, according to Comptroller Henry B. Terrell, who has just completed the semi-annual apportionment of the pension fund.

There are now about 15,500 Confederate pensioners on the rolls and the comptroller estimates that two hundred names are dropped each quarter through deaths. On September 1 there was \$285,551 in the state treasury credited to the pension fund, but of this amount \$370,000 was expended to pay the apportionment of the last quarter, leaving about \$15,000 on hand with which to begin the flow quarter, Mr. Terrell said.

COUNTY TAKES STEP FORWARD VOTING BONDS

Special to The Times. CISCO, Sept. 30.—Eastland county took a step forward along progressive lines and voted one of the largest bond issues ever voted by any Texas county when the issue of \$4,500,000 for the purpose of building concrete highways throughout the county was authorized in a county-wide election.

A mass meeting was held at Eastland about the first of September, when friends of the movement from every section of the county took decisive steps to get behind the movement and put the issue over. Outside of this one public meeting not another public gathering was held except at one voting box for the purpose of boosting the election. The people had made up their minds to move forward and give this county a good public road system.

The vote was light, but the good roads people voted and the issue carried by the biggest majority ever voted in Texas. At many of the voting precincts the vote was more than seven to one for the bonds.

Work on the roads will begin as soon as bonds are approved.

BAPTIST CHURCH EXCAVATION IS NOW FINISHED

Excavation on the new \$85,000 Baptist church being erected just west of the intersection of Marston and Walnut streets has been practically completed, and the foundation will soon be laid for the big pillars to support the superstructure. The excavation of this plot was one of the most difficult which has been encountered in this section due to the almost continuously solid rock from the surface down to a depth of approximately ten feet, the space to be used for a basement and kitchen for the church.

The great accumulation of earth and stone taken from the spot has been used in filling in low property nearby. The small creek to the west has been filled, allowing only a small channel for flood waters to pass by. Much property has been improved by reason of the filling in process.

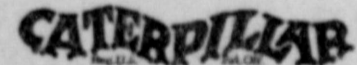

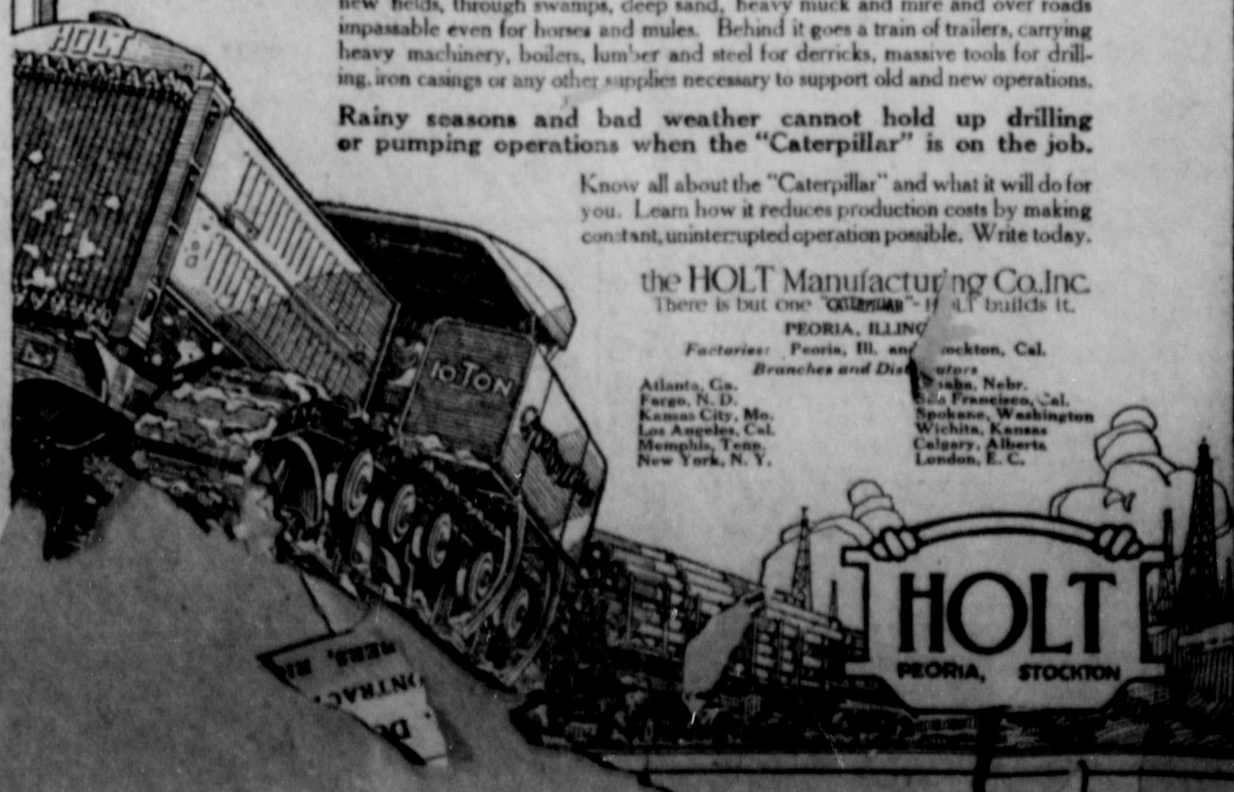
