

City To Get Bath In Mosquito Killer

In a perfectly quiet, orderly and harmonious meeting of the city council Tuesday night, the commissioners made plans to spray the entire city against mosquitoes and other insects.

Material for the operation is expected to cost about \$290. For the past years, a spraying machine has been borrowed from the City of Eastland at no expense, except for incidental expenses of the operator which Eastland also furnishes.

Also, the commissioners heard an official letter addressed to Mayor Lee Dockery and the council from City Manager Lester Crossley withdrawing his resignation.

In part, Crossley wrote, "I con-

sider the majority vote of the commission asking that I reconsider and withdraw my resignation as well as the petition presented this commission in the last regular session to have been a vote of confidence which I very deeply and sincerely appreciate.

"I regret any inconvenience which my resignation, which was made in all sincerity, might have caused the Commission. I will continue to devote my time and interest and what ability I may have to any cause contributing to the overall welfare of Ranger, and to that end I pledge my co-operation to the Commission, singly and as a body."

No action was required on the letter, as a motion made by Street Commissioner Owen Bray in the meeting Tuesday night a week ago made Crossley's stay here effective if he chose to withdraw the resignation.

The Commissioners also canceled the lease agreement of N. B. Quarles, owner of Quarles Manufacturing Company here who owes the city six months of back rent at \$50 per month.

Quarles moved here in January of 1954 and was granted one year of free rent. After signing a contract however, he has not paid any rent this year.

Quarles is now in the process of moving his concern to Strawn.

The committee appointed to investigate the feasibility of moving the fire department to the fire station requested further time to continue its study.

City Spraying Operation To Begin Friday

City Manager Lester Crossley said today that the spraying of the city against mosquitoes and insects would begin Saturday afternoon and would continue through Sunday.

Crossley said that there was no way of telling when the project would be completed, but it depended upon the availability of the spraying machine which has been borrowed from Eastland.

Supplies for the machine have been ordered from Dallas and are due to arrive here sometime Friday.

HD Explains Water Test

As a service to the people of Eastland County the Home Demonstration Clubs have joined together and made it possible for all interested persons to have their drinking water tested.

"Few people realize the danger of disease which is found in water," it was explained. "Besides typhoid fever and intestinal infections, water also plays a part in the communication of cholera, diphtheria, dysentery, echinococcosis, infectious hepatitis, herpangina, leptospirosis and paratyphoid fever. One never knows when one of these diseases might be in drinking water until one of the family is stricken with it, unless the family have their water tested and analyzed."

Sterile bottles for the project have been furnished by the County Health Unit in Abilene. The procedure for obtaining the sample is simple: Flame your hydrant, or other device that you might have to use to put the water in the bottle. Remove the cap from the bottle leaving the paper hood on the cap.

Be very careful not to touch either the cap or the bottle top with your hand. Fill the bottle. Replace the cap and paper hood. Fill out the three cards which come with the bottle, placing a two-cent stamp on one of them. Wrap the bottle with the card around it, and place it back in the paper wrapper. Mail your sample, as soon as it is collected, to County Health Unit, 125 1/2 Chestnut St., Abilene, Tex.

"Since the only cost for this water testing is a few cents, please be sure that everyone in the county who has a water supply will want to take advantage of this opportunity," said Minnie Mae Billingsley, county home demonstration agent. "Bottles may be obtained from the home demonstration club members, or from my office here in Eastland. We would like to stress that this is not just for home demonstration club members, but for anyone in the county who is interested."

"Our chief goal as home demonstration women in this worthwhile project is to help make Eastland County have a safe drinking water supply free of infectious diseases."

County Gets Field Tests

Another regular oil field project was staged this week in Eastland County. It is the E. W. Griffin, Olden, No. 1 J. Miller was spotted in the regular field three miles north-east of Eastland.

Having a proposed depth of 3,900 feet with rotary, it spots 870 feet from the south and 2,070 feet from the west lines of Section 2, Block 4, H&TC Survey. Location for a proposed 3,900-foot rotary project was staked in the regular field five miles southwest of Ranger. It is Schumann Oil Corp. of Tulsa, Okla., No. 1 L. H. Wood.

Drillsite is 2,830 feet from the south and 1,820 feet from the west lines of John W. White Survey.

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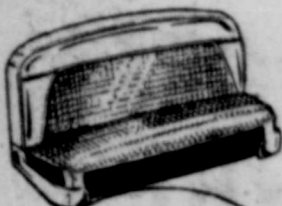

New Hook in Spring End
When a new hook is needed on the end of a coil spring, the simplest method is to place the spring on the corner of a vise or anvil and use a hammer.
