WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—The house and senate of the Belgians will not be received by President and Mrs. Wilson next month, according to an announcement made here today.

Cosden May Sell Holdings in Texas

FORT WORTH, Oct. 18.—J. E. Cosden, head of the various Cosden interests, is negotiating for the sale of a large part of his personal interests in the North Central Texas fields, according to a report here.

BIG SHORTAGE IN FOOD AT N. Y. VERY SERIOUS

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—The most serious shortage of food in its history threatened New York today as a result of the unauthorized longshoremen's strike.

Foodstuffs are piled high on the piers, and Arthur Williams, federal food administrator, said that large quantities of fruits, vegetables and other perishable food have decayed.

Coastwise steamers and vessels from South American ports are still tied up here. Thousands of tons of sugar are awaiting removal to refineries and the shortage in other cities of this commodity is attributed by officials to the strike.

CLAIM THAT U. S. TROOPS CROSS INTO MEXICO

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—The Mexican consul at Presidio, Texas, reported to Ambassador Bonillas today two alleged invasions of Mexican territory, which he says involved the kidnapping of Mexicans by American soldiers. The consul said he complained to the proper United States authorities and the soldiers were arrested and the Mexicans freed and their arms restored to them.

No complaint has been made or is contemplated by Bonillas to the American state department, it was said, because the incidents were promptly settled by the action of the military authorities and the Mexican government does not care to create a situation by filing formal protest.

NO U.S. VOTE TILL TREATY IS RATIFIED

PARIS, Oct. 18.—The supreme council today adopted a resolution to the effect that the delegates of the great powers may sit on various commissions created under the German peace treaty, and may vote on questions before these commissions, whether or not their governments have ratified the treaty.

If the United States does not object, it is stated that the American delegates probably will take the places assigned to the United States on such commissions.

Germany is declared to be anxious to have the commissions begin work fully organized and is particularly desirous to have the American representatives on them.

Signor Tittoni, Italian foreign minister, said in the council today for the first time he had received notice to return to Rome.

TO NAME COUNCIL

PARIS, Oct. 18.—Allied nations have agreed to their nominations of ambassadors to be dependent upon the manner in which the treaty's clause is carried out in Germany, according to the Echo de Paris, which quotes a prominent diplomat as its source of information.

NEW BANKS TO BE PUT UP IN THIS SECTION

C. W. Kerfoot, banker and business man of Shawnee, Okla., has been spending several days in the oil fields and is arranging to establish a bank or possibly more than one bank in the towns on the line of the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Peet Worth railroad. He and his associates contemplate putting in a bank with \$100,000 capital stock in Frankfort, a new town on this line in Stephens county, eleven miles north of Ranger. SOON IT'LL BE OVER. The amendment to the food control bill which was passed by congress last Saturday and has been sent to the executive to sign will shortly start its incision into high prices if the department of justice which has its enforcement in charge does its duty. It imposes a fine of \$5,000 or a two-year term in the federal penitentiary upon every profiteer in clothing and food-stuffs. The department of justice has already accumulated a mass of information on profiteering in the nation which it will use to advantage as soon as the president signs the relief measure. According to the plan of Attorney General Palmer, the effectiveness of the new law will become manifest at once, for examples will be made of two profiteers in each center. Then the others will begin to drop prices. Profiteering is a diabolical crime against the American people. Long suffering, the American public is now to get relief. If there are profiteers in Ranger they should be handled to the fullest extent of the new federal law. The promptness with which the government prosecutes its cases and the merciless manner of execution of the law are well known to violators of the law. State laws are often ignored, but federal executions are given second thought before violations are committed.

Plan Tubercular Sanitarium for Wounded Men

AUSTIN, Oct. 18.—A campaign to raise \$200,000 to finance the erection and equipping of a tubercular sanitarium, proposed on state lands at Carls-
 bad, for the care of Texas soldiers af-
 flicted with tuberculosis, has been de-
 cided upon by the recently chartered
 Tubercular War Risk society of
 Texas.
 Dr. C. W. Goddard, state health of-
 ficer, will have direct charge of the
 campaign, and Governor W. P. Hobby
 has been requested to ask the Liberty
 Loan organization of the State to co-
 operate in raising subscriptions.
 The board of directors of the society
 is now working out details of mem-
 bership in the proposed new sanitarium,
 which has tentatively been given the
 name of the Texas War Memorial. The
 most generally favored classes of
 memberships at present are: Subscrib-
 ing membership, \$1 to \$10; contribut-
 ing \$10 to \$100; life, \$100 to \$1,000;
 memorial, \$1,000 and up. Subscrip-
 tions on this basis already are accept-
 able, according to Dr. Goddard, and
 should be made payable to Governor
 Hobby.
 Plans to provide temporary quarters
 for the tubercular soldiers have been
 formulated, charter members of the
 War Risk Society having subscribed to
 a fund to defray such expenses until
 the new sanitarium is constructed.
 Major J. M. Holt, U. S. A., repre-
 senting the United States War Risk
 Bureau in Texas, Oklahoma and Ar-
 kansas, recently appeared before a
 meeting of the society here and ex-
 plained the situation, stressing the

PROPOSED AID TO GOOD ROADS IS EXPLAINED

A letter explaining the proposed state amendment to encourage the building of good roads in counties not able to make large enough appropriations to build state highways up to specifications is being sent out by C. S. Swier, state highway commissioner.

"The voters of Texas," the letter says, "have a misconception of the proposed amendment to be voted on in November. A large majority believe they will be voting upon themselves a \$75,000,000 bond issue, thereby immediately increasing their taxes 30 cents on the hundred dollars. We must explain that this is not a \$75,000,000 bond issue. It is an enabling act, permitting the state to assist in building a connected system of hard-surfaced roads.

"The needs of your section of the state will derive special benefit from the passage of this amendment. There is now available in 150 counties in the state more than \$10,000,000 of county money with which to build roads. The Texas people want to get out of the mud.

"But this \$10,000,000 will not build a connected system of permanent roads. Many counties have not the state money to get them to vote a bond issue. It will require state and federal aid to get a connected system of highways. Furthermore, many counties have voted their bond limit and still have insufficient funds to construct roads of a permanent type. Just as soon as the roads are completed and connected the traffic on the highways will increase several hundred per cent. This is always the case.

"I recently heard a large wheel sale man in East Texas say he was unable to get his business to be completed when he attempted to do so. He was unable to get his goods to market because of the bad roads. He said that if he could have a road to his place, he would have a business. The truck traffic has come to a standstill and the business of a large section of the state is paralyzed. Otherwise, we will have in most of the counties in the state, within a year or two, a bonded debt and no roads. If within a year or two the highways are to pieces under the increased traffic, the building movement in Texas will be at an end.

"The advantages to be derived from a system of hard-surfaced roads cannot be overestimated. Food and other necessities reach 50 per cent of the perishable foodstuffs of this country never reach the consumer because of inadequate transportation facilities. This waste could be almost entirely eliminated by having a system of hard-surfaced roads that would enable the producer to get the produce to the consumer by water transportation.

"The only way to remedy this condition, and the only way to bring down the high cost of living, is to build a connected system of hard-surfaced roads, making it possible for the producer to deliver his produce direct to the consumer, and making it possible for the consumer to buy

direct from the producer. The only way this state can secure a system of hard-surfaced roads is by adopting the proposed constitutional road amendment to be voted on November 4th.

"I desire to call your attention to the fact that the committee is going to ask for only \$5,000,000 the first year. This sum, on the estimated valuation for the next year, will raise taxes only one cent on each one hundred dollars assessed valuation. Taking the ratio of increased values for the next fifteen years, which is the time expected to elapse before the full \$75,000,000 is asked for, the assessed valuation of this state will be between \$8,000,000,000 and \$9,000,000,000; and because one-half of the first series will be received when the last series is asked for, the total increase of taxes for the building of a complete and connected system of hard-surfaced roads across the state would be less than 9 cents on the hundred dollars assessed valuation.

"It is absolutely necessary that these facts be presented to the voters of the state. To accomplish this in the short space of four weeks it will be necessary to have an organization in each county and conduct a campaign of education."

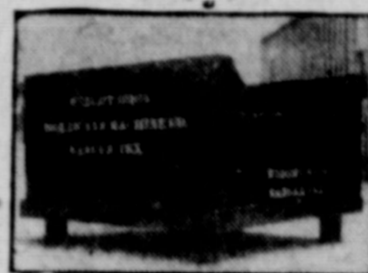
