COMISKEY PARK, CHICAGO, Oct. 6 .- The Cincinnati Reds annexed another game from the Chicago White Sox-and it was some thriller-by a score of 5 to 0. The Reds now need only one game to cinch the title as the world's baseball champions.

Hod Eller made himself an honest-to-goodness world's series star in today's game by establishing a new strike-out record. It was a shame the way he cut down the Sox batsmen in one, two, three order.

The teams go to Cincinnati tomorrow and if the Reds beat the Sox out, that will be the end of the story for the 1919 baseball title.






