

TWO THOUSAND BARREL WELL PUTS FIELD OUT AT ENTIRELY NEW ANGLE

RANGER'S POSTAL NEEDS MAY BE MET BY SYSTEM, SAY EXPERIENCED CLERKS

Just because Ranger is a fast growing city, is no reason that it should not have good mail service. Efficient dispatching of outgoing mail, and delivery of incoming mail is possible, despite the volume of business that is handled, almost that of a city twice Ranger's size.

These are assertions of two former railway mail workers, each of a dozen years' experience, who have been in the Ranger office for several weeks, resigning, with several other employees because of the inefficient way in which the postal business here is administered, they say.

Mr. Sanderford is a former resident of Ranger, and has had years of experience in railway and office postal work. He left the postal service from the Fort Worth office to enter the insurance business and on a visit to Ranger was persuaded to go to work in this office to relieve the congestion. Mr. Harris also has had many years of postal service, and left the railway mail service to enter this office.

In a letter to The Times these workers say: "There is no legitimate reason why we cannot have good mail service here. Each of us has had twelve years' experience in the postal service and we know what good service is. We came here with the intention of remaining permanently, going to work in the local postoffice Oct. 10 and resigning on the 31st.

"In the first place, the foreman whom R. O. Kelly, acting postmaster, has placed in charge, has had no previous experience in the work. He has succeeded in making conditions so disagreeable here that six of the force of twenty-five resigned the last of October, and others are talking of walking out. Two more have resigned since we quit.

"In any organization co-operation is essential and the service will be deficient as long as the man in charge does not have the co-operation of those working under him. This is the reason letters and packages are returned to their senders, or arrive a month or more late.

"We feel that business men of Ranger are ready to get together and demand the service they are entitled to. "We put in an average of fourteen hours a day trying to straighten out the tangle here, until the foreman put into effect a schedule of hours which limited us to seven. We feel we would have had things running smoothly had we been permitted to take hold of and systematize the work. It will be impossible to have real postal service here as long as present conditions exist.

"Another thing we would criticize is the standard wage scale, giving the inexperienced girl employe within seven cents as much an hour as the postal clerk of ten years and more experience.

"Thousands of letters have been returned to writers in the last two weeks, a great many of which could have been delivered. Many firms who have boxes at the postoffice do not receive their mail simply because the box number is not put on the letters.

"A letter marked 'unclaimed, return to writer,' was found in a quantity of mail after it had lain in this office several weeks. It was addressed, in clear typewritten letters, 'Mayor M. H. Haggaman, Ranger, Texas.' It would be a joke if this were a joking matter.

"There are plenty of men who know how and who have the ability and are willing to give it their entire time.

"Let us demand better service and we probably will get it.

TESTIMONY OF DEAD IS ASKED IN BIG TRIAL

LONDON, Nov. 4.—Sir Oliver Lodge has received a letter from a noted firm of London lawyers asking him to obtain evidence from the spirit world in order to clear up an important point in a case involving the disposal of an income of \$100,000. The letter explains that fifteen years ago three men—the father of the lawyer, then head of the firm, the father of the client, and another lawyer—lunched together and over the dessert came to an agreement regarding the disposal of the property which was never set down in writing, or if set down, the writing has been lost.

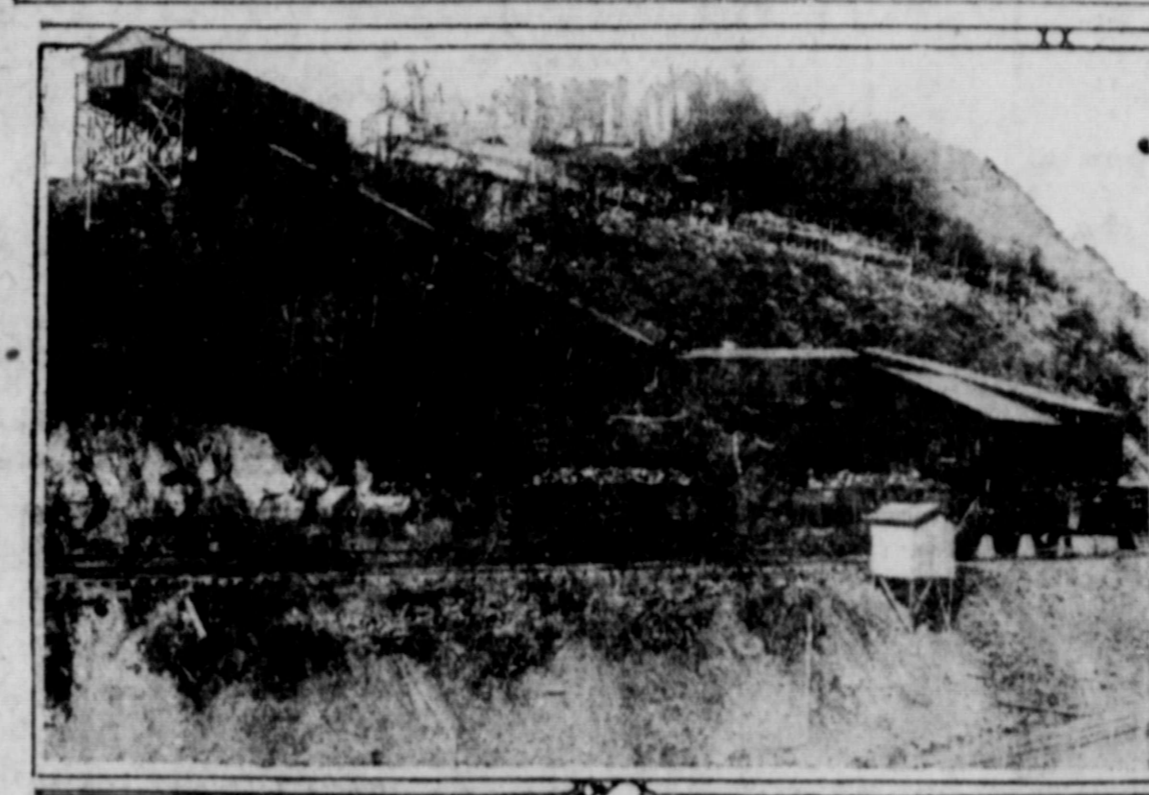
These three men have since died and the rival law firms now hold conflicting views as to the title of the property. The only change in its administration since the luncheon was the manner in which the income tax was paid. Sir Oliver Lodge has been requested by the former to communicate with the spirit of the dead lawyer and obtain such information from him as would enable them to prove that the luncheon was a business luncheon and that the change of administration made in the income tax was due to an agreement made at that luncheon.

When asked about the case, Sir Oliver refused to say whether an attempt was being made to subpoena the departed lawyer; nor would he state whether he believed that spirits could be induced to give evidence in the court.

MORE TROOPS SENT TO THE STRIKE ZONE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—Efforts to reach a basis of possible settlement of the bituminous coal miners' strike were made today at a conference between Federal Fuel Administrator Garfield and J. D. Morrow, president of the National Coal association, an organization of the country's leading coal operators.

Additional movements of federal and state troops into the coal fields were reported overnight and thousands of cars of fuel in transit were confiscated by the federal railroad administration.

The diminishing supply of private and municipal industries is seen in some cities, and the stoppage of production is already being felt at many places.

Their lips sealed officially by the federal injunction, officials of the mine workers remained silent today. The miners' attorneys continue to prepare a case for the hearing on Saturday in Washington in federal court of the injunction proceedings. Washington officials were of the opinion that the broad powers of the restraining order prohibiting the use of strike funds will compel the miners to resume work.

CHICAGO HAS FIRST FAIR PRICE GROCERY LIST

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—Three-fourths of a pound on flour, six cents on lard, seven cents on butter and seven cents on a dozen eggs are the maximum margins of profit retailers should charge above the prevailing prices, according to the first fair price list of the Chicago Fair Price committee, composed of fifteen retail grocers.

If the prices are approved by the head of the committee, they will go into effect at once.

OFFICIALS ISSUE WARNING AGAINST USE OF SACCHARIN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The use of saccharin in place of sugar, which many housewives are being tempted to resort to in these days of sugar shortage, may involve menace to the health, and therefore is to be condemned, according to specialists in the Bureau of Chemistry of the United States Department of Agriculture.

In most cases housewives have turned to this substance in their emergency because they do not understand that saccharin is a harmful drug; to consider it a harmless healthful substitute for sugar is absolutely false, say the government's chemists.

The Department of Agriculture has received a number of inquiries from housewives in the last few days concerning the properties of saccharin, and in every case it has answered by condemning the use of the drug for cooking purposes. It calls attention to the fact that the Bureau of Chemistry is now aiding in the

preparation of a large St. Louis conference, which makes saccharin for violation of the food and drugs act.

"The attempt to exploit the shortage of sugar and create a demand for saccharin for use in place of sugar endeavors to capitalize the public's lack of knowledge of the properties of this substance and the Bureau of Chemistry facts called upon to reiterate the warnings which it has given repeatedly in its publications," said Carl I. Albers, chief of the bureau, who cites his testimony before a subcommittee of the Senate's committee on agriculture a few days ago, on this same subject, as showing the extent of the present menace to the health of the public not being properly informed.

"The department regards the use of saccharin as food as a menace to health," says Dr. Albers. "This is the position of the department today as it was in 1911 when official decisions were rendered. There has been no scientific evidence advanced on the basis of which the department will be justified in any manner in changing its position."

"The department regards food to which saccharin has been added as adulterated, since a substance has been added to the food which renders it deleterious to health. It also regards it as adulterated in that a substitute of no food value whatsoever has been substituted for sugar, a very valuable food. The department has now pending a criminal prosecution against one concern for the sale of a state of a parcel of saccharin labeled as harmless. Furthermore, a majority of the states prohibit the use of saccharin in food, either by statute or by regulation."

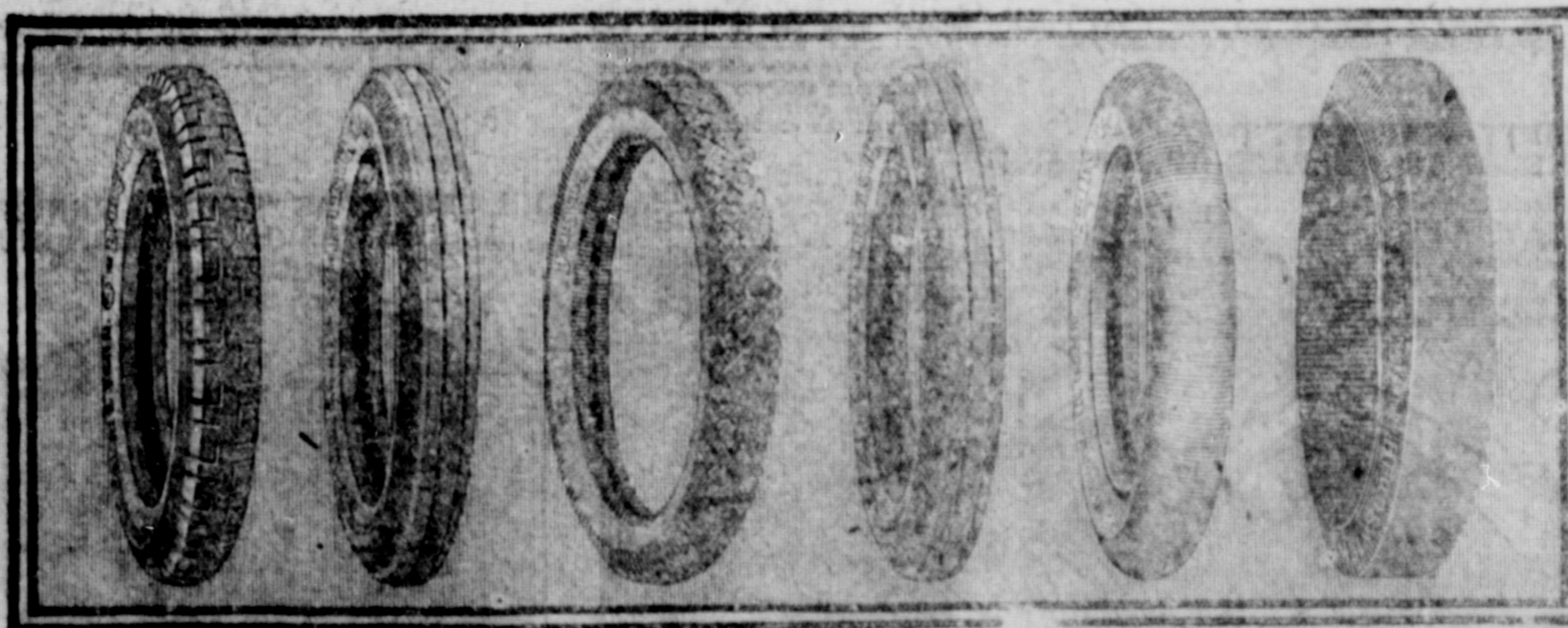

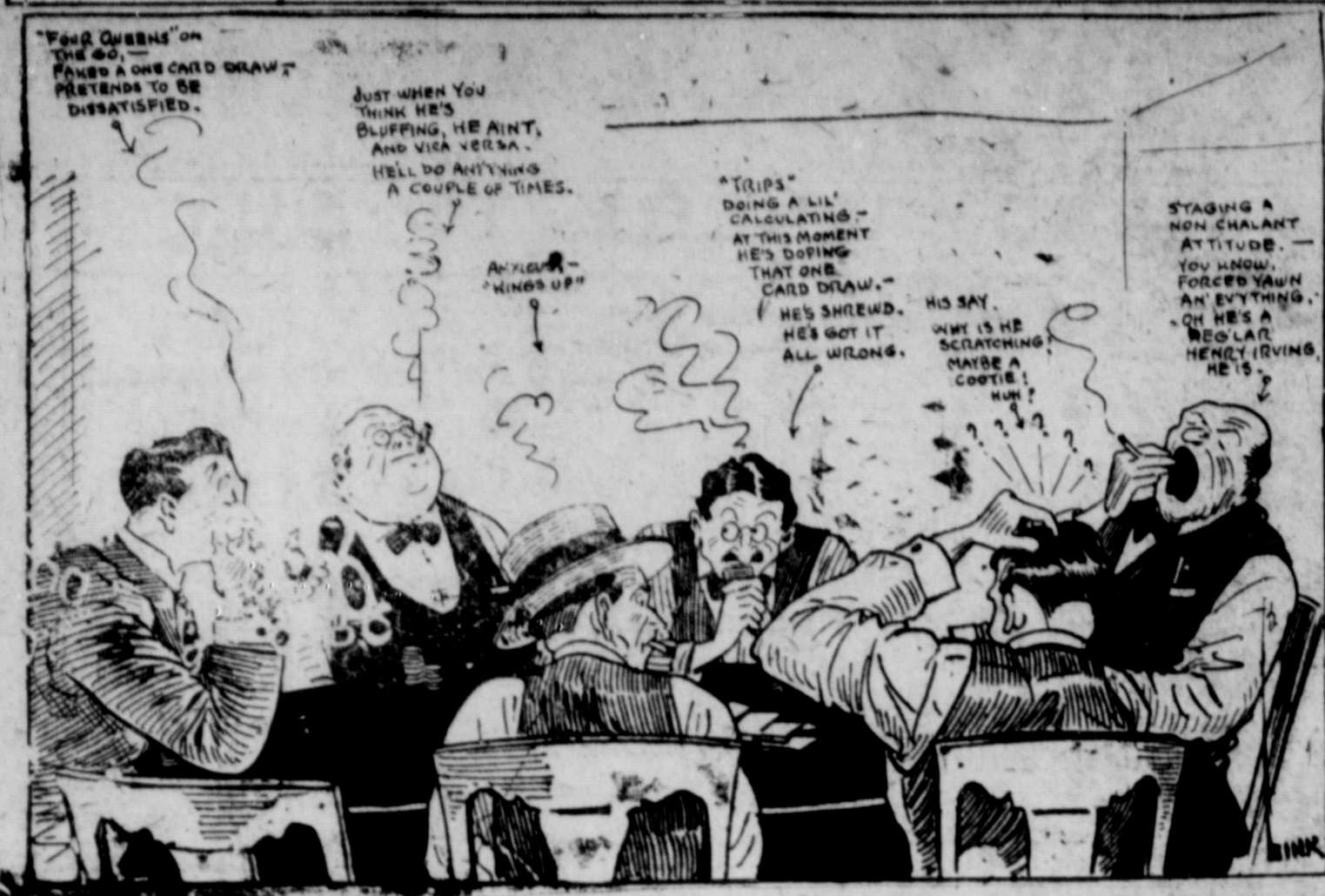
